April 14, 2019 Palm Sunday

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

My first thought as I envision the vast crowds that thronged around Jesus for His triumphal entry into Jerusalem, is that St. Mary's will be similarly mobbed next Sunday for the great Feast of Easter. The arrival of so many visitors each Easter represents both a logistical challenge and a spiritual opportunity. Many of our regulars will find themselves unable to sit in their accustomed place. Parking will also be more difficult. It would be easy to get frustrated with the crowds and the inconvenience, and certainly there is a sadness that comes from seeing so many Catholics who are only rare visitors to the Table of the Lord.

But think of the opportunity! These persons will be in God's house. They will hear His Holy Word proclaimed. They will receive the Precious Body of His Son. Maybe, just maybe, this will be the Easter that God touches them in a special way. This might be the year that the grace of Jesus Christ breaks through into their hearts, moving them into a more meaningful relationship with His Church. You and I can play a part in this by offering a warm greeting, a friendly smile, and above all by being patient with the crowds. See an unfamiliar face next Sunday? Then make a special effort to reach out and welcome that person. Let us remember that it is Jesus Himself Who so often comes as a stranger into our midst.

As we prepare this week for the holiest days of our liturgical year, please consider taking part in the Holy Thursday and / or Good Friday celebrations in addition to your Easter Mass. I remember as a child how moved I was by the washing of feet on Holy Thursday and coming forward to reverence with a kiss the wood of Jesus' Cross on Good Friday. Above all I remember the power and mystery of the great Easter Vigil, as the light of the new-kindled Easter Candle spread from person to person throughout the darkened church. We hope that moms and dads will make sure their young people get to experience these most magnificent celebrations of our faith.

Recently while visiting one of our Religious Education classes, I was asked a very profound question. We were talking about Jesus' crucifixion, and one little girl wanted to know why Jesus' wounds didn't heal. When I asked what she meant, she pointed out that after Jesus' Resurrection, He still had His wounds. Thus His invitation to doubting Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side." As we hear today the story of Christ's wounds being inflicted, we too might ask why they remain upon His body even after it has been raised up and glorified. One reason is that the wounds of Jesus represent His ongoing offer of salvation to all people in all times. The wounds still worn by Christ remind us also of the depth of His love for us, and that He understands firsthand what it means to suffer as we do.

One of the early Church Fathers said too that the wounds of Jesus are the means by which He intercedes for us with the Father. "When Jesus rises up to pray for His people, He needs not speak a word; He lifts His hands before His Father's face; He makes bare His side, and points to His feet. These are the orators with which He pleads to God—these wounds, these wounds plead and prevail."

May the Lord of Our Journey continue to bless you and yours.

The 7:00 PM Lord's Passion Celebration is the official Good Friday Liturgy that continues the three day Triduum Celebration begun on Holy Thursday and concluding at Easter. It consists of the Liturgy of the Passion, Veneration of the Cross, and Holy Communion. The Noon Stations are designed for younger children K – Grade 5, (accompanied by parents), and utilize a living tableau and special station prayers to help young children discover Jesus' love for them in the here and now.

Good Friday is a day of fasting and abstinence from meat. In every single Catholic parish around the world this day, a collection is taken up to maintain the Shrines and struggling Christian communities in the Holy Land. This collection is taken up at both the Stations and Passion Services.

FASTING: Catholics over 18 and up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Ash Wednesday and **Good Friday** are the days of fasting. On these days, only one full meal is allowed.

ABSTINENCE: Catholics over 14 years of age are bound to the obligation of abstinence. Abstinence is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent. On days of abstinence, meat is not used at all.

Bishops Speak Out Against Abortion Legislation

A Statement of the Roman Catholic Bishops of Massachusetts

The Massachusetts State Legislature will consider passing into law two deeply troubling bills this legislative session. They are identical in text but differ slightly in their titles. The first, (HB 3320) is "An Act removing obstacles and expanding access to women's reproductive health". The second, (SB 1209) is "An Act to remove obstacles and expand abortion access". Combined they share the same acronym – ROE.

The supporters of these bills argue the proposed changes to Massachusetts law are simply intended to protect a woman's right to an abortion in the event the United States Supreme Court overturns the 1973 decision in the case of Roe v. Wade. However, in reality these bills would create a significant expansion of current Massachusetts state law. More specifically, ROE would:

- 1) Allow abortions during the nine months of pregnancy for virtually any reason.
- 2) Eliminate any requirements that abortions be performed in a hospital.
- 3) Eliminate the requirement that provides medical care to a child who survives an abortion attempt.
- 4) Eliminate the requirement that a minor under the age of 18 have the consent of a parent, guardian, or the courts.
- 5) Provide state funding for women who cannot afford the procedure.

In order to understand the serious moral questions raised concerning the protection of human life, the specific wording of the bills must be examined closely. For example, that examination is particularly significant while considering the language that would allow for an abortion in the third trimester of a pregnancy. The two bills state in part:

A physician, acting within their lawful scope of practice, may perform an abortion when, according to the physician's best medical judgment based on the facts of the patient's case, the patient is beyond twenty- four weeks from the commencement of pregnancy and the abortion is necessary to protect the patient's life or physical or mental health, or in cases of lethal fetal anomalies, or where the fetus is incompatible with sustained life outside the uterus. Medical judgement may be exercised in the light of all factors – physical, emotional, psychological, familial, and the person's age – relevant to the well-being of the patient. ¹

In just these two sentences, the bills would make extreme changes to Massachusetts law. In addition to aborting infants with fetal anomalies or where the fetus is incompatible with sustained life outside of the uterus, it allows physicians to perform abortions up until birth for a myriad of undefined reasons (ie: physical, emotional, psychological, familial, age) to protect a woman's life, physical health or mental health. The result would become abortion on demand for the full term of pregnancy.

The Catholic Church has always upheld the dignity of human life and spoken out against abortion at all stages of pregnancy. As Bishops we are encouraged by the most recent statistics which clearly indicate that the rate of abortions in both this state and across the country has significantly decreased over the past 40 years. In fact, the rates today are 50% lower than the rates in 1980. However, at a time when the overall number of abortions have decreased, society cannot now accept such an egregious attack on human life as these bills would provide.

Therefore, we, the Roman Catholic Bishops of the four Dioceses of Massachusetts, call on our elected officials to carefully consider the consequences that these bills would bring to the lives of infants, parents, families and the citizens of the Commonwealth. We urge all people of good will, regardless of what faith they practice, to vigorously oppose these extreme measures.
