Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

This coming Thursday we celebrate one of the great Holy Days of our faith – the Feast of the Ascension. To us it is a day of triumph, Christ returning to His Father in heaven to "prepare a place for us" according to His promise. To the disciples who were actually there, however, the Ascension also represented a profound loss. They had already been through Jesus' death, and now that He had returned to them in the Resurrection it seemed that He was going to leave them all over again. Knowing this, Jesus makes them one of the most beautiful vows in all of sacred scripture. He says to the disciples in today's gospel, "I will not leave you orphans; I will come back to you."

This promise is fulfilled already each time Jesus descends among us in the Holy Eucharist. The altar around which we gather is the doorway through which Jesus steps to be with us, to strengthen us, and to touch us with His peace. Jesus' Eucharistic return is a foretaste of His final return – the day He will come to establish forever His Kingdom on the earth. It is the hope of this return that helps all those who love Jesus to keep following Him, even in difficult times. For those who keep faith with the Savior, the Last Judgment is not a source of fear but of the greatest hope. As Pope Benedict points out in his encyclical Spe Salvi, the return of Christ will mean "an undoing of past suffering, a reparation that sets things right." We do our best, in imitation of Jesus, to establish justice on the earth. But we take consolation in knowing that in the end, Christ will bring the Kingdom with Him.

In the meantime, we are never alone. An orphan is a person without family, but Jesus has said that we are not left orphans. We have His Living Body the Church, our family of faith to support us in discipleship along the way. For this reason the greatest gift any person can give another is to witness Christian love to them in a manner that makes them want to join the family of God's children. Conversely, the greatest harm one person can do to another is to act or speak in ways that cause a separation from the Church. It is not by accident that the early Fathers of the Church when describing Jesus' Ascension into heaven always pictured Him at the head of a vast throng – a parade of souls. "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" says Jesus in today's gospel. And Jesus' commandments include a duty to bring others into the communion of His love.

This weekend our St. Mary's family recognizes our graduating High School parishioners from many schools. We ask God's blessing upon the young men and women of the Class of 2020 that He may watch over them, keep them safe, and guide their steps always in His path. Today's Gospel spoke repeatedly of doing the will of God. And we pray that these graduates will seek God's will and purpose for their lives. For if they can prayerfully discover and live out their true vocations, then they will be happier, healthier, and more of a blessing to others than they would be doing anything else. Special thanks to today's 2020 Class Speaker Isabelle Larche, and lectors Nick Calabrese, Ethan Falcao, Ainsley MacLachlan, and Owen Radcliffe.

May the Lord of Our Journey continue to bless you and yours.

Sanctify it all, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. May all we do here be to Your glory. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen.

At this time, light your candle.

COMMUNION TIME: If watching Mass, make an Act of Spiritual Communion at Communion time.

My Jesus,
I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament.
I love You above all things,
and I desire to receive You into my soul.
Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally,
come at least spiritually into my heart.
I embrace You as if You were already there
and unite myself wholly to You.
Never permit me to be separated from You.

SOLEMNITY OF THE ASCENSION OF JESUS INTO HEAVEN ~ Live-streamed Mass will be on Thursday, May 21, at 5:00 PM.

The Feast of the Ascension of Jesus Christ is celebrated each year on the fortieth day after the Feast of Pascha (Easter). Since the date of Pascha changes each year, the date of the Feast of the Ascension also changes. The Feast itself commemorates when, on the fortieth day after His Resurrection, Jesus led His disciples to the Mount of Olives, and after blessing them and asking them to wait for the fulfillment of the promise of the Holy Spirit, He ascended into heaven. Where He has gone, we hope one day to follow.

WE ARE NOT ALONE: In today's Gospel Jesus promises us that "I will not leave you orphaned; I will come back to you and you will have life." Our faith, nurtured in this great paschal season, tells us that God-made-flesh is God-with-us, never abandoning us and always filling us with life.

It should be a great comfort to all of us, who share in the pain and suffering of ordinary life, to know that the Spirit of Jesus is with us always. It should be especially comforting to know that Jesus will not leave orphaned all those whom the world casts aside: the poor and homeless, the racial and ethnic minorities, the sick and dying, the prisoner and the refugee.

"Christ died for sins once for all, a just man for the sake of the unjust."

He rescued us from our attachment to injustice, and then he sent his Spirit to remain with us and within us.

Our prayer is one of gratitude for such a gift and hope that "we feel its saving power in our daily life."

Jesus loves us so much that, even after his death, resurrection, and ascension, he remains with us. He is, after all, Emanuel, 'God with us,' but now through his living, sanctifying Spirit. We now encounter him in new ways: in other human beings; in any place where people gather in his name; in the inspired words of Holy Scripture; in his Church, particularly her liturgical celebrations; in the person of his minister; and especially in the sacraments.

PARISH ANNIVERSARY HISTORY BOOK UPDATE: I am continuing to write the history of St. Mary's for the 150th Anniversary. I am currently working on events between 1950 and 1975 (prior to Fr. Haley). This is a difficult chapter as any newspaper articles are on microfilm (and are hard to find without a specific date) and the St. Mary's monthly newsletters started in 1981. Each week I will ask about a different topic and hope the collective memory of St. Mary's parishioners will provide me with some information. This week's topic is the CYO. The precursor to the Catholic Youth Organization, the St. Mary's Boys Club, was started by Fr. Daniel O'Keefe in the early 1940s. By 1950 St. Mary's CYO had a baseball and basketball team started by George DeCristoforo and Walter Dillon. The CYO continued into the 1980s and 1990s with sports and social events and was the forerunner to the current vibrant Youth Ministry at St. Mary's. FAITH FORMATION MATERIALS FOR GRADES




CONFIRMATION I AND II: Classes are suspended. Jake will be sending out materials for the students to continue studies at home.

THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION 2020:

The Sacrament of Confirmation will be conferred by Bishop Reed on Saturday, September 26 at 10:30 AM and 1:30 PM. Because of likely social distancing concerns, candidates will be assigned which Confirmation they will attend. This will assure a 50/50 split between the two celebrations. For this reason, candidates should keep the times of both Confirmations free on their calendar. All candidates must turn in their completed Mass Reflection Sheets to the Pastor by the end of May in order to be recommended for the Sacrament.

THE LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONOF THE **EUCHARIST- PART III: The movement of the** celebration (continued). The Liturgy of the Word includes "the writings of the prophets," that is, the Old Testament, and the "memoirs of the apostles" (their letters and the Gospels). After the homily, which is an exhortation to accept this Word as what it truly is, the Word of God, and to put it into practice, come the intercessions for all men, according to the Apostle's words: "I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all men, for kings, and all who are in high positions."(CCC 1349) The Presentation of the Offerings the Offertory. Then sometimes in procession, the bread and wine are brought to the altar; they will be offered for the priest in the name of Christ in the Eucharistic sacrifice in which they will become the His Body and Blood. It is the very action of Christ at the Last Supper - "taking the bread and a cup", "The Church alone offers this pure oblation to the Creator, when She offers what comes forth from His Creation with thanksgiving." The presentation of the offerings at the altar takes up the gesture of Melchizedek and commits the Creator's gifts into the hands of Christ Who, in His sacrifice, brings to perfection all human attempts to offer sacrifices (CCC 1350). From the very Beginning Christians have brought, along with the bread and wine for the Eucharist, gifts to share with those in need. This custom of the collection, ever appropriate, is inspired by the example of Christ Who became poor to make us rich. Those who are well off, and those who are also willing, gave as each chooses. What is gathered is given to him who presides to assist orphans and widows, those whom illness or any other cause has deprived of resources prisoners, immigrants and. in a word, all who are in need. (CCC 1351).

THE FIFTEEN PROMISES FOR PRAYING THE ROSARY



May is the Rosary Month and we are encouraged to rediscover the benefits of praying the spiritual Holy Rosary. Below is a brief explanation of each of the 15 Promises of the Rosary. May we continue to pray this excellent prayer even beyond October because the world needs prayer now! Along with the indulgences attached to the Rosary, Our Blessed Mother revealed to St. Dominic and Blessed Alan de la Roche additional benefits for those who devoutly pray the Rosary. The Holy Rosary is the prayer (non-liturgical) with the most published Magisterial/Papal documents expounding its excellence. The Second Vatican Council's summary on Our Lady is contained in Lumen Gentium, chapter VIII.

1. Whosoever shall faithfully serve me by the recitation of the Rosary shall receive signal graces. Signal graces are those special and unique graces which help sanctify us in our state in life. St. Louis de Montfort states emphatically that the best and fastest way to union with Our Lord is via Our Lady.

2. I promise my special protection and the greatest graces to all those who shall recite the Rosary.

Our Lady is our Advocate and the channel of all God's grace to us and She promised that She will watch especially over those who pray the Rosary.

3. The Rosary shall be a powerful armor against hell; it will destroy vice, decrease sin and defeat heresies.

This promise, along with the next, is simply the reminder on how fervent prayer will help us all grow in holiness by avoiding sin, especially a prayer with the excellence of the Rosary. An increase in holiness necessarily requires a reduction in sin, vice and doctrinal errors (heresies).

4. It will cause good works to flourish; it will obtain for souls the abundant mercy of God; it will withdraw the hearts of men from the love of the world and its vanities, and will lift them to the desire for eternal things. Oh, that souls would sanctify themselves by this means.

This promise, along with the previous ones, is the promise of help to live in virtue. Becoming holy is not only avoiding sin, but also growing in virtue.

5. The soul which recommends itself to me by the recitation of the Rosary shall not perish.

Since Our Lady is our Mother and Advocate, She always assists those who call on Her implicitly by praying the Rosary. The Church reminds us of this in the Memorare Prayer, "...never was it known that anyone who fled to your protection, implored your help or sought your intercession, was left unaided..."

6. Whosoever shall recite the Rosary devoutly, applying himself to the consideration of its sacred mysteries shall never be conquered by misfortune. God will not chastise him in His justice, he shall not perish by an unprovided death; if he be just he shall remain in the grace of God, and become worthy of eternal life.

This promise highlights the magnitude of graces that the Rosary brings to whoever prays it. One will draw down God's mercy rather than His justice and will have a final chance to repent (see promise #7). One will not be conquered by misfortune means that Our Lady will obtain for the person sufficient graces to handle said misfortune (i.e., carry the crosses allowed by God) without falling into despair. As Sacred Scripture tells us, "For my yoke is sweet and my burden light." (Matthew 11:30)

7. Whoever shall have a true devotion for the Rosary shall not die without the sacraments of the Church.

This promise highlights the benefits of obtaining the most possible graces at the hour of death via the sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist, and Extreme Unction (Anointing of the Sick). Being properly disposed while receiving these sacraments near death ensures one's salvation (although perhaps with a detour through purgatory) since a final repentance is possible.
