7 PM Mass of the Lord's Supper

The Mass of the Lord's Supper recalls the events the night before Jesus died, especially the institution of the Holy Eucharist. The ceremony of the washing of the feet reminds us of Jesus' call to serve one another. The Mass concludes with a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the altar of repose in Father Haley Hall, where Adoration will continue until 10:30 PM. At Mass a collection will be taken up for the Holliston Food Pantry.

12 PM (Kindergarten – Grade 5) Younger Children's Stations of the Cross

7 PM Celebration of the Lord's Passion

The 7:00 PM Lord's Passion Celebration is the official Good Friday Liturgy that continues the three day Triduum Celebration begun on Holy Thursday and concluding at Easter. It consists of the Liturgy of the Passion, Veneration of the Cross, and Holy Communion. The Noon Stations are designed for younger children K – Grade 5, (accompanied by parents), and utilize a living tableau and special station prayers to help young children discover Jesus' love for them in the here and now.

Good Friday is a day of fasting and abstinence from meat. In every single Catholic parish around the world this day, a collection is taken up to maintain the Shrines and struggling Christian communities in the Holy Land. This collection is taken up at both the Stations and Passion Services.

The Great Easter Vigil is rightly called the "Mother" of all liturgies. It includes the blessing of the new Easter Candle (given this year in loving memory of Patrick D. McDonald, 1944-2017), the sung Exultet Prayer, and readings that capture the fullness of God's saving work for humanity. The Church rejoices in a special way to receive new members this night through the Sacraments of Initiation. All Easter collections go to support the retired priests of our Archdiocese. From the Pastor's Desk

March 11, 2018, Laetare Sunday

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

St. Mary's came through the recent Nor'easters relatively unscathed, except for this roof cross which became dislodged by high winds and was very close to toppling off the church when the roofers finally arrived to re-secure it. (photo right)



It occurs to me that "the Cross" is something that can not only become dislodged from a building, but also from our lives. The Cross represents the challenging part of our faith. It stands for discipline and self-denial. It represents service and sacrifice. The Cross means taking our eyes off ourselves and putting them on all those for whom Christ died. We remember how Peter found Jesus' talk of suffering and dying for others to be hard to take, and even tried to silence the Lord on this point (Mt 16:23). Peter wanted Jesus and the mercy, and love, and Good News He brought – but not so much the Cross.

Yet as Jesus reminded us, the Cross is an essential part of our Christian discipleship. "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me," says the Lord (Mt 16:24). For one person, the Cross may represent being generous toward those in whose welfare you have no personal stake. For another, the Cross may mean living a chaste single life until you are married. For many of us the Cross means being willing to forgive those who have wronged us — even when such forgiveness has been neither earned nor asked for. For some, the Cross means speaking up for life in a culture that more and more embraces death.

Peter wanted to take Jesus without taking the Cross. And we each can identify the Cross Jesus wants us to carry because it's the part of Christian living we find hardest to take. The part that goes against our own instincts and desires. The part that will really cost us in terms of wealth, or popularity, or pleasure, or success as the world measures success. The Cross represents a willingness to die to the self, so that Christ, and Christ's love may live more perfectly within us. It is to make more room for Jesus, by making less room for all that is selfish and self-serving in our lives.

Very often picking up *our* Cross, actually means picking up someone *else's* Cross. Acting so as to lighten the burdens of someone who is elderly, or sick, or poor, or lonely, or in any of a thousand ways in need of somebody to be Christ for them. Every time we pick up a problem that isn't ours; each time we try to better a situation that is causing someone else to suffer; each time that the life of a family member or friend or stranger is made a little easier because we freely choose to shoulder part of the burden that they are carrying - those are the moments when we start to become truly like Christ. Who did not die for His own sins, but for ours. Who freely took up the Cross of *our* suffering and made it forever His own.

Good Friday ~ The importance of the Cross in our lives is reflected liturgically by the way Catholics keep Good Friday, the day that Jesus died to save us. There would have been no Easter joy without the events at Calvary the Friday before, and our Easter is made most meaningful and complete by our observance of Jesus' Passion on Good Friday. Good Friday is a day of solemn reflection, prayer, fasting, and abstinence from meat. It is customary to also abstain from social activities (going to the movies, playing sports, etc). Anything we would not do on the actual day a close family member that we love just died, we also avoid doing on the day that Jesus died. For Catholics, Good Friday is the single most solemn day of the year, as we consider the suffering and death that Jesus endured to save us from our sins. Please come and be part of our worship on Friday, March 30, as we honor and venerate the Cross of our salvation.

FRA ANGELICA ~ HEAVEN ON EARTH

On February 24, we visited the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum. On special exhibit were the paintings by Fra Angelico, a 15th Century Italian monk and painter. Viewing the 13 pieces in the Fra Angelico exhibit was breath-taking! It was the story of Our Blessed Mother from the Annunciation to her Assumption. We were able to get very close to the paintings at eye level, enabling us to interpret the different emotions of the people and follow Mary's story through multiple panels. The beauty of the colors used - especially the use of gold highlighting for Mary, Jesus, the apostles and angels - did indeed feel like heaven on earth. Thank you Fra Angelico for painting Our Blessed Mother Mary's life with such beauty! The Fra Angelico special exhibit is at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum through May 20. We encourage all our fellow St. Mary's Parishioners to experience it. Try to go - you'll love it!

"Renaissance master Fra Angelico transformed the history of western art with his breathtaking paintings. Heaven on Earth reunites the Gardner's magnificent Assumption and Dormition of the Virgin, acquired by Isabella in 1899 and the first Fra Angelico to reach the United States, with its three companions from the Museo di San Marco, Florence.

Conceived as a set of jewel-like reliquaries for the Florentine church of Santa Maria Novella, they tell the story of the Virgin Mary's life. This exhibition invites you to explore Fra Angelico's ground-breaking narrative art, marvel at his peerless creativity, and immerse yourself in the material splendor of his craftsmanship."

A Cross Walk with Kathleen Mitford

Kneeling in the quiet, waiting for the 7:30 AM Mass to begin, I smiled seeing a mother and her two young children slipping into the front pew ahead of me. Dressed in their matching Sunday best, coats were slipped off followed by hushed whispers. Watching her gentle, yet firm way of redirecting her children's attention toward the altar, reminded me of myself almost 30 years ago with 3 young kids in tow. As Mass went on, she lovingly engaged them with a gentle hug, a brief explanation to point out what was happening. I knew then that I wanted to meet this mother and hear her faith story.

We made a date for coffee at my house one Saturday morning. The broad smile I knew from church was followed by a friendly handshake. Soon, hands cupped around a warm mug of tea made us feel more like old friends than strangers. We soon discovered that in addition to sharing the name Kathleen/ Cathleen, we both had worked for many years in the retail and product development industry.

From the age of seven, Kathleen was interested in fashion. She remembers getting a toy called "Fashion Plates" and rubbing the raised designs with crayons to design outfits. Her dream came true, when she worked as a menswear designer in New York. Buyers from Nordstrom or Macys would buy the line for their own private label. When an opportunity to lead the implementation of development software for the retail industry presented itself, she took it; eventually transitioning to designing products for all industries.

"I realized that the fashion and tech world were not so different. A problem is presented and you have to figure out how to solve it," Kathleen shared. She is now Executive Vice President of Products at PTC, a Needham based software company.

The Mitford family - Kathleen, husband Mark, daughter Victoria (6) and son James (2 ½), moved to Holliston 3 years ago from Windham, NH to be closer to her work. "From day one, Saint Mary's Parish has been very welcoming to us," Kathleen shared," Father Mark reached out to me as soon as I sent an inquiry to join the parish. No Pastor had ever reached out to us in this way before. He met with me to learn about my family and how he could help us feel closer to God and the community. "

She went on, "We have been going to the 7:30 AM Mass since James was born. We sit in the first row so they can see what is going on, which keeps them more engaged. Father Mark knows my kids by name and makes them feel very welcome. He will often make a comment about James joining the choir when he gets older!"

We both recalled as young girls how our parents took us out in September to the shoe store where they would get down on their knees to measure your feet. Each child got two pairs of new shoes – one for school and one for church! This made us both feel like church was special. We agreed that getting to Mass as a young mother has its challenges. Neither of our husbands is Catholic, so both the joy and responsibility of educating them in the faith fell mostly on our shoulders. "I know my kids will be antsy and sometimes being two, I have to walk James to the back for a minute," she admitted, "I've gotten over feeling bad about the noise, they are kids after all. They are smart too, playing a bit of game to see 'how bad do I need to get before Mom takes me to the back?"

"My daughter Victoria listens to Fr. Mark's homilies and often asks questions afterward. She was confused recently." Kathleen went on, asking, "Baby Jesus was just born... and now he is getting ready to die. How did

he grow up so quickly?" What a perceptive and deep question for a 6-year-old! Kathleen seems very open to talking to her children about their faith and likes to get them involved, even at this young age, on how to live it.

"Our family has been very blessed and I want my children to understand that many other people are not as fortunate as we are. We try to teach our kids to be empathetic. On any occasion where they will be getting toys, the kids will go through the ones they have and chose some to give to those less fortunate. We make Easter baskets together for kids in need and at Christmas we adopt two kids to buy clothing and toys for." She went on to say how doing these things as a family provokes good questions and teachable moments.

I asked Kathleen about any "God" moments in her life. Immediately her eyes welled up with tears. "I can share with you, but I am probably going to cry..." She said. "Well, you're in good company then," I agreed, "I cry at everything!"

"I was 41 years old," she began, "and four months pregnant with our second child when I suffered a miscarriage. We had tried so long to have children that it was horrible." I could feel my own eyes well up, as I listened to her, thinking of my own miscarriage. I reached my hand across to her in solidarity, two mothers connected through our shared pain.

"You never really imagine how attached you get to a child growing in your womb," Kathleen shared. "I needed to depend on my faith to get me through the loss. It helped me get a different perspective on having kids." She went onto say how she speaks on different occasions to her employees and has been open about her experience going through infertility and miscarriage.

I was touched by the way she is willing to share her story and we both agreed we should not be afraid to discuss miscarriage and to be compassionate to those who have lost a baby so early. "After all" I added, "witnessing to our experiences, shines light on what we believe as Catholics... on the preciousness of life from the moment of conception." I told her how I named my baby Aubrey, because the lyrics from a song by that name touched me so, and memorialized her at The Shrine of the Holy Innocents in Stockbridge.

As our time was drawing to a close, Kathleen said she had been looking around her home for crosses and found one in the design on their door. I hope this will be the start of a new family tradition, and with each cross they discover, with many great conversations to follow.

As we carried our tea cups into the kitchen, we paused and embraced in a hug. I took her hand and told her I would pray for her baby son in heaven and for peace in her heart.



I am so thankful to have met Kathleen, Victoria and James. Kathleen has helped me to think differently about the children's chatter and singing at Mass, for it is truly a joyful testament to the beauty and energy of young life.

(Take a look: Do you have a cross like this in your house?)

"Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these." Luke 18:16

I remember once a pastor at St. Zepherin's in Wayland, asked the parents present, if they wanted their grandchildren to be Catholic.

"Of course!" We all thought. He quickly and wisely followed with, "Then it begins now, with your children."

There are no guarantees of course. We are fighting for children who have a whole world at their fingertips that often does not share our values. But as Kathleen so beautifully witnesses, we cultivate the soil and plant seeds, so that with the grace of God, in His time, they will bloom.

A little background on the Boston Sock Exchange: For one Burlington priest, a winter subway ride over 25 years ago spawned an entire ministry. On a snowy and slushy day in 1983, Father John Capuci, then a college freshman, happened to be on a Boston subway with a barefooted homeless male passenger. "His feet were all red and raw," Father Capuci recalled. "It really bothered me that mine were warm and his were like that." Concerned, he gave the man his socks. "I started the Sock Exchange and have been doing it ever since," he said. On occasion we are lucky enough to have blessing bags and the folks there just light up. Their very own things to carry with them from place to place. Some small luxury of things we seem to have plenty of. It is through efforts like this and lots of prayer that this ministry is a success.

SACRAMENTS: Our focus this month is on the Sacrament of Holy Orders. Fr. Thomas Richstatter, O.F.M., on page 100 of his book, *Sacraments: How Catholics Pray*, reminds us that all of the baptized particiate in the royal priesthood of Christ, as St. Peter tells us in his first letter "but you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood..." (1 Peter 2:9). Fr. Richstatter goes on to write about how, over time, the Church was "ordered", structured according to various ministries and groups; the bishops, priests and deacons are those who are ordained, in the sacrament of Holy Orders, to carry out specific ministries in the church (p. 100-102). As noted in our US Adult Catechism (http://ccc.usccb.org/flipbooks/uscca/#298), grace is given to those who are ordained through this sacrament to carry out their responsibilities in the church. Please contact the Rectory to register for Baptism Instruction. Please note that universal practice in the Catholic Church is that one man and one woman (other than the parents) serve as Godparents. Godparents must be at least 16 years old, Confirmed, regularly attending Sunday Mass, and otherwise living a life in harmony with the Catholic faith. They are to serve as Catholic role models for the child being baptized.

RCIA

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is an engaging program for individuals who desire to learn more about the Catholic faith. The program is a gradual process paced at the needs of the individual. RCIA welcomes anyone who seeks to be baptized into the Catholic Church. Also, anyone baptized in Christian tradition other than Roman Catholic who would like to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church is invited to attend. In addition, RCIA welcomes individuals who are baptized Catholics and have never received First Communion, First Reconciliation, or Confirmation. C.L.O.W.

The Children's Liturgy of the Word is a special celebration of the scriptures with readings from the Children's Lectionary. These readings are brought alive for the children using methods that include drama, props, and an interactive homily style. At St. Mary's, the C.L.O.W. is celebrated from mid-September through May

every Sunday at the 9:30 AM Mass. On most of these Sundays, the parish children are invited to process down to the lower church following the Opening Prayer. The exception is on the First Sunday of each month, when the children remain upstairs at the 9:30 a.m. Mass for a special Children's homily with the priest and the main assembly.
