March 10, 2019 1st Sunday of Lent

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

As we enter the church today, we see the lush greenery of Ordinary Time replaced with thorny brambles. This transformation of our worship space marks the start of our Lenten journey – a sojourn into the wilderness. For forty days we will forsake comfort and luxury in favor of fasting, prayer and almsgiving. Of these three Lenten practices, perhaps fasting is the most underutilized. Whereas today's Gospel relates that Jesus "ate nothing" during His forty days in the wild places of the desert, our Catholic faith requires only that we fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. These days, however, represent a bare minimum. Persons in good health are encouraged to fast more often during Lent – perhaps one day each week (traditionally on Fridays).

Physically, such fasting allows the body to purify itself of toxins and to divert energy normally used for digestion to other needs. Spiritually, such fasting represents a self-emptying; a lessening of the hold this world has on us as we seek first the things that are of God. It also fosters a self-discipline that can be valuable in almost every other area of life. If a sinful habit has taken hold of us, for instance, to the point that we very much feel in the grip of something beyond our control, fasting can be part of finding our freedom again. Remember the occasion when the disciples came to Jesus bewildered that they had been unable to cure a possessed boy? "Why could we not cast him out?" they asked Jesus. And Jesus answered, "This kind can be driven out in no way except by prayer and fasting." (Mark 9:29)

Nor is our Lenten fasting to be limited only to food. In the words of St. John Chrysostom:

"Do you fast? Give me proof of it by your works. If you see a poor man, take pity on him. If you see a friend being honored, do not envy him.

Do not let only your mouth fast, but also the eye and the ear and the feet and the hands and all the members of our bodies.

Let the hands fast, by being free of avarice. Let the feet fast, by ceasing to run after sin. Let the eyes fast, by disciplining them not to look upon that which is sinful.

Let the ear fast, by not listening to evil talk and gossip. Let the mouth fast from foul words and criticism. For what good is it if we abstain from the flesh of animals, only to bite and devour our brothers through our speech?

May He who came to the world to save sinners, strengthen us to complete the fast with humility, have mercy on us and save us. Amen."

May the Lord of Our Lenten Journey bless you and yours.

TWO IMPORTANT THINGS TO "GIVE UP" FOR LENT THIS YEAR

Lent is a time when we take a hard look at our lives as Catholics and as a Catholic Community. It is an ideal time to identify and work on any ways we may have become liturgically lax or spiritually sloppy at Mass.

I will give up missing the Scriptures at Mass:

Although we should do all we can to avoid it, occasionally circumstances beyond our control may make us a bit late for Mass. However, if we enter the Church so late that we miss *all* of the Scriptures, the Gospel being the last of these, then we have missed that Mass. Church teaching is very clear that the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist *together* constitute the Mass. If it is a Sunday Mass, entering after the Gospel does not fulfill the Sunday Mass obligation – that Mass has been missed. For this same reason, anyone entering a Mass after the Gospel, should refrain from receiving Communion.


In Catholic tradition, the celebration of God's Word is considered necessary before receiving Communion. The Scriptures open, purify and prepare the soul to meaningfully receive the Body and Blood of Jesus. Remember on the Road to Emmaus, how the Risen Lord first shared the Word of God with the two disciples as He walked with them, and *then* they recognized Him in the breaking of the Bread? Even when visiting the sick, we never just give them Communion – a Scripture is always read first. Sadly, we have a growing number of persons habitually entering Mass after the Gospel – or even after the Consecration – and still receiving Communion. It has become an epidemic at our daily Masses, where people do this almost every day – many of them then walking right out the door after receiving. The Mass is not a McDonald's Drive Thru. It is the Upper Room, where Jesus gathered with His disciples, spoke God's Word, and then shared the gift of Himself as Eucharist. It is not a place to "pop in and grab a spiritual bite," but rather a place to rest and encounter Jesus meaningfully in Word and Sacrament. Please respect the Word of God, and acknowledge its importance, by arriving at Mass in time to experience it. And please refrain from receiving Communion if you have not first prepared to do so by hearing the Word of God at that Mass. Let us all honor and imitate the manner of Worship that Jesus Himself laid out for us.

I will give up reading the bulletin during Mass:

Recently the priests who assist at St. Mary's have noticed a <u>lot</u> of people reading the bulletin when they are trying to preach on the Gospel. All of our priests study and work hard to "open up" God's Word through the Sunday homily. Imagine if you spent a whole week preparing to talk to someone about an important matter, choosing just the right words, trying to approach the topic in the best way. Then at week's end you are finally with that person. You begin to talk to them, and they pick up a newspaper to read while you are speaking to them. How would you feel? You would feel that you do not have their full attention. Even if they said, "*I'm listening*," while looking down at their newspaper or cellphone, you would still find their behavior to be rude and disrespectful. Reading the bulletin, or the Pilot, or whatever when the priest is trying to speak to you through the homily is extremely disrespectful - both to him and to the Word of God he is trying to proclaim. It also sets a terrible example for the young people of our parish.

The parish bulletin is meant to be taken home for reading. If you have fallen into the bad habit of reading it during Mass – especially at the homily – please use this Lent to reclaim your reverence. If you see a family member doing this during Mass, please talk to them about it at home. If you see a stranger doing this at Mass, please say a prayer for them. We would hate to become one of those parishes where the bulletin and Pilot are no longer put out until the end of Mass. St. Mary's Parish has a tradition of reverence and courtesy that a little self-control can help us all reclaim this Lent.





LENT is the time of spiritual preparation prior to the Easter season, just as Advent is for Christmas. Jesus taught us clearly that there is no resurrection without the Cross, and Lent is the Church's great spiritual journey as she, the Bride of Christ, joins her Divine spouse in His great suffering on our behalf.

Basically, we don't experience the full joy of Easter without the self-sacrifice of Lent; the disciples of Jesus follow in His footsteps, including His service and sacrifice...

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday (this year March 6, 2019) and ends on Holy Thursday (this year April 18, 2019). On the evening of Holy Thursday, the Sacred Triduum beings.

The 40 days of Lent correspond to the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness to fast, pray, and endure the temptations of the devil, all in preparation for His public ministry which would culminate in His death on the Cross.

ABSTINENCE -- Catholics over 14 years of age are bound to the obligation of abstinence. Abstinence is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent. On days of abstinence, meat may not be used at all.

FASTING -- Catholics over 18 and up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are the days of fasting. On these days, only one full meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed.

EVENING PRAYER: Come enjoy Lenten Evening Prayer, 7 PM in the Church, (15-20 minutes). This is the daily prayer of the Catholic Church consisting of psalms, hymns, and intercessions. Come find peace at day's end. March 12, 19, 26, April 2, 9, & 16.

SUNG CHORAL VESPERS: Come to the traditional ancient service of sung vespers! The event will take place this Wednesday March 13 at 7:00 PM! It will be sung by the St. Mary's Youth Choir and is free and open to all. Vespers, part of the Liturgy of the Hours, is meant to give thanks for the day just past and makes an evening sacrifice of praise to God. Vespers includes the singing of psalms, intercessions and prayers. Come experience the beauty of sung prayer.

WISDOM FROM THE SAINTS: "If our Lord does not watch over our preservation, all of our efforts will come to nothing. No, my children, we shall not find any sinner who may be converted who has not recourse to prayer, not one who will persevere without having very great recourse to prayer, and we shall never find a Christian damned whose downfall did not commence with a lack of prayer."

Cardinal Seán P. O'Malley Lenten Letter Archdiocese of Boston March 6, 2019

Dear Friends in Christ,

As we begin the holy season of Lent, this annual time of prayer, fasting and almsgiving affords us the opportunity to be renewed by God's love and mercy as we recommit ourselves to lives of prayer and service to others

This year, Lent has particular significance for the leadership of the Church at every level, local, national and universal. Recently Pope Francis called bishops from every country in the world to come together at the Vatican for the Summit to Protect Children and Minors. The summit included powerful testimony from survivors of clergy sexual abuse, religious sisters and laypersons who made clear that a meaningful and effective response from the Church is long overdue and of critical importance. I participated in the summit as the President of the Pontifical Commission for Protection of Minors and, with all present, was deeply impacted by those who addressed us.

Given the depth and seriousness of the crisis and the failures of the leadership of the Church, the expectations for the meeting were high and people are anxious to see concrete results. I left the meeting convinced that no bishop could possibly say that his diocese is not affected by these issues or that this is not a problem in his country and culture. Patience among our people and in the wider community is exhausted and understandably the call is rising for effective action.

A dominant theme at the meeting was the need for an effective reporting mechanism when a Bishop or Cardinal has failed in his duty to protect children or has himself abused children or vulnerable adults. Although I believe an effective set of procedures will be developed by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, I nonetheless wish to address this need immediately for the Archdiocese of Boston.

To that end I have decided to implement EthicsPoint, a confidential, anonymous and third-party system, exclusively for the reporting of misconduct by a Cardinal, Bishop or Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Boston. Since 2011 we have utilized EthicsPoint for concerns of potential ethics violations, financial improprieties, and other violations of the Archdiocesan Code of Conduct related to financial matters.

Like the existing system currently in use, this will be web based and have a toll-free hotline to make a report. Reports will be sent to members of my Independent Review Board who will be charged to immediately notify law enforcement for claims of abuse as well as the apostolic nuncio; the diplomatic representative to the U.S. of the Holy See. The system will be hosted on secured servers at the EthicsPoint facility and is not connected to the Archdiocese of Boston website, intranet system or the existing EthicsPoint system currently in use. We anticipate the system being up and running soon and will provide more information at that time.

In January 2002 the clergy sexual abuse crisis was revealed by the media in powerful and compelling reports on the failures of the Church to protect children. Courageous survivors came forward and forced the Church to face the crisis and accept responsibility for the crimes committed against them. That same year the American Bishops implemented the Dallas Charter of Norms. Where it has been faithfully implemented, it has been effective. But we must aggressively build on the Charter to ensure that there are clear paths for reporting misdeeds of the hierarchy by utilizing the expertise of independent lay professionals.

During the meeting in Rome, the most powerful moments were when survivors of abuse spoke to us. This confirmed my own experience. The way forward for the Church is to hold as a priority the voices and experience of survivors, to keep them close to every step we take and make all possible efforts to provide the means for them to be heard. In Boston we will continue to provide pastoral care and counseling for survivors. We will continue to carry out programs of prevention and education in our schools and parishes. We will continue to do background checks annually for bishops, priests, all archdiocesan personnel, and all volunteers who work with children and young people. For more than twenty-six years my ministry has involved responding to the abuse of minors by clergy. The crisis of sexual abuse by clergy is the greatest failure of the Church in my lifetime. It has eroded our moral authority, it endangers our pastoral, social and educational ministry, but worst of all, it devastates children and families.

We must face our past with transparency. Those who were sexually abused by clergy, their families and loved ones must always be the central focus of our response to the crisis. Their courage in coming forward has forced the Church to face the crimes committed against them. We are committed to accompanying them on their journey toward healing. Often it is survivors who teach us not to lose hope.

As we strive to live this season with renewed seriousness and commitment we pray and work for renewal in the life of the Church. We are firmly committed to zero tolerance, transparency and accountability, at all times holding survivors as the priority, always being vigilant to do all possible to prevent any harm to children.
