Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

"By your perseverance, you will secure your lives." These are Jesus' final words in our Gospel message today. "By your perseverance, you will secure your lives." This message takes on special meaning for those experiencing difficult times – financial troubles, serious health problems, or a relationship crisis with a loved one or even with God Himself.

Jesus encourages us to persevere through all such times of doubt and anxiety by remembering that the coming of God's Kingdom is assured – the Kingdom of justice and of light. When darkness seems to abound in our lives, it is easy to lose sight of this; but as Christians our hope is set not on success or health or happiness in this life, but on the good things waiting for us in the world to come. The "life" that Jesus wants us to secure is the next and eternal life, which is God's first purpose in our lives.

Those who persevere successfully through the troubles of this life are those who invite God to walk with them and work with them through it; those who invite God to use moments both good and bad to shape them into better Christians. Father John Yates of Falls Church once offered these wise words to his congregation:

"When you find yourself facing an issue in your life, the purpose or reason or good thing that might come out of it being completely hidden from you — what do you do? Do you worry and fret, become preoccupied with the problem? Do you ignore it or avoid it? Do you complain about it, do you want to run away from it? Or do you see it as a situation in which you might be able to experience the power and grace of God at work? Do you watch for the work of God that is to be done in this situation?"

As Christians, the great symbol of our faith is the Cross – an instrument of destruction turned by God's grace and the faith of His Son Jesus into an instrument of redemption. What Fr. Yates was talking about is looking for ways to make the hard issues of life opportunities to become more open to God and to better serve God.

I remember, for instance, a moment years ago when a particular family was in desperate financial straits. When Christmas came, they received a large delivery of food and gifts from their town's local Visiting Nurses Association. It was profoundly humbling for them to be on the receiving end of charity. But instead of responding with embarrassment, they accepted the help, and found that it made them more compassionate toward the plight of others. The next Christmas things were better for this family, and they made a donation to that same Visiting Nurses Association that had helped them – a gift they have maintained year by year as their circumstances allow. I would call that "experiencing the power and grace of God at work."

Sometimes the only gift we can give is to allow others to be there for us and support us in our time of need. In doing so humbly, we allow those who assist us to store up a great reward in heaven – the gratitude of Jesus Himself, Who said, "Whatsoever you do for the least of my brothers, so you do unto me."



2019 Grand Annual Week Two \$150,000 G.A. Need Breakdown:

\$88,951.78	Replacement of tile flooring and carpeting for church, including materials and installation. Also, installation costs for the new kneeler pads and hardware.
\$9,832.59	Replacement hardware, bumpers and pads for the church kneelers, 600 seats.
\$3,844.36	Church sound system upgrades and repairs. St. Mary's old wireless system becomes illegal in 2020 as the FAA has purchased those channels.
\$47,371.27	Staff Salaries: The eight men and women of St. Mary's Staff are hardworking, dedicated individuals. This portion of the Grand Annual will go toward their salaries.



Photos of a few of the 2019 Grand Annual Items

- A Old Church Tile Floor & Carpet: The 25-year-old tile was cracked and broken; carpet worn and splitting.
- **B Old Church Pew Bumpers:** These were almost totally degraded, with screws sticking through.
- C Old Church Pew Pads: These were 53 years old, worn and torn. All have been replaced.
- **D Improved Handicapped Accommodation:** St. Mary's Church now has special areas cut out of the pews to accommodate wheelchairs. Four are located in the front of the nave, with two more in the back of the nave.
- E-New Hardware, Bumpers and Kneeler Pads: This photo also shows the new carpet. For better maintenance and acoustics, the carpeted and tiled areas of the church were reversed.

COMMENTARY BY NILUS OF ANCYRA ~ YOUR ENDURANCE WILL WIN YOU YOUR LIFE:

In time of trial it is of great profit to us patiently to endure for God's sake, for the Lord says: "By patient endurance you will win life for yourselves." He did not say by your fasting, or your solitude and silence, or your singing of psalms, although all of these are helpful in saving your soul.

Not even the devil himself standing by with all his armies and devices will have power ... But he said: "By patient endurance" in every trial that overtakes you, and in every affliction, whether this be insolent and contemptuous treatment, or any kind of disgrace, either small or great; whether it be bodily weakness, or the belligerent attacks of Satan, or any trial whatsoever caused either by other people or by evil spirits.

"By patient endurance you will win life for yourselves," although to this must be added wholehearted thanksgiving, and prayer, and humility. For you must be ready to bless and praise your benefactor, God the Savior of the world, who disposes all things, good or otherwise, for your benefit.

The apostle writes: "With patient endurance we run the race of faith set before us." For what has more power than virtue? What has more firmness or strength than patient endurance? Endurance, that is, for God's sake. This is the queen of virtues, the foundation of virtue, a haven of tranquility. It is peace in time of war, calm in rough waters, safety amidst treachery and danger. It makes those who practice it stronger than steel.

No weapons or brandished bows, no turbulent troops or advancing siege engines, no flying spears or arrows can shake it. Not even the host of evil spirits, not the dark array of hostile powers, nor the devil himself standing by with all his armies and devices will have power to injure the man or woman who has acquired this virtue through Christ.
