May 30, 2021 Feast of the Most Holy Trinity

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

This weekend we honor the men and women who have laid down their lives in defense of our nation's freedom; as well as those now serving in our military. No matter our feelings about any particular military conflict, we can all agree that we owe a debt of gratitude to those who put the preservation of these United States before their own safety. As Jesus Himself said, "There is no greater love than this, to lay down one's life for a friend." We therefore invoke this Memorial Day God's blessings on all our nation's veterans. For those who have died, we ask God's mercy and peace. For those present among us, we ask His strength and constant support. For those servicemen and women currently under arms, we ask His strong protection. May God protect them even as they protect us. And may their efforts lead to a lasting, and just peace in the world.

One God, existing as three distinct persons, sharing the same divine nature. This is the great mystery celebrated by today's Feast of the Holy Trinity, a truth revealed in Sacred Scripture but impossible for the mind to fully comprehend. Over the centuries, many illustrations have been offered for the Holy Trinity – an equilateral triangle, the shamrock, three musical notes making a single chord of sound, just to name a few.

Ultimately, all examples fall short. But while we may never fully grasp the mystery of the Trinity, there is one very important truth that it reveals. Our God, even in His inmost being, is a God of relationships. What are Father and Son if not titles that speak to us of relationship, the Holy Spirit in all love flowing from them both? And if our God is first and foremost a God who relates, even within Himself, then it should not surprise us that in order to draw close to Him, we also must enter into relationships. Truly this is the most basic premise of the Church, the belief that we can draw closer to God as a community of faith than we could ever do as isolated individuals. The Church, a body of believers entering into relationships of mutual love, faith, and support is in one sense an image of the Trinity.

The fact that relationships are key in drawing close to God was clearly expressed in Jesus' answer to the question, "What is the greatest commandment?" Jesus said, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like unto it: Love your neighbor as yourself." Jesus is asked to name one commandment, but He answers with two commandments that are inseparable – love God and love your neighbor. The first is not possible without the second, as the Triune God is relational. Whenever therefore we seek to build community, to extend ourselves selflessly to each other in love, we are acting in a Trinitarian manner.

Sacramental Marriage has sometimes been expressed as a reflection of Trinitarian love in that it consists of husband, wife, and the Lord. Appropriately, I will have the privilege this afternoon of celebrating the Marriage of Sarah Barry, (daughter of Deacon John and Diane Barry), to Justin Palazzo. Please pray that they will be richly blessed as their human love is now united to the divine, eternal love which is God Himself.

On this weekend when many pandemic restrictions are being relaxed for those already vaccinated, let us all commit ourselves to the work of outreach and the rebuilding our parish family of faith.

TODAY - Emergency COVID Special Collection for the Church in India and Brazil



Dear Friends In Christ,

As you may know, there is immense suffering and loss of life occurring in India and Brazil due to the pandemic. The Catholic Church, through Catholic Relief Services (CRS), is on the ground in those countries working to support local hospitals and programs which are being overwhelmed and which have reached a breaking point.

Given our own experience in the United States with regards to the pandemic and the important role the Church has in being able to respond to global events, we have an opportunity to assist relief efforts in India and Brazil. With that in mind, Cardinal Seán has authorize an **Emergency COVID Special Collection for the Church in India and Brazil** to be taken the weekend of May 29-30 in all parishes in the Archdiocese of Boston.

The size and scope of the crisis is enormous. In India more 24 million cases have been reported with deaths surpassing 260,000. In Brazil, cases have surpassed 15 million while more than 428,000 deaths have been reported. This global pandemic is both historic and devastating in its impact. More than 161 million cases have been reported and with than 3.3 million deaths.

To participate, parishioners may also address a check to St. Mary's Parish, with "India and Brazil Relief" in the memo. Ideally, the checks might also be in a separate envelope labelled "India and Brazil Relief, through this is not required.



Checks may then be mailed in or dropped off to the parish. You may also participate through WeShare or via Automatic Giving.

The Parish will then send a single check to the Archdiocese of Boston, for "India and Brazil Relief." These funds will be sent in full to Catholic Relief Services.



ST. MARY'S PARISH HOLLISTON PANDEMIC PROTOCOLS

FOR THOSE FULLY VACCINATED. As of May 29, 2021, fully vaccinated people (two weeks past their second shot), are no longer required to wear masks or socially distance in our buildings. This applies to worship and other parish activities.

* Please note that masks will be required to sit in the church transepts, see below.

This change is by the honor system. Non-masked people will not have to show proof of vaccination. Every parishioner and every family will make a sound, reasonable decision about when they are ready to take off their masks and be near other people. Some people who are comfortable dropping social distancing may not yet be comfortable taking off their masks. They are free to continue to wear masks as long as they like.

FOR THOSE UNVACCINATED. Because unvaccinated people are more likely to contract the Covid Virus and transmit it to others - even if they themselves are asymptomatic - we respectfully ask the unvaccinated to continue wearing masks. This is out of concern for the safety of others, as well as their own. Please do your part to keep all our people safe.

NAVE CHURCH SEATING. The entire nave of the church (main body), will no longer be taped off for social distancing. Both masked and non-masked people may sit there, availing themselves of any and all pew space. *If* <u>not</u> <u>wearing</u> a mask, please enter the church through the front doors to avoid passing through the transept 'mask required' sections.

TRANSEPT CHURCH SEATING. Both church transepts (side wings), will remain taped off every other pew for social distancing, and masks are required to sit in the transepts. This is a recommended provision for people who are not yet ready to sit near other people, or to be near people who are not wearing masks. *Those wishing to sit in the transepts and not pass through the nave (where some will not have masks on), should enter the church through the Parish Center stairs.*

HAND SANITIZING. All are asked to please still sanitize their hands immediately upon entering the church. The church will continue to be sanitized and aired out on a regular basis.

SUNDAY MASS OBLIGATION. The dispensation from the obligation for coming to Sunday Mass has not yet been lifted, and even when it is, if a parishioner is feeling ill they should remain at home. It is understood that different people will be ready to take off their masks and sit near one another at different times. Virtual participation in the Mass is encouraged each week, and St. Mary's Sunday, 11:30 AM Mass will continue to be livestreamed for now.

MASS SIGN-UPS. Advance Sign-ups are no longer required to attend Mass, nor will records be kept of those attending.

COVID EXPOSURE. If we learn that someone with Covid attended a Mass at St. Mary's, a general notification will be made to the Parish. *Please be sure that St. Mary's has your current email address*!

SINGING AT MASS. Fully restored, sing away! We hope to soon make missals and hymnals available for each family. You can bring these to Mass and take them home with you each week. This will avoid any contamination from shared books and allow us to spray / sanitize the empty pew book racks. (You could also keep these in your car for convenience).

THE SIGN OF PEACE. For the present, please continue to offer this to others with a bow or wave rather than shaking hands.

DISTRIBUTING HOLY COMMUNION. Both clergy and Eucharistic Ministers will continue to wear masks to give out Holy Communion. They will disinfect their hands before distributing the Body of Christ.

RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION. Communion continues to be received <u>on the hand only</u>. The Precious Blood is not yet available for Communion.

MASS COLLECTIONS. Technically, collections may be taken up by basket again. However, St. Mary's is unable to do so at this time. We did not have enough ushers before the pandemic, and a number of our faithful older ushers are now too infirm to resume this ministry. Once Mass attendance approaches normal levels, we will need to do a major recruitment and training program for ushers. Collections will resume at Mass when we have ushers ready for all Masses. In the meantime, please mail in or drop off your weekly offertory and special collection envelopes. Or better yet ...

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION. Since masking and social distancing are still required in public schools in Massachusetts even after May 29, we are not yet certain what faith formation programs for children will need to look like in the fall. The programs will certainly be allowed and in person, but we do not know yet about masking and distancing requirements. We will keep you advised.







WHY WE CELEBRATE MEMORIAL DAY:

What we remember - and honor - on Memorial Day is heroic sacrifice. We acknowledge those who nobly gave of themselves, even unto death, for a purpose they believed was greater than themselves. Since the days just following the end of the Civil War, Americans have gathered in late May to honor those who died in military service to their country. In the spirit of the day, we can also recall, honor, and pray for all those we know who have lived lives of service and sacrifice for the good of others.

One definition of sacrifice is "the destruction or surrender of something for the sake of something else." Though suffering is always a part of sacrifice to some extent, seeking suffering for its own sake is not sacrifice. Sacrifice implies giving up one good for a higher good. For example, a child gives up a day of play to visit an ailing grandparent, or a parent sacrifices watching a favorite television program to help a child who is struggling with homework. Life in the family is full of opportunities for service and sacrifice.

What counts in this definition is the phrase "for the sake of something else." Is that "something else" worthy of the sacrifice we make? True sacrifice is always at the service of life. We learn this from Jesus, who made the ultimate sacrifice and remained faithful through his Passion, death, and Resurrection. Jesus' greater purpose for this sacrifice was our well-being—that we might have life and have it abundantly.

This Memorial Day, as we remember all who have served and sacrificed on our behalf, let us not forget what Jesus was willing to give up for us—and the lessons we can learn from that perfect example of sacrifice. - Tom McGrath

Dear Monsignor/Father:

Allow me to ask for your assistance with a matter of the highest priority concerning the protection of unborn children. As Pope Francis has shared with us, every child is "a gift that changes the history of a family...and this child needs to be welcomed, loved and cared for".

For 45 years, annual passage of the "Hyde Amendment" in federal appropriations bills, by a bipartisan coalition of members of Congress has ensured that federal tax dollars are not spent on abortions. It is estimated that the "Hyde Amendment" has saved more than 2.4 million unborn children since 1976. However, this year, the passage of the "Hyde Amendment" is seriously at risk.

In order that we do all that is possible to protect unborn children, it is critically important for Catholics to send a *strong and united* message on behalf of the children and to do so before Congress moves forward to authorize taxpayer-funded abortion.

Please appeal to the people of your parish to join our Archdiocesan response to the USCCB's nationwide effort during the month of June, when Congress will begin the legislative process. **Our goal is for millions of Catholics to sign the petition on NoTaxpayerAbortion.com**. I embrace You as if You were already there, and unite myself wholly to You.




Climb aboard for mountains of fun at Rocky Railway! On this faith-filled adventure, kids discover that trusting Jesus pulls them through life's ups and downs.

GUARDIAN OF THE REDEEMER



Continued from last week: Pope John Paul II's (JPII) Apostolic Exhortation "Guardian of the Redeemer", the person and Mission of Saint Joseph in the Life of Christ.

Patron of the Church in Our Day: Pope Leo III had already exhorted the Catholic world to pray for the Protection of St. Joseph, Patron of the whole church. The Encyclical Epistle, *Quamquam Pluries* appealed to St. Joseph's "fatherly love...for the child Jesus" and commended to him as "the provident guardian of the divine Family," "the beloved inheritance which Jesus Christ purchased by His Blood." Since that time—as I recalled at the beginning of his Exhortation—the Church has implored the protection of St. Joseph on the basis of "that sacred bond of charity which united him to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God," and the Church has commended to Joseph all Her cares, including those dangers which threaten the human family.

Even today we have many reasons to pray in a similar way: "Most beloved father, dispel the evil of falsehood and sin...graciously assist us from heaven in our struggle with the powers of darkness...and just as once you saved the Child Jesus from mortal danger, so now defend God's holy Church from the snares of Her enemies and from all adversity." Today we have good reason to commend everyone to St. Joseph.

The Second Vatican Council made all of us sensitive once again to the "great things which God has done," and to that "economy of salvation" of which St. Joseph was a special minister. Commending ourselves, then, to the protection of him to whose custody God "entrusted the greatest and most precious treasures," . . . This just man who bore within himself the entire heritage of the Old Covenant, was also brought into the "beginning" of the New and Eternal Covenant in Jesus Christ. May St. Joseph obtain for the Church and for the world, as well as for each of us the blessings of the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit.

FY2021 CORI VOLUNTEER RENEWAL ALERT:

Ministry Leaders must make sure that **all** their active volunteers (18 years and older) renew and complete a **FY 2021 CORI.** If you are planning to volunteer in any ministry, you must complete a **2021 CORI** form. You can scan in your license and completed 2021 CORI form and send it to st.marysre1870@gmail.com. Please call the Religious Education Office at 508-429-6076 if you need a **2021 CORI** Form. Everyone must fill in all sections of the CORI form marked with an asterisk where it pertains to important information. Incomplete CORI forms may result in processing delays for volunteers who serve in various ministries at St. Mary's.

NOTICE: Due to the current restrictions and health concerns presented by the pandemic, the office of Risk Management at the Archdiocese has made the following temporary adjustment to their adult child protection training requirements. All employees and all volunteers who may have contact with children are required to complete Protecting God's Children training. However, due to our current inability to gather together for live trainings, volunteers can currently meet this requirement through participation in two online trainings: VIRTUS online PGC training and Massachusetts online Mandated Reporter training.

To complete the online PGC training, volunteers should go to www.virtusonline.org.

Click on "First time registrant."

On the next page click on "Begin the registration process."

Select "Boston" from the drop down list of dioceses And complete the registration process.

Once the registration is complete you will be directed to an <u>online PGC training through VIRTUS</u>. Upon completion of that training, individuals will be directed to a link to an <u>additional online training on mandated reporting in Massachusetts</u>. Both online trainings must be completed to be in compliance with child protection requirements.
