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Saint Mary's, Holliston, Leads the Entire Archdiocese in the 2019 Catholic Appeal!

There are 284 Parishes in the Archdiocese of Boston. As of Wednesday, March 27, St. Mary's Parish was one of only nine of them to have reached or exceeded their 2019 Catholic Appeal goal. Out of those nine, St. Mary's was the parish with the highest percentage over goal - at 109%. It has since risen to 114% (as of April 1).

It is worth noting that in the history of our parish, St. Mary's has never before reached her Catholic Appeal goal in only four weeks.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper recalls the events the night before Jesus died, especially the institution of the Holy Eucharist. The ceremony of the washing of the feet reminds us of Jesus' call to serve one another. The Mass concludes with a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the altar of repose in Father Haley Hall, where Adoration will continue until 10:30 PM. At Mass a collection will be taken up for the Holliston Food Pantry.

The 7:00 PM Lord's Passion Celebration is the official Good Friday Liturgy that continues the three day Triduum Celebration begun on Holy Thursday and concluding at Easter. It consists of the Liturgy of the Passion, Veneration of the Cross, and Holy Communion. The Noon Stations are designed for younger children K – Grade 5, (accompanied by parents), and utilize a living tableau and special station prayers to help young children discover Jesus' love for them in the here and now.

Good Friday is a day of fasting and abstinence from meat. In every single Catholic parish around the world this day, a collection is taken up to maintain the Shrines and struggling Christian communities in the Holy Land. This collection is taken up at both the Stations and Passion Services.

The Church rejoices in a special way to receive new members this night through the Sacraments of Initiation. All Easter collections go to support the retired priests of our Archdiocese. From the Pastor's Desk

April 7, 2019, 5th Sunday of Lent

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

Even as we prepare to celebrate the great Feast of New Life on Easter Day, many in our community have been shaken by the recent death of a prominent and much-loved citizen by their own hand. Any passing has its sorrow, but when this happens there is an additional pain. We wonder what we missed, or if we could have done something to avert the tragedy. While we are always called to a compassionate awareness of each other, the reality is that even the most loving of families and the most faithful of friends can be taken unawares by the sadness of suicide.

One of the hard truths of life is that no matter how much we may care and share - none of us really knows another in the deepest sense. Only God can do that. And He does do that. "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you," said the Lord to Jeremiah. This is an important reminder that God knows us from the inside out. Our thoughts, our desires, our fears, our deepest longings - God knows them all, even better than we do ourselves. And from that knowledge flows a mercy wider than our human imagining can grasp. There is an old French proverb which states, "To know all, is to forgive all." It means that if we could really know another person – their experiences, their motivations, the circumstances behind their choices – then we could forgive them anything. Just as God can forgive anything. God Who knows us, and loves us, with a Father's love.

All human life is precious and sacrosanct, thus the taking of any human life, even one's own, is contrary to God's law. But the Church always presumes that someone who does this is not in their right mind – having lost the clarity and freedom required for a morally culpable choice. It is so easy to see, for instance, that if one actually realized the impact that such a choice would have on those they leave behind, they would never have made it. Above all, the Church believes in the awesome mercy of God, and leaves all judgment to Him.

A beautiful example of this truth is found in the story of a man who took his life by jumping off a bridge and drowning in the river below. His fellow villagers were very upset, and came to see the Curé d'Ars, St. John Vianney, to ask him what he believed was the fate of the drowned man's soul. St. John was silent a moment, then said, "I believe, that between the bridge and the water – he repented, and God forgave him."

If you have lost a friend or family member to suicide, pray for them. Open your heart also to God to tell Him how you are feeling – even if it be anger toward God, the departed, or yourself. God knows already what you are experiencing – He feels your sorrow as His own. But by giving voice to it in prayer, you are inviting God into your heart, where slowly – in ways you cannot yet imagine – He will restore peace and hope again. That is what the gift of Easter is all about.







A Cross Walk from Good Friday to Easter

"Unless there is a Good Friday in your life, there can be no Easter." Fulton J. Sheen

My passion for finding crosses began years ago while sitting alone in a court room on a wooden bench covered with graffiti and week-old chewing gum. In the middle of a very, very difficult situation, I could hardly breathe. Bowing my head, I exhaled and asked God to walk with me. The murmur and chatter in the room seemed to fade away. Lifting my eyes up, the shape of a cross appeared to me in the design of the wood paneling. I began to weep. Just when I needed it, just when my own cross felt too heavy to bear, God showed me that He was walking right beside me.

As the days unfolded, wounds began to heal, but the weight of my cross still hung over me. I began looking for more crosses for comfort. The more I looked, the more I found. They appeared at moments of weakness and doubt, or as a reminder to say thank you for prayers answered.



Through the years, crosses became such a source of comfort and strength to me, that I began collecting pictures of them and soon had well over one hundred! I wanted to share them and teach others to

look for the crosses in their own lives so an Instagram account called "findingcrosses" was created where I could post them with a bit of faithful inspiration.

It thrills me that people I do not know, from all over are learning to look for crosses and hopefully feeling God's presence in their lives.

"Though I should walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil. For thou art with me." Psalm 23

When I am going through a tough time in my life, I try to think of it as my "Good Friday," and try to remember that Easter is soon to follow. God has been there; fully divine, yet fully human, experiencing the many feelings of loss, loneliness, frustration and grief that I have felt.

Father Horan says in his book, *The Last Words of Jesus:* A Meditation on Love and Suffering; "Though we are faithful people, there is the common journey of a 'back and forth,' of trust and then questioning, fear and then comfort, anxiety and then reassurance we all have taken with our faith in the darkest of hours. While we can understand at a more superficial level how God loves us and will be with us, when life takes an unexpected turn, in our humanity we like Jesus may have that moment of abandonment. Trying to understand how we find ourselves in this situation and wondering how it will end."

I have always felt strongly that you should teach your children about this Paschal Mystery, knowing it will provide the means to get them through life's difficulties. In one of my Religious Ed classes at St. Mary's, we brainstormed about what our "Good Fridays" were, when things looked darkest and most hopeless i.e. a friend moving away, not making the team at school, someone getting ill. We talked about waiting; how tough it can be for time to go by so slowly without an answer and needing to depend on our faith, filling our moments of doubt with prayer.

Finally, I reminded them that after every "Good Friday" in our lives comes an "Easter." That they will find over time, that some good, some blessing will come from their experience and not always in the way they might expect. We then brainstormed about what an "Easter" might look like i.e. meeting a new neighbor, finding another opportunity opens up that is a better fit, or having the chance to serve others.

At the end of class, I handed them each a dry withered bulb, signifying their Good Friday, and reassured them that with a little faith, trust and patience, what seemed hopeless and lifeless would bloom into a beautiful Easter moment for them.

There is Cause for Rejoicing here. 1 Peter 1

Eight years ago, I unexpectedly received a cross of my own. I was being transferred to another manager who, my current manager told me "did not want to take me and my position on"; a terrible and unprofessional thing for a manager to tell you. Though I knew going in, I was

not wanted, I continued to do my best as I always had, but despite this, my cross got increasingly heavier and I was let go.

Honestly, this did not in any way, shape or form feel like a <u>Good</u> Friday. I felt abandoned and confused, disappointed and angry. I looked to God for strength and he provided. Very quickly He showed me why I needed to leave that company.

In the following months, so many things happened in succession that it became laughable to my husband, Scott and I.

- -My father was diagnosed with a terrible degenerative disease and my mother, primary caregiver, needed my support through major surgeries, selling a large part of their estate and moving them across two states.
- -My mother-in-law got very ill and needing care, eventually passing. Her home required a full renovation and her estate needed to be settled.
- -My daughter was diagnosed with thyroid cancer and needed my full time attention.

And others incidents too numerous to mention made me feel like Job! I think even beyond being needed to help with these tough things, God knew I was not using my gifts in the way that He needed.

Having some time to reflect on my situation lead me from depression to finally getting up the courage to start writing again. Within 3 months I was a published author in Chicken Soup for the Soul - Hope and Miracles and have been published



several times since. The journey has not been easy by any means, but with my faith and the assurance of God's presence I am making my way. The cross that felt so heavy became a tool to carve and shape me into someone a bit wiser, stronger, and with a deeper faith and to put me right where God needed me. Carrying your cross is never easy, but remember when you have a moment of weakness, even Christ fell three times carrying His. Its not the falling, its the asking for help and getting back up again.

In a very short few days, we will be approaching Holy Week and three of my favorite days of the Liturgical Year- the Triduum. This word which means "three days" is at the very core of our faith. As the USCCB website states:

The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum—from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery. The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the



Lenten season, and leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil.

The liturgical services that take place during the Triduum are:

- Holy Thursday: Mass of the Lord's Supper
- Good Friday of the Lord's Passion
- Holy Saturday: Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord

Here are some ideas to share the cross with your family:

- The Triduum is such a rich experience. Over the three days, we travel with Christ to the Last Supper when he gave us the Eucharist. We watch as Fr. Mark, representing Christ, kneels to wash the feet of his sheep. We process to the Hall and wait in quiet adoration just as Christ waited in the Garden of Gethsemane. On Good Friday, we arrive at dusk in silence and truly feel the magnitude of the cross as "Were you there?" is softly sung. On Holy Saturday, the darkness, is pierced by the candlelight, which grows as flames are shared through the church. Finally, we celebrate that He is risen, that Light has overcome the darkness. I hope you can come.
- Go on a walk in the woods, downtown or in your neighborhood and find some crosses of your own. (FYI St. Mary's has many. Just look around at Mass!) Let it be a way to open conversation about Easter.
- Plant some spring bulbs with your children and rejoice when they rise to new life.

SUNDAY READINGS: This month presents us with a variety of liturgical moods. We complete our Lenten journey, commemorate Holy Week and the Paschal Triduum, celebrate Easter Sunday and begin the Easter season. Where do we focus? We first point out that we hear two versions of the Passion every year. On Palm Sunday we hear the Passion from the Liturgical Year's Gospel; this year it's Luke. We listen to the Passion according to John on Good Friday. Our second note is that every year during the Easter Season, our first reading on Sundays is from the Acts of the Apostles; we always read from John's gospel as well. This year, all of the second readings in the Easter season are from the book of Revelation. For lots of information about the Bible, go to Felix Just, SJ's website at http://catholic-resources.org/.
