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

The Five Stages in a "Fall" (Archbishop Fulton Sheen)

- * Neglect of prayer No soul ever fell away from God without giving up prayer. Prayer is that which establishes contact with DIVINE Power and opens the invisible resources of heaven. However dark the way, when we pray, temptation can never master us.
- * Substitution of action for prayer Most of us, feeling the necessity of doing something for God, turn to the solace of activity; instead of going from prayer to action. We neglect the prayer and become busy about many things. We think we are doing God's work, when we are only in motion or being fussy.
- * Luke warmness Experience proves that religious activity without prayer degenerates into indifference. Some believe one can be too religious, too zealous, or spend too much time in church.
- * The satisfaction of material wants, feelings and emotions The material begins to assert once the Divine fades in life. Too much leaning to luxury and refinement is an indication of inner poverty of the spirit. When we possess the treasure within, there is no need of those outer treasures that rust consumes, moths eat and thieves break through and steal. When the inner beauty is gone, we need luxuries to clothe our nakedness.
- * Human respect The last fall is human respect, when we deny our faith or are ashamed of it under ridicule or scorn. We no longer recognize our value and dignity as children of God.

Advent is an opportunity, with the help of Christ, to rise, to renew, to rediscover who we really are. By embracing daily prayer, we open the door of our hearts to Jesus, allowing Him to walk with us in every circumstance.

Finally, we meet Jesus in Holy Communion, taking our place once more at the Table of God's Children, and allowing Him to nourish us with the gift of His own divine Body and Blood. We are home.



From the Pastor's Desk

November 16, 2017 Feast of St. Margaret of Scotland

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

Very unusually, I recently had four emergency Anointing calls within the space of three days. All were beautiful in their way. But the call that left the deepest impression on me, was to a dying woman at a Nursing Home. She was a faithful participant in my monthly Mass there, fairly vigorous, who had a very sudden decline. When I arrived, she was no longer able to speak, but was alert – making the Sign of the Cross and nodding her desire for the Sacrament. She was, however, quite agitated, her hands and arms moving restlessly, her head turning from side to side, her lips groaning. This continued through our visit until I gave her the Apostolic Pardon. This is a special absolution from sin a priest may give to a dying person who cannot speak aloud to confess their sins.

The moment I spoke the words of absolution and made the Sign of the Cross over her, she was transformed. She gave a great sigh of relief, her limbs stopped moving, and a great peace seemed to come over her. She was still alive, and squeezed my hands when I left. But the agitation and restlessness were entirely gone. It was as though knowing she was forgiven allowed her to trust, to be at rest, and to face without fear her final passage to the Lord.

As I drove back from the Nursing Home, I felt so very humbled to have been part of this great gift of God's forgiveness. And as our thoughts now turn to Advent, I am reminded that the whole reason Jesus was born among us in Bethlehem was to give us this very gift. "You shall name him Jesus," said the angel to Joseph, "for he will save his people from their sins." (MT 1:21). Forgiveness of sin was the reason that Jesus was born, lived, suffered, died and rose for us. We experience it in the cleansing and lifegiving waters of Baptism, and then throughout our lives in the Sacrament of Confession.

One man who recognized the preciousness of Confession was St. Damien of Malachi. This heroic Belgian priest lived among the lepers of that colony, and ministered to them with selfless love and devotion until he himself contracted and died of leprosy. During all his years of privation, Father Damien said his greatest hardship was that since he was the only priest on Malachi, he could not go to Confession. By law, no one could set foot on the leper colony without having to remain. So when on very rare occasion a supply ship had a priest aboard, Father Damien would shout his confession from the beach up to the deck of the ship in order to receive absolution. Do we, who have the Sacrament of Confession so readily available to us, value it in the same way?

As we rush about buying gifts this Advent, let us make time to accept from Jesus the gift His very name represents, the gift He became a human being to make accessible to us. Let us confess our sins, and experience the fullness of God's healing, God's mercy, God's love.

THE SUNDAY MASS OBLIGATION FOR THE WEEKEND OF SAT., DEC. 23 & SUN., DEC. 24 REMAINS.

This year Catholics should therefore plan to attend Mass either Saturday Afternoon or Sunday Morning for the 4th Sunday of Advent, *in addition* to whatever Christmas Mass they attend.

Catholics who choose to attend Mass twice on Sunday – in the morning for Advent and then later that day for Christmas, are permitted to receive Communion twice in the same day.

St. Mary's full regular weekend Mass Schedule will be celebrated for the Fourth Sunday Of Advent:

Sat., Dec. 23 at 5 PM & 7:30 PM,

and Sun., Dec. 24 at 7:30 AM, 9:30 AM, & 11:30 AM.

EVANGELIZING FRIENDS AND RELATIVES AT CHRISTMAS: Suggestions Practical

We all have family members, friends, and neighbors who have become distant from Jesus Christ and His Church. We want to invite them to return but often do not feel comfortable doing so, or fear that we will offend them. Here are some simple suggestions to use during the seasons of Advent and Christmas:



During Advent: Pray and Invite

Pray! Pray! Pray! Start praying now for those you hope will return to Christ and His Church. Ask the Holy Spirit to give you the courage to invite family or friends to attend Mass with you. Many people are simply waiting for an invitation. When you do extend the invitation do so with sensitivity and tact. For example, say, "Our family is planning to attend the 4PM vigil Mass at St. Mary's. Would you [and your family] like to join us?"

At Christmas Mass: Smile and Move In

Christmas is the celebration of the great mystery of the Incarnation—the gift of God becoming man. When you encounter those who may not be "regulars," smile. Be a model of joy! Another way to be welcoming is to move to the center of the pew so that others may easily find a place to sit. Go even further by inviting people searching for seats to join you in the pew!


After Christmas: Gather and Celebrate

Many people find themselves away from home or perhaps struggling through difficult family situations during Christmas. Invite them to join you for your traditional Christmas celebrations when appropriate. Continue celebrating throughout the Christmas season by sharing in family and parish gatherings. It is a common custom to keep Christmas lights on until the celebration of the Magi's arrival before the infant Lord on January 6th, the "Epiphany" or "Little Christmas." This is also a way of observing the "Twelve Days of Christmas." Remember that your witness may well inspire a deepening sense of God's love and invitation.

Taking a Cross Walk

With Jack Evans, by Cathy Stenquist

"You don't know me, and I don't know you, but I sure would like to meet you"
"But I got a feeling if you and I could just sit down and talk...two plain ordinary
human beings... I feel that we might think a great deal alike".

Kneeling in the quiet, I asked God to help me find the stories he needed telling. Pushing back in my seat I spied Jack slipping into the front pew. There would be comfort in taking my first Cross Walk with Jack, as we had been members of Arise several years ago at St. Mary's, so after Mass I invited him to walk with me. We agreed to meet the following Friday at Mass. A perfect start, I thought.

Heading toward the library, we passed a stained-glass window which was propped open. To my delight, looking through to the pavement, I spied a cross. "Jack, you have to see this!" I called to him. He turned around to take a look. "I guess that's our cross today," he added with a smile. (Cross Photo Next Page)

As we pulled out the chairs, I pointed out a cross I saw in the shelves near the bibles and we laughed. Neither of us knew where this Cross Walk would lead; but any anxiety on my part, dissipated as Jack smiled and his heartfelt story unfolded. He recalled being an altar boy and saying the rosary everyday with his family of 10. He added honestly, "Often times, I went through the motions, though I would really rather have been out playing baseball!"

At age 11, he heard a song called "Letter to Ivan" by Jimmy Dean about Russia and the Cold War. "We were supposed to hate the Russians," Jack said, "but instead I was deeply moved by the lyrics of this song and I wept." This strong sense of empathy stayed with him, and as we took our next steps, I could actually hear how this humble song had impacted his life, faith and actions.

In 1963, inspired by Pope John XXIII's call for Americans to go to South America, Jack's parents courageously packed up their 8 children and moved to Argentina to preach the Gospel and help the poor. Jack, age 12, had some fear initially, seeing the devastation of how the poor lived and getting accustomed to speaking a different language. He definitely was not in his comfort zone. They lived in simple, humble, low cost housing. As the children began playing together, his parents got to know the other families and began their outreach.

He had many challenging and meaningful experiences in Argentina, such as: using his English and altar boy skills to help an Argentinian nun who ran the American Chapel, taking a train to a Buenos Aires slum to help build a dispensary for medication and shoveling crushed rock into a pit to build a new outhouse.

"One day, my brother Rich, fell ill with a bad stomach ache," He said, "A local doctor came and pressed and prodded but could find nothing wrong. My mother urgently asked me to find a phone and call the McClouds, local friends who might have a car to get Rich to the hospital. I ran to the only pay phone in town, at the local fire station. I reached into my pocket and pulled out a peso, but it would not go in the slot. Another man banged hard on the phone and got a dial tone. Mr. McCloud answered the call and was able to drive my brother to a British Hospital for treatment. It turned out Rich's appendix had ruptured and he easily could have died. The amazing thing is that Mr. McCloud's phone had been broken and out of order for some time, but miraculously, God helped it work for this one phone call, and it never worked again!"

Later, back in the states, tragedy struck. In 1969, 2 days after graduation from High School, Jack was riding in a car with five others when there was a terrible car crash. His two sisters, Connie and Cindy, and two others were killed, Jack ended up in a body cast for 6 months and his best friend, Dennis severed his spinal cord and had become paralyzed. "It was what it was," Jack added, "I tried to make the most of what I did have. My friend Dennis is doing great now. He was my best man at my wedding and is my daughter Colleen's godfather."

During this time, Jack met Dianne, his wife of 46 years. In 1967, just back from Argentina, his sister Connie had joined Vista, which was like an American Peace Corp. There she got to know Dianne through a mutual seminarian friend at the

Oblate Seminary in Springfield Mass. While Jack recovered, Dianne along with other friends, would come and keep him company, sharing music and keeping his spirits up. There, she charmed his mother Ginny, who encouraged their relationship. "When are you guys going to wake up?" She would ask. "Being the obedient son, I did!" Jack laughed. A few years later they were married. They have one daughter Colleen who blessed them with a grandson Derek, now 16.



In the years after the car accident, Jack continued to be a survivor, overcoming four distinct kinds of cancer during his life: Hodgkin's Lymphoma, Prostate Cancer, Melanoma and Lung Cancer. And then in 2013, he suffered a stroke on the first day of their summer vacation. "God keeps sticking his fork in me and saying, 'Nope, not done yet!' and throwing me back," he joked.

"I had been working in New Jersey commuting back and forth each week," Jack shared, "which had been very stressful. Diane and I went camping. During a heat wave, I began to feel dizzy, so I went to our car to lay down. When Diane came to check on me, my face was drooping." He added, "My life was defined by my music and my guitar. It was a big adjustment. I miss playing the guitar. "He passed his guitars on to his nephew and grandson and enjoys mentoring them. Any given Saturday, you can find Jack playing tambourine and maracas at the 5:00 PM Mass. "Leo Racine and the Choir have become like family to me and are so supportive," he shared.

I was so touched to learn how much it means to Jack to attend daily Mass. "I have tried to attend since I was 13 years old. It feels like a calling to me." Asked why he tries to attend everyday, Jack replies, "I want to be a good person and being there helps me."

Inspired by the 'Dear Ivan', Jack's outreach to people of different cultures continues. He doesn't just build a bridge; he takes the first steps too. He has taken the time to learn 'thank you' in Vietnamese and Egyptian Farsi to thank those who help him. While volunteering at Whittier Rehab, he encouraged a Hindu man to do his reps, by learning himself, to count to 15 in the man's native language.

"I have a strong desire to help people feel welcomed and valued for who they are. "Its my way of of letting people know they are truly appreciated." When Jack worked at a driving school, his boss assigned to him the people who could not speak English. In order to form a bridge with his clients, he would have them teach him numbers in their native language while they were taking their lesson. Over the years he recorded phonetically in his notebook how to say the numbers "1,2,3" in 21 different languages: English, French, German, Italian, Sri Lankan, Cantonese, Mandarin, Hebrew and Russian to name a few.

Looking forward to this Christmas, the Evans family will enjoy another traditional gathering at his mother's home. "I was always the music man, singing Rudolph and other songs. Once again, we'll sing the 12 Days of Christmas with each person taking a part and Derek will play the trumpet." He and Dianne are looking forward to it.

The ability to understand and share the feelings of another, truly has become the thread that continues to weave in and out of Jack's life. I am so thankful to Jack for taking this first Cross Walk with me. I have been touched by his stories. As I read the lyrics of "Dear Ivan" today, I realized Jack is on the right track. Through his simple outreach to understand, connect with and love others, he is making the world a better place - number by number, word by word. Imagine if each of us did the same? When I see Jack in that front pew or playing his tambourine now, I will feel a little more connected to him. He has taught me much on our walk together; about carrying your cross with trust and faith and being Christ to all we meet. After all, we're all in this together. Thank you Jack.



SEASONS AND READINGS: In the month of December we celebrate the season of **Advent** and begin the season of **Christmas**. Advent is about our yearning for fulfillment in God's time and the Advent Old Testament readings remind us of our need for God, a God who molds, comforts, heals and dwells with us. We hear from John the Baptist who proclaims the Lord's coming and then from Mary who, in response to her visit from the angel Gabriel, simply, yet profoundly, says "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Christmas is a celebration of Jesus' incarnation, *Emmanuel* or God with us. The readings on Christmas remind us that God has sent us His great light, Jesus, to dwell with us; we hear again, and are facinated by, the story of Jesus' birth. After Christmas, the celebration continues as we remember the Holy Innocents and the Holy Family, along with the first martyr, Saint Stephen. SACRAMENTS: The Eucharist is the third sacrament of Initiation and is the "source and summit" of our Christian life (Lumen Gentium #11). In a book entitled The Sacraments: How Catholics Pray, Thomas Richstatter, OFM writes that the Eucharist is best understood by reflecting on all of the Paschal Mystery: banquet (Holy Thursday), sacrifice (Good Friday) and the unity of all creation (Easter) [p. 56]. We often refer to the Eucharist as Communion, as the Body of Christ. St. Augustine says that we ought to pray that we become what we eat; this is the real definition of communion, our unity as the Body of Christ. Please contact the Rectory to register for Baptism Instruction. Please note that universal practice in the Catholic Church is that one man and one woman (other than the parents) serve as Godparents. Godparents must be at least 16 years old, Confirmed, regularly attending Sunday Mass, and otherwise living a life in harmony with the Catholic faith. They are to serve as Catholic role models for the child being baptized.

RCIA

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is an engaging program for individuals who desire to learn more about the Catholic faith. The program is a gradual process paced at the needs of the individual. RCIA welcomes anyone who seeks to be baptized into the Catholic Church. Also, anyone baptized in Christian tradition other than Roman Catholic who would like to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church is invited to attend. In addition, RCIA welcomes individuals who are baptized Catholics and have never received First Communion, First Reconciliation, or Confirmation. C.L.O.W.

The Children's Liturgy of the Word is a special celebration of the scriptures with readings from the Children's Lectionary. These readings are brought alive for the children using methods that include drama, props, and an interactive homily style. At St. Mary's, the C.L.O.W. is celebrated from mid-September through May

every Sunday at the 9:30 AM Mass. On most of these Sundays, the parish children are invited to process down to the lower church following the Opening Prayer. The exception is on the First Sunday of each month, when the children remain upstairs at the 9:30 a.m. Mass for a special Children's homily with the priest and the main assembly.
