Dear Good People of St. Mary's,

Even as we enter our final weeks of preparation for Easter, our world has been touched by the darkness of war. Our brothers and sisters in Ukraine have experienced horrific suffering; their peaceful nation invaded; their people indiscriminately slain.

We ask God to gather to Himself those killed in this conflict. We ask consolation for their loved ones, and swift healing for those injured. And we recommit ourselves to the belief that ALL HUMAN LIFE IS SACRED. Without reference to nationality, politics, age, health, race, or other distinction.

There have been moments of light in this dark time. The heroic defense of the Ukrainian homeland against a much more powerful foe. The outpouring of prayers and material support from neighboring countries. Here at St. Mary's, we dedicated our annual 40 Hours Devotion to the intention of Peace in Ukraine. And our parish raised over \$5,000 for Ukraine War Victim Relief.

Even so, it would be easy to despair in such times as these. Will we never be free of violence and atrocities? Will children never be safe to grow up unthreatened by guns and bombs? Will human civilization never achieve a true state of brotherhood where equality, peace, and justice hold sway?

Let us take comfort that even Jesus felt overwhelmed in the Garden of Gethsemane, facing the bitter chalice of suffering. He was truly one of us, and the temptation to surrender to darkness is one we all face sooner or later.

Jesus overcame His moment of trial by prayer. He told His Heavenly Father humbly and honestly of the turmoil in His heart. He spoke of His doubts, His desires, and His fears. And having offered all of that to God, He then said, "Not my will, but Thy will be done."

In just the same way, we are called to prayerfully invite God into the darkness of our lives. He knows our every fear, sorrow, and depression. But when we share with Him as Jesus did, we open the way for God to bring His grace to bear. So that we are not destroyed, but tempered by our trials. So that our hope remains alive.

When evil seems triumphant in the world, it is easy to feel that our hope is misplaced. But in this season above all we remember that Jesus' story did not end with the darkness of Good Friday. That on the Cross, Jesus gathered unto Himself all the suffering and death this world contains. And three days later, defeated it in the glorious light of His Resurrection.

Easter means that the final victory belongs to Christ. This allows us to strive towards the light even in the blackest moments. This allows us to say with St. Paul, "Death where is your victory, death where is your sting?"

May light and hope be God's gifts to you and your family this Easter.

May I love, seek, and attain only that which is good. May I wish for all men's happiness and envy none. May I never rejoice in the ill-fortune of one who has wronged me.


When I have done or said what is wrong, may I never wait for the rebuke of others, but always rebuke myself until I make amends. May I win no victory that harms either me or my opponent.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper recalls the events the night before Jesus died, especially the institution of the Holy Eucharist. The ceremony of the washing of the feet reminds us of Jesus' call to serve one another. The Mass concludes with a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the altar of repose in Father Haley Hall, where Adoration will continue until 10:30 PM. At Mass a collection will be taken up for the Holliston Food Pantry.

7 PM <u>Celebration of the Lord's Passion</u>

The 7:00 PM Lord's Passion Celebration is the official Good Friday Liturgy that continues the three day Triduum Celebration begun on Holy Thursday and concluding at Easter. It consists of the Liturgy of the Passion, Veneration of the Cross, and Holy Communion. The Noon Stations are designed for younger children K – Grade 5, (accompanied by parents), and utilize a living tableau and special station prayers to help young children discover Jesus' love for them in the here and now.

Good Friday is a day of fasting and abstinence from meat. In every single Catholic parish around the world this day, a collection is taken up to maintain the Shrines and struggling Christian communities in the Holy Land. This collection is taken up at both the Stations and Passion Services.

8 PM The Great Easter Vigil (brass quartet, adult choir)

The Great Easter Vigil is rightly called the "Mother" of all liturgies. The Church rejoices in a special way to receive new members this night through the Sacraments of Initiation. All Easter collections go to support the retired priests of our Archdiocese. 

Walk With the Lord From Palm Sunday to the Easter Vigil

At the heart of our faith is the Paschal Mystery: the Passion, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension of Jesus Christ. All of salvation history leads up to and goes forth from these saving events. The week starting on Palm Sunday and continuing to Easter is called Holy because it is when Jesus' public ministry culminates with his suffering, death and resurrection.

What follows is a brief description of each day of Holy Week. It is hoped that you might read it each day of this week. Prayerfully walk with Jesus in his most difficult and yet glorious week. Plan to attend some or all of the special liturgies of Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday and Saturday at your parish. By celebrating them in community, we make them present today and learn again, in a new way, the reality of our Risen Lord alive in our midst.

APRIL 10 ~ PALM SUNDAY: Our celebration of Holy Week began Sunday as we remembered and made present the triumphal entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem to begin His final week and initiate His Passion. All four Gospels recount this triumphant entry that Sunday morning so long ago, but made present to us on this day. As you received your palms, I hope you considered that you are part of that vast crowd. How will you journey with Jesus this week? Let the palm remind you to praise Him with your prayerful presence during the sacred Triduum. According to Mark 11:11, Jesus returned that evening to Bethany, a suburb of Jerusalem. Perhaps He stayed with his friends Martha, Mary, and Lazarus. Pray with Jesus as He considers the difficult days ahead of Him.



APRIL 11 ~ MONDAY OF HOLY WEEK: According to Matthew 21, Mark 11, and Luke 19, Jesus returns to Jerusalem today and, seeing shameful practices in the Temple area, He cleanses the Temple. John's Gospel also records that He rebuked the unbelief of the crowds. Mark 11:19 records that He returned to Bethany that night. Pray with Jesus as He is zealous to purify us.

APRIL 12 ~ **TUESDAY OF HOLY WEEK:** According to Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Jesus again returns to Jerusalem where He is confronted by the Temple leadership for what He did the day before. They question His authority. He also teaches extensively, using parables and other forms. There is the parable of the vineyard (cf Mt 21:33-46) and the parable of the wedding banquet, (cf Mt. 22:1). There is also the teaching on paying taxes (cf Mt 22:15) and the rebuke of the Sadducees who deny the resurrection (cf Mt. 22:23). There is also the fearful prophecy about the destruction of Jerusalem if the inhabitants do not come to faith in Him. He warns that not one stone will be left on another (cf Mt 24). Continue to pray with Jesus and listen carefully to His final teachings just before His passion.

APRIL 13 ~ **WEDNESDAY OF HOLY WEEK:** Traditionally this day was called "Spy Wednesday" because it was on this Wednesday before the crucifixion that Judas conspired to hand Jesus over. For this he was paid 30 pieces of silver (cf Mt. 26:14). Jesus likely spent the day in Bethany. In the evening, Mary of Bethany anoints Jesus with costly perfumed oil. Judas objects but Jesus rebukes him and says Mary has anointed Him for his burial! (cf Mt 26:6). The wicked are besetting Jesus and plotting against Him. Are you praying?



APRIL 14 ~ **HOLY THURSDAY:** This marks the beginning of the sacred Triduum, or "three days." Earlier this day Jesus had given instructions to the disciples on how to prepare for this most holy meal, which will be His last supper. Through the day they make these preparations (cf Mt 26:17). In the Mass of the Lord's Supper conducted at our parishes, we remember and make present that Last Supper which Jesus shared with His disciples. We are in the upper room with Jesus and the Apostles and do what they did. Through the ritual of washing the feet (Jn 13:1) of 12 parishioners, we unite in service to one another.

Through our celebration of this first Mass and Holy Eucharist (Mt 26:26), we unite ourselves to Jesus and receive His Body and Blood as if for the first time. At this Eucharist, we especially thank God for His gift of the ministerial priesthood. After the Last Supper (First Mass), the apostles and Jesus made a short journey across the Kidron Valley to the Garden, where He asks them to pray and He experiences his agony (cf Mt 26:30). We too will process in Church with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament to a garden (the altar of repose) which has been prepared. The liturgy ends in silence. It is an ancient custom to spend an hour before the reposed Blessed Sacrament tonight. We are with Jesus in the Garden and pray as He goes through His agony. Most of our parish churches remain open until close to midnight. It was near Midnight that Jesus was betrayed by Judas, was arrested and taken to the house of the High Priest (cf Mt. 26:47).



APRIL 15 ~ **GOOD FRIDAY:** All through the night Jesus has been locked in the dungeon of the high priest's house. Early this morning He was brought before Pilate who transferred His case to Herod. Herod sent Him back to Pilate who, sometime in the mid-morning, bowed to the pressure of the Temple leadership and the crowds, and condemned Jesus to a horrible death by crucifixion.

In the late morning Jesus was taken by the soldiers through the city and up the hillside of Golgotha. By noon He is nailed to the cross where He hangs in agony for some three hours. He dies around three in the afternoon. He is taken down from the cross and placed in the tomb hastily before sundown. Today is a day of prayer, fasting and abstinence. Whenever possible, Christians are urged to keep today free of work, of social engagements, of entertainment, and to devote themselves to communal prayer and worship.

At noon many parishes gather for stations of the cross for recollections of the seven last words of Jesus. Many parishes also offer stations of the cross at 3 PM, the hour of Jesus' death. In the evening, we gather quietly in our parish churches to enter into time of prayer as we reflect on Jesus' death on the cross. We also pray for the needs of the world. To acknowledge the power of the cross in our lives today, we one by one come forward to venerate the cross with a kiss. Our hunger from this day of fasting is satisfied with Holy Communion distributed at the end of this liturgy. Consider, too, how the apostles might have gathered that night together in fear and prayer reflecting on all that happened.



Holy Saturday: The body of Jesus is in the tomb but His soul is among the dead to announce the kingdom. The hour is coming, and now is when the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God, and those who hear it will live (John 5:25). Consider what it must have been like for the dead in Sheol to awaken to the voice of Jesus!



APRIL 16 ~ **HOLY SATURDAY:** Meanwhile, the Disciples, heartbroken at the death of Jesus, observed the Jewish Sabbath in sorrow. They had forgotten the promise of Jesus that He would rise. We cannot forget His promise. We cannot forget. Tonight in our parishes after sundown we gather for the Great Easter Vigil where we will experience Jesus rising from the dead. We gather in darkness and light the Easter fire which reminds us that Jesus is light in the darkness. He is the light of the world.

We enter into the church and attentively listen to Bible stories describing God's saving work of the past. Suddenly, the church lights are lit and the Gloria is sung as we celebrate the moment of Christ's resurrection. He Lives! In the joy of the resurrection we then celebrate the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and

Eucharist for our Catechumens and Candidates who have prepared for many weeks for this night. As a Church we sing "Alleluia" for the first time in 40 days. Do everything you can to be present on this evening and invite friends and family to join. Our vigil ushers in an Easter joy that never ends!

SNOWSHOE BACKPACKING TRIP IN THE WHITE

MOUNTAINS: For the eighth time in nine years (one year off due to COVID), thirteen Scouts and leaders collected their gear, including multiple layers of clothing, micro-spikes and snowshoes, and headed to the White Mountains to hike eight miles over two days in 36"+ of snow and ice. The four-hour hike with an elevation gain of 1800' up the Nineteen Mile Brook Trail on that Friday, February 25 started out snowing and 15 degrees. By the time the Troop arrived at this year's destination, Carter Notch AMC Hut, they were hiking in 8" of fresh snow and temps barely reaching 10 degrees. The hut provided shelter for the night, but they had to put their cold weather camping skills to use as there was no heat or electricity in the bunk hut. The reward came the next morning when the bright sun rose over Carter Dome and a deep blue sky greeted the Scouts as they made breakfast, held a prayer service and enjoyed the hike down through the beautiful winter wonderland. An adventure that will live in our memories for many years.





EAGLE PROJECT: After months of developing his proposal, getting approvals and planning, on March 13 six Troop 14 Scouts and leaders helped Andrew McWilliams work on his Eagle Project. 

"FAITH SPEAKING" VOLUMES: This month's recommend book is *The Whole Language: The Power of Extravagant Tenderness*, by Gregory Boyle, S.J. This is Fr. Boyle's third book based on his experience of working with gang members in Los Angeles, California; the previous two books focus on compassion and radical kinship. In *The Whole*

Language, Fr. Boyle tells us that it is our "lifelong task to refine our view of God" (p. 12). He goes on to say that "we won't be able to speak the whole language of God until we know the wholeness of God" (p. 12). Experiencing God as incarnation (the holy, God, is everywhere in the here and now) and relationship (God longs for us and loves us with great tenderness) "propels" us out into the world to speak the whole language. It's a great challenge to take what we may have felt in private (love, experienced as tenderness) and make it public. Furthering this point, Fr. Boyle quotes Cornel West on page 220: "Justice is what love looks like in public". What does this have to do with God and us? We read near the end of the book that "we receive the tender glance, then we become it" (p. 223). The extravagant tenderness, the unconditional love we receive from God, we share with others...this is justice, this is the whole language. This book is available through the Minuteman Library system as well as from online booksellers.

EARTH DAY: The theme for Earth Day 2022 (April 22) is <u>Invest In Our Planet</u>. And the question for all of us is: what will you do? SUNDAY READINGS: The Sunday readings this month span our experience of Lent (April 3), Holy Week (Palm Sunday is on April 10) and Easter. In the readings on April 3, we are invited, perhaps even challenged, to see that God is doing something new; we just have to perceive it...and accept it. Palm Sunday's readings plunge us into the spirit of Holy Week, as we read the great hymn from St. Paul's letter to the Philipians and St. Luke's rendering of the Passion. Then we have Easter, the joy-filled high point of our Catholic liturgical life, on April 17, followed by Divine Mercy Sunday (April 24). This is a month of varied moods and reflections. You can prepare for all the Sunday readings at https://liturgy.slu.edu/.

SERVANT SONGS: Readings from Isaiah's Servant Songs are part of our liturgies of Palm Sunday and Good Friday. Isaiah was a prophet of the Old Testament, and the book of Isaiah, often considered to be authored by both Isaiah and his followers, is one that is frequently referenced throughout the liturgical year. For thoughtful commentaries and questions for reflection on all four servant songs (we hear songs/poems three and four during Holy Week), see https://bit.ly/UKNewmanServant, which is sponsored by the Catholic Newman Center/Holy Spirit Parish at the University of Kentucky. Another source of information about the Servant Songs is the Bible Project, a Christian educational technology company whose goal is to "help people to experience the Bible as a unified story that leads to Jesus" (Bible Project website). YEAR OF THE EUCHARIST: On Holy Thursday, April 14, we celebrate Jesus' institution of the sacrament of the Eucharist. The Holy Thursday Evening Mass begins the celebration of the Paschal Triduum, the most sacred three days of the Church calendar. (Please note that in our Archdiocese, the Chrism Mass is not held on Holy Thursday, but rather is held earlier in the week.)
