GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY

Good Shepherd Sunday occurs on the Fourth Sunday in the Easter Season. The name derives from the Gospel reading for the day, which is taken from the tenth chapter of John. In this reading Christ is described as the "Good Shepherd" who lays down his life for his sheep. The Psalm for today is Psalm 23, which also makes use of shepherd imagery.

COMMENTARY BY SAINT CLEMENT OF ALEXANDRIA

I am the gate of the sheepfold.

In our sickness we need a savior, in our wanderings a guide, in our blindness someone to show us the light, in our thirst the fountain of living water which quenches forever the thirst of those who drink from it. We dead people need life, we sheep need a shepherd, we children need a teacher, the whole world needs Jesus!

If we would understand the profound wisdom of the most holy shepherd and teacher, the ruler of the universe and the Word of the Father, when using an allegory he calls himself the shepherd of the sheep, we can do so for he is also the teacher of little ones.



How bountiful the giver who for our sake gives his most precious possession, his own life!

Speaking at some length through Ezekiel to the Jewish elders, he gives them a salutary example of true solicitude. I will bind up the injured, he says; I will heal the sick; I will bring back the strays and pasture them on my holy mountain. These are the promises of the Good Shepherd.

Pasture us children like sheep, Lord. Fill us with your own food, the food of righteousness. As our guide we pray you to lead us to your holy mountain, the Church on high, touching the heavens.

I will be their shepherd, he says, "and I will be close to them," like their own clothing. He desires to save my flesh by clothing it in the robe of immortality and he has anointed my body. "They shall call on me," he says, "and I will answer, 'Here I am.'" Lord, you have heard me more quickly than I ever hoped!

"And if they pass over they shall not fall says the Lord," meaning that we who are passing over into immortality shall not fall into corruption, for he will preserve us. He has said he would and to do so is his own wish. Such is our Teacher, both good and just.

He said he had not come to be served but to serve; and so the Gospel shows him tired out, he who labored for our sake and promised "to give his life as ransom for many," a thing which, as he said, only the Good Shepherd will do.

How bountiful the giver who for our sake gives his most precious possession, his own life! He is a real benefactor and friend, who desired to be our brother when he might have been our Lord, and who in his goodness even went so far as to die for us!

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

We enter now Our Lady's Month of May, a time when flowers start to bloom and new life springs forth all around us. This time of year reminds us of the new life that Mary welcomed into her womb at the Annunciation, and the new life that Jesus her Son won for the whole world.

Mary was chosen by God to be the Mother of Jesus, but at the Cross Jesus gave her to all of us, saying to the beloved disciple, *"Son, there is your mother,"* and to Mary, *"Mother, there is your son."* One of Jesus' final acts was to share His own mother with us, so that in her we might always have a strong advocate and avenue to His divine love.

This May I invite you to reclaim Mary as your own spiritual mother. Lay your troubles before her in prayer, even as once the hosts of the wedding at Cana made Mary aware that the wine was running out. Be confident that just as Mary took that situation to Jesus, so she will carry your challenges, hurts, hopes and deepest needs to the One Who at Cana turned water into wine.

Especially if your faith has been running dry - if you have stopped praying, if you have stopped feeling the nearness and constancy and love of God in your life – let Mary help you. Ask her to help bring you back to her Son, that He might transform the water of your doubts into the rich wine of faith.

A hallmark of Catholic prayer is the rosary, and there is no better way to embrace your Blessed Mother and ask her aid than by praying the holy rosary, especially if you have fallen out of the habit. It was at Fatima that the Blessed Mother asked Catholics to pray the rosary each and every day for the intention of peace in the world, a prayer we are certainly in need of today. Additionally, the rosary has great power to bring unity and peace to those families who pray it together, and I hope that every family of our parish will pray the rosary at least once together during Mary's month. You are, after all, all cooped up at home together! A "How To Pray the Rosary" page is included with this bulletin.

This past Friday, May 1, at 3 PM, in response to the global pandemic, all the Bishops of the United States united in a prayer of consecration of the entire country to the care of the Blessed Mother. The Canadian Bishops did the same. The prayer of consecration incorporates language used in consecrations of Popes Pius XII, John Paul II, and Francis, and also from prayers from Masses of the Blessed Virgin Mary. I provide the text of the Prayer on the next bulletin page and invite you to offer it that Our Lady might take us under the protection of her mantle and intercede powerfully for us in our time of need.


RENEWAL OF OUR CONSECRATION TO THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

As the world continues to face the ongoing effects of the global pandemic of the coronavirus, Archbishop José H. Gomez of Los Angeles and president of the USCCB announced that the U.S. bishops would join the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops on May 1 in renewing the consecrations of the two nations to the care of our Blessed Mother.

Through a collective dedication or entrustment of a nation to Mary, an act of consecration is meant to be a reminder to the faithful of the Blessed Mother's witness to the Gospel and to ask for her effective intercession before her Son on behalf of those in need.

CONFIRMATION I AND II: Classes are suspended. Jake will be sending out materials for the students to continue studies at home.

THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION 2020:

The Sacrament of Confirmation will be conferred by Bishop Reed on Saturday, September 26 at 10:30 AM and 1:30 PM. Because of likely social distancing concerns, candidates will be assigned which Confirmation they will attend. This will assure a 50/50 split between the two celebrations. For this reason, candidates should keep the times of both Confirmations free on their calendar. All candidates must turn in their completed Mass Reflection Sheets to the Pastor by the end of May in order to be recommended for the Sacrament.

THE LITURGICAL CELEBRATION OF THE EUCHARIST: Part I – The Mass of all ages.

As early as the second century we have the witness of St. Justin Martyr for the basic lines of the order of the Eucharistic celebration. They have stayed the same until our own day for all the great liturgical families. St. Justin wrote to the pagan emperor Antoninus Pius (138-161) around the year 155, explaining what Christians did:

- On the day we call the day of the sun, all who dwell in the city or country gather in the same place.
- The memoirs of the apostles and the writings of the prophets are read, as much as time permits.
- When the reader has finished, he who presides over those gathered admonishes and challenges them to intimate these beautiful things.
- Then we all rise together and offer prayers for ourselves ...and for all others, wherever they may be, so that we may be found righteous by our life and actions, and faithful to the commandments, so as to attain eternal salvation.
- When the prayers are concluded we exchange the kiss.
- Then someone brings bread and a cup of water and wine mixed together to him who presides over the brethren.
- He takes them and offers praise and glory to the Father of the universe, through the name of the Son and of the

Holy Spirit and for a considerable time he gives thanks (in Greek: *eucharistian*) that we have been judged worthy of these gifts.

- When he has concluded the prayers and thanksgivings, all present give voice to an acclamation by saying, "Amen."
- When he who presides has given thanks and the people have responded, those whom we call deacons give to those present the "eucharisted" bread, wine and water and take them to those who are absent. (CCC 1345).

What is outlined above should be so familiar for all of us when we attend Holy Mass. The apostles (the presiders at that time) were the priests that were ordained through the Apostolic Tradition handed down through the ages by Jesus Himself at the Last Supper when He ordained His disciples as priests. Jesus Gave His authority to these men and said, "Do this in remembrance of Me." The Mass is a perpetual gift of God's endless and generous grace that will lead us to the heavenly banquet promised by Christ.

The Secret of the Rosary As Revealed by Saint Louis De Montfort Part II

A Rosebud to Little Children: Dear little friends this rosebud is for you: it is one of the beads of your Rosary, and it may seem to you to be such a tiny thing. But if you only knew how precious this bead is! This wonderful bud will open up into a gorgeous rose if you say your Hail Mary really well. I want to tell you a little story: Two little sisters were saying their Rosary very devoutly in front of their home. A beautiful Lady suddenly appeared, walked toward the younger – who was only about six or seven – took her by the hand and led her away. Her elder sister was very startled and looked for her sister everywhere. Heart-broken she went home to tell her parents that her sister had been kidnapped. For three days the poor father and mother continued to search for the child but could not find her. At the end of the third day they found her at the front

door looking extremely happy and pleased. Naturally they asked her where on earth had she been, and she told them that the Lady to whom she had been saying her Rosary had taken her to a lovely place where she had given her delicious things to eat. She said that the Lady had given her a Baby Boy to hold, that He was very beautiful, and that she had kissed Him over and over again.

The father and mother who had both been converted to the Catholic faith only a short time before, sent at once for the Jesuit Father who had instructed them for their reception into the Church and who had taught them the devotion to the Most Holy Rosary. They told him what had happened, and it was this priest himself who told me this story. It all took place in Paraguay. (Antoine Boissieu, S.J. Le Chretien predestine par la devotion a la Sainte Vierge.)

So, dear children, imitate these little girls and say your Rosary every day as they always did. If you do this you will earn the right to go to heaven to see Jesus and Mary. If it is not their wish that you should see them in this life, at any rate, after you die, you will see them for all eternity. Amen. So be it. Therefor let all men, the learned and the Ignorant, the just and the sinners, the great and the small praise and honor Jesus and Mary, night and day, by saying the Most Holy Rosary. "Salute Mary who has labored much among you" (*Romans 16:6*) For young children it is too much to pray all fifteen mysteries of the Rosary but do pray five mysteries each day.

The Mystical Rose Tree to Devout Souls: Good and devout souls, who walk in the light of the Holy Spirit: I do not think that you will mind my giving you this little Mystical Rose Tree which comes straight from heaven and which is to be planted in the garden of your soul. It cannot possibly harm the sweet smelling flowers of your contemplations; for it is a heavenly tree and its scent is beautiful. It will not in the least interfere with your carefully planned flower beds; for being itself pure and well-ordered, it includes all to order and purity. If it is properly watered and well attended to every day it will grow to such a marvelous height and its branches shall give such a wide span that it will maintain and perfect your other devotions This mystical Rose Tree is Jesus and Mary in life, death and eternity: its green leaves are the Joyful Mysteries and its thorns the Sorrowful Mysteries of Jesus and Mary. The open blooms are the full-blown roses that symbolize Jesus and Mary in their triumph and glory.
