Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

In recent days many have inquired as to the health status of our dear sister Melissa Bachman. Please continue to pray for healing, strength, courage, hope, peace and faith for Melissa and all those who are ill.

Many thanks to Mrs. Kim Lisbon, retiring after six years as St. Mary's Religious Education Secretary. Very sadly for us, Kim's family schedule is no longer compatible with the coverage needs of the Religious Education Office. We are grateful for Kim's friendly presence in the office, her good work organizing our CORI process and updates, as well as for other efforts too numerous to name. Kim has written a farewell note on the Religious Education page of today's bulletin. May God bless her! (A temporary secretary, Maria Urbina, is in place until a permanent hire is made).

As we celebrate this week the birth of our nation, I invite us all to pray for our country's leaders. May God guide, inspire and empower them to serve His people well. Our nation was founded by men and women of faith fleeing other lands where they were forced to live in ways contrary to their moral convictions. For that reason, religious freedom is part of the very foundation of our United States, a precious right which every generation must cherish and protect.

Religious freedom is never about forcing people to live according to another's faith, but rather making sure that government never forces people of faith to compromise their beliefs in the way they live, work or worship. Many would like to see religion locked up in church on Sunday and kept as a strictly private matter, when in fact true faith becomes part of every aspect of one's life. It is the light which guides us, and the ruler against which we measure every choice that life presents. In the words of George Washington, "Of all the dispositions and habits which lead to political prosperity, Religion and morality are indispensable supports. In vain would that man claim the tribute of Patriotism who should labour to subvert these great Pillars of human happiness, these firmest buttresses of the duties of Men and citizens."

In recent days, the question of what Religious Freedom does and does not mean, has been very much part of the public debate. I therefore share as food for thought the following insights from PBS's "Rediscovering George Washington" Series.

"Given the importance of religion to Washington and the other Founders, it is difficult to understand the common view today that government should merely tolerate but never support or promote religion. Nothing could be further from the intentions of the Founders, as can be seen by simply looking at the First Amendment. The First Amendment states, *'Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof...'* In writing the First Amendment, the Founders had two concerns. The first was that in America there would be no established church like in 18th century Britain, France, and other European countries where one's political rights were protected only if one belonged to the official religion of the government. But the Founders never for a moment suggested that government ought not promote religion and morality generally.

Many people today think the First Amendment is built upon the idea that there is or should be a '*wall of separation between church and state*.' That phrase is found not in the First Amendment, but in a letter Thomas Jefferson wrote while he was President of the United States to a group of Baptists (who were often persecuted in colonial times for their religious beliefs and practices). Jefferson wrote to assure them that their religious liberty would be protected.

When Jefferson wrote of the 'wall of separation between church and state,' he did not mean that religion must be kept entirely out of politics, or law. If he had meant that, he would have violated the 'wall of separation' at the very time he declared it. For, at the end of the letter to the Baptists, Jefferson, acting in his official capacity as President, concluded with a prayer: '*I reciprocate your kind prayers for the protection and blessing of the common Father and Creator of man.*'

For the Founders, government support of religion is not the same as an 'establishment' of religion. How could it be, when the Founders themselves believed our natural rights to be gifts of God? In September 1789, the House of Representatives authorized the first official Thanksgiving. The resolution they passed called for 'a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God.' Moreover, they passed this on the very same day they passed the First Amendment, which said 'Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion.' Clearly those in the first Congress did not see any conflict between the First Amendment's prohibition on an established religion, and government sanctioning an official day of thanksgiving to God."






ST. MARY'S 150th ANNIVERSARY IS COMING! (1870 – 2020). As early as 1836, there is evidence that Catholics lived and worked in Holliston. These people, along with coreligionists from Milford, Hopkinton, Medway, Ashland, Upton, Marlborough, Maynard, Westborough, Cordaville, and Saxonville were visited by Fr. Tilton of Boston and later by Fr. Boyce of Worcester. These priests would periodically celebrate Mass in one of the towns and take care of the spiritual needs of their scattered flock. In 1847, Fr. Boyce, along with a Fr. Gibson, instituted what is today St. Mary's Parish in Milford. From this center, the priests would travel to the above named towns and say Mass regularly.

When and where the first Catholic Mass was held is conjectural. More than likely, Mass was celebrated in one of the homes of a leading citizen. For a number of years before St. Mary's was formally established, however, Mass was celebrated in the old Town Hall. Local Catholics would assemble and Fr. Boyce or one of the other

priests from Milford would hear confessions, baptize, and celebrate Mass. The Holliston community would be joined by people from as far away as Westborough, Bellingham, and Cordaville. Still other Catholics walked to Milford for Mass. Many people remember the walk to Mass, a distance of seven miles to St. Mary's. It is remembered that on a Sunday morning as many as 75 to 80 people could be seen winding their way by the railroad track and road to worship. After its construction in 1851, the old St. Malachy (St. John's) Church in Hopkinton, also attracted many Catholics from Holliston for their religious needs.

1870: In December 1870, Holliston was named a district parish. It included Medway and Bellingham. Fr. Richard Quinlan was appointed the founding pastor. Fr. Quinlan had a dream for Saint Mary's church building: "...a simple church, extraordinary stain glass windows, and an organ second to none in the Archdiocese of Boston." These dreams were realized over time. Watch for more about this exciting Anniversary and the events being planned to celebrate it!
