I AM GENTLE AND HUMBLE IN HEART

Our Master is always the same, gentle and benevolent. In his constant concern for our salvation, he says explicitly in the gospel just read to us: "Come, learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart."

What great condescension on the part of the Creator! And yet the creature feels no shame! "Come, learn from me." The Master came to console his fallen servants.

This is how Christ treats us. He shows pity when a sinner deserves punishment. When the race that angers him deserves to be annihilated, he addresses the guilty ones in the kindly words: "Come, learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart."

God is humble, and we are proud! The judge is gentle; the criminal arrogant! The potter speaks in lowered voice; the clay discourses in the tones of a king! "Come, learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart." Our master carries a whip not to wound, but to heal us.

You can see that I am gentle and humble in heart from what I have become.

Reflect upon his indescribable kindness. Who could fail to love a master who never strikes his servants? Who would not marvel at a judge who beseeches a condemned criminal? Surely the self-abasement of these words must astound you.

I am the Creator and I love my work. I am the sculptor and I care for what I have made.

If I thought of my dignity, I should not rescue fallen humankind. If I failed to treat its incurable sickness with fitting remedies, it would never recover its strength. If I did not console it, it would die. If I did nothing but threaten it, it would perish. This is why I apply the salve of kindness to it where it lies.

Compassionately I bend down very low in order to raise it up. No one standing erect can lift a fallen man without putting a hand down to him.

"Come, learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart." I do not make a show of words; I have left you the proof of my deeds. You can see that I am gentle and humble in heart from what I have become.

Consider my nature, reflect upon my dignity, and marvel at the condescension I have shown you. Think of where I came from, and of where I am as I speak to you.

Heaven is my throne, yet I talk to you standing on the earth! I am glorified on high, but because I am long-suffering. I am not angry with you, "for I am gentle and humble in heart."

Practical Steps for Eradicating Racism: An Invitation

This Guide was prepared to assist Catholics and people of good will in reflecting on the evil and harm of racism. While this is not a comprehensive list, it provides actionable steps that may assist Catholics to reflect and respond in faith. With the aid of Holy Scripture, Catholic social teaching, and sacred tradition, this is an open invitation to journey toward reconciliation.

Racism is evil because it attacks the inherent dignity of the human person, created in the image and likeness of God. The persistence of racism demands our attention now. Racism emerges in the actions and inactions of individuals; and it is embedded in our institutions and public policies. Our faith calls us both to personal conversion and to transformation of our society.

The following are some actionable steps pastors and their communities may undertake to this end:

- Read (or re-read) Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love A Pastoral Letter Against Racism using the accompanying Study Guide. Visit <u>usccb.org/racism</u>.
- 2. Create various large and small group opportunities for family and community members to process their feelings in the midst of news and commentary about vulnerable populations and law enforcement. Encourage participants to reflect or share their own upbringing regarding comments in the home, from parents and individuals, media and entertainment, even practices of the Church about the merits or demerits of certain groups of people made to be "the other." Ask. "How have I knowingly or unconsciously made this formation part of my world view? Where could I have spoken up but didn't?"
- 3. Arrange a safe space for young people to reflect and pray about racism and recent events. Listen to the current experiences of young people. Encourage and allow their creative expression. Invite them to generate methodologies that are meaningful to them.
- 4. Attend an intergenerational interracial virtual town hall discussion on racism. Respect that for some African Americans, Hispanics and others, talking about personal racial experiences in a mixed race setting is painful as it is like reopening a wound that hadn't fully healed.
- 5. Use a pastoral and non-partisan lens to respond to concerns of family and community members about racism, policing and public safety. Do not politicize this. Lean on Gospel values, instead.
- 6. Contact your pastor, parish council or diocesan office to discuss possible ways to dialogue with local law enforcement. Some community organizations funded by the bishops through the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) are leading these efforts in their communities. See what is happening near you.
- 7. <u>Learn about structural racism</u> and its roots in in your community and get involved in the work to address it. It might look like housing discrimination that continues to contribute to segregated communities or disparate access to quality education.
- 8. Invite your parish to incorporate regular dialogue among parishioners about their experiences with racism, prejudice and racial discrimination.
- 9. Invite your parish or faith-sharing group to host a conversation with a group of African American, Latino, Indigenous or African men and/or young people about their personal experiences with law enforcement.
- 10. Encourage religious education classes and faith-sharing groups, as well as priests and deacons at your parish to speak out against racism and for personal responsibility to eradicate it. With children, use the storybook *Everyone Belongs* as a starting point for conversation. With teens and adults, explore how anti-racism action looks. Continue to study and understand racism as it manifested in the past and does so today.

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

As we celebrate this weekend the birth of our nation, I invite us all to pray for our country's leaders. May God guide, inspire and empower them to serve His people well. Our nation was founded by men and women of faith fleeing other lands where they were forced to live in ways contrary to their moral convictions. For that reason, religious freedom is part of the very foundation of our United States, a precious right which every generation must cherish and protect.

Religious freedom is never about forcing people to live according to another's faith, but rather making sure that government never forces people of faith to compromise their beliefs in the way they live, work or worship. Many would like to see religion locked up in church on Sunday and kept as a strictly private matter, when in fact true faith becomes part of every aspect of one's life. It is the light which guides us, and the ruler against which we measure every choice that life presents. In the words of George Washington, "Of all the dispositions and habits which lead to political prosperity, Religion and morality are indispensable supports. In vain would that man claim the tribute of Patriotism who should labour to subvert these great Pillars of human happiness, these firmest buttresses of the duties of Men and citizens."

In recent days, the question of what Religious Freedom does and does not mean, has been very much part of the public debate. I therefore share as food for thought the following insights from PBS's "Rediscovering George Washington" series.

"Given the importance of religion to Washington and the other Founders, it is difficult to understand the common view today that government should merely tolerate but never support or promote religion. Nothing could be further from the intentions of the Founders, as can be seen by simply looking at the First Amendment. The First Amendment states, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof..." In writing the First Amendment, the Founders had two concerns. The first was that in America there would be no established church like in 18th century Britain, France, and other European countries where one's political rights were protected only if one belonged to the official religion of the government. But the Founders never for a moment suggested that government ought not promote religion and morality generally.

Many people today think the First Amendment is built upon the idea that there is or should be a 'wall of separation between church and state.' That phrase is found not in the First Amendment, but in a letter Thomas Jefferson wrote while he was President of the United States to a group of Baptists (who were often persecuted in colonial times for their religious beliefs and practices). Jefferson wrote to assure them that their religious liberty would be protected. When Jefferson wrote of the 'wall of separation between church and state,' he did not mean that religion must be kept entirely out of politics, or law. If he had meant that, he would have violated the 'wall of separation' at the very time he declared it. For, at the end of the letter to the Baptists, Jefferson, acting in his official capacity as President, concluded with a prayer: 'I reciprocate your kind prayers for the protection and blessing of the common Father and Creator of man.'

For the Founders, government support of religion is not the same as an 'establishment' of religion. How could it be, when the Founders themselves believed our natural rights to be gifts of God? In September 1789, the House of Representatives authorized the first official Thanksgiving. The resolution they passed called for 'a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God.' Moreover, they passed this on the very same day they passed the First Amendment, which said 'Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion.' Clearly those in the first Congress did not see any conflict between the First Amendment's prohibition on an established religion, and government sanctioning an official day of thanksgiving to God."

REGISTRATIONS NOW PAST DUE FOR FALL 2020 RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:

The deadline to register children for Religious Education Classes in the Fall of 2020 was Monday, June 15. Class time choices are on a first come first served basis, and students are now being assigned classes. The Registration Forms are still available on the St. Mary's Website:

https://stmarysholliston.com/ under Register/Parish Forms on the main page. Forms should be accompanied by full payment made out to St. Mary's Parish. Scholarships or payment plans are available. Open to families with children entering Pre-K through Grade 10. If you are new to Holliston and want to register your children please contact us at st.marysre1870@gmail.com. Welcome!

GRADE 10 REGISTRATION: Registrations for Year II, Grade 10, of our Confirmation Program require a

"COMPLETE" in Year I in order to be fully processed. Any Grade 9 makeup work, including Mass Reflection Sheets, must be received before a final class assignment for Grade 10 can be made.

FUNERALS, WEDDINGS, BAPTISMS: Funeral Masses are now permitted again in the Archdiocese of Boston, with all the same new procedures and restrictions as other Masses. Weddings and Baptisms may now be celebrated under the same safety rules.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS 12TH ANNUAL CHARITY RAFFLE:

We've donated over \$210,000 in the past eleven years, but this year is <u>especially important</u> because the pandemic has really hurt many charities. We're trying our best to help support them. Due to the current pandemic, Knights will follow all social distancing rules and Knights will happily deliver or mail your tickets. We'll fill out your tickets and send your portion back to you. Live sales at local stores have been put on hold. New schedules will be announced once the state of emergency has been lifted.

HOW TO ATTEND WEEKEND MASS ~ PANDEMIC PROCEDURES

(Daily Mass is exactly the same, except that there is no preregistration or sign in upon arrival. To save cleaning, only nave seating will be used on weekdays. To allow deep cleaning, the Saturday 9 AM Mass is suspended).

Please note that these rules have been mandated for all churches for health safety compliance. We did not devise them, we are just following them in order to reopen.

For their protection, the elderly and those with underlying health vulnerabilities are discouraged from attending in Phase One. Anyone with a fever or other symptoms of illness should also not attend.

- 1) Pre-sign up for a Mass via Sign Up Genius. After taping the church pews apart by 6 feet, our allowed capacity is now 200 people per Mass (usually 600).
- 2) Bring hand sanitizer with you and wear a mask at all times. Children under the age of two should not wear masks. Parents should judge for children between the ages of two and five whether they should wear a mask. All people who claim an exemption because of health can forego wearing a mask.
- 3) Bring a printout of the Mass Bible Readings if desired. To avoid possible cross-contamination, we are not permitted to provide missals or handouts. You may find the readings easily at: http://www.usccb.org/bible/ by calendar date, or at www.magnificat.com/free. You can also access these on your smartphone, but please shut that ringer off for Mass!:)
- 4) Enter the church through the front center door facing the Town Hall, or the elevator if handicapped. Only these entrances will be accessible. If using the elevator, PLEASE hand sanitize before touching the glass entry door handles and elevator push buttons.
- 5) Sanitize your hands immediately upon entering the church. We have a limited supply of sanitizer for anyone who forgets to bring some, but please try to bring your own.
- 6) Sign in with the door volunteers at the Mass for which you preregistered.
- 7) Upon entering the church proper, keep your mask on at all times and follow 6 foot social distancing except for families who may sit together as a group. Every other pew is taped off, and blue tape in each pew center marks out a 6 foot area between opposite ends of the same pew.
- 8) Please refrain from singing spoken responses only.
- 9) For Holy Communion, follow the blue arrows which are spaced 6 feet apart. Receive with your mask on, in the hands only. Then step away from the Communion table. Once 6 feet from the priest or minister, remove your mask, place the Host in your mouth, and then immediately put your mask back in place.
- 10) If using the bathrooms in the Parish Center, follow the arrows to use one stairwell to go down and the other to come back up. This avoids people passing each other closely on the stairs.
- 11) Participants at Mass are asked to leave the church within a couple of minutes of the end of the Mass so as to allow time for cleaning the church before the next Mass. No social gatherings are permitted after Mass.
- 12) Please remove any papers or trash from your pew when you exit, and place it in the receptacles provided at the church entrances. Please do not leave anything in the pew where a cleaner would have to touch it!
- 13) Shared collection baskets are not permitted, so no collection can be taken up at Mass. Please continue to make your weekly offertory support via Automatic Giving, WeShare, or by mailing in or dropping off your envelope via the rectory mail-slot. Thank you!

This is a long list and hardly ideal. But we will do what we must to comply and open again.


PREPARING A PLACE TO PRAY:

NOTICE FOR THE 2020-2021 RELIGIOUS EDUCATION REGISTRATIONS: Registration forms are available at: https://stmarysholliston.com/ under the top right corner REGISTER tab / under PARISH FORMS. We hope you will also consider joining Christ's mission as a Teacher or Monitor.

Many families have contacted our office to inquire about classes in September and if they should send in the registration for their children. It is important that you send in the registrations so we can plan ahead with either the classroom model, remote home classes or a hybrid model of both. St. Mary's will have faith formation for your children and youth in September. At this time we are waiting to learn how the Holliston Public School system will decide when and how classes will be held or if there will be a hybrid classroom or remote learning at home. Families will decide if it will be safe for their children to return to school by September. We are also obligated to honor what the Archdiocese of Boston mandates for the safety and protection of the children, youth and volunteers as the months go forward. There are so many unknowns at this time regarding the behavior of the virus as it mutates and is still infecting people. The past three months have been difficult for families and their children. God fashioned our lives to be in relationships and for children this means being with their friends. All this has been on hold. A mother mentioned that it was difficult for her to get her children off to school every morning and now her children miss their teachers and friends and want to be back in school. To help you through this crisis we know that our faith in God gives us hope. Take the time to pray together as a family before your meals and thank God for the gift of blessings that you have. Our loving God does not ignore our prayers and He will provide the grace needed to meet our needs if we trust in Him. May God bless you and keep you and your loved ones safe.

It is first prudent and necessary to measure the safety risks of the children and adults who would be engaged in VBS group activities. Good news is that Group has developed a home VBS program with great activities and projects the family can enjoy and engage in at home this summer. The program will be sent out to you next week.

THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION 2020:

The Sacrament of Confirmation will be conferred by Bishop Reed on Saturday, September 26 at 10:30 AM and 1:30 PM. Because of likely social distancing concerns, candidates will be assigned which Confirmation they will attend. This will assure a 50/50 split between the two celebrations. For this reason, candidates should keep the times of both Confirmations free on their calendar. See page 5 of this bulletin for more Grade 10 Information.

GRADE 2 FIRST COMMUNION MASSES:

The Archdiocese of Boston has **postponed First**Communion Group Masses until normal public Masses can safely resume and the danger of COVID-19 has been lifted. Even though Public Masses are permitted now there is a mandate in place allowing only 40% of the normal capacity of church attendees to attend any one scheduled Sunday Mass. Thus, First Communion Masses are not permitted on Saturdays separate from the Sunday Masses until Cardinal O'Malley believes it is safe to do so. The safety and health of our priests in all the parishes are of great concern while the pandemic is still ongoing.

A schedule of Masses with Fr. Mark as celebrant has been sent to the families with Grade 2 children. Families have the option to schedule their child to receive his/her First Holy Communion at one of the public Sunday Masses in July. Our August Mass schedule will be available in a few weeks or sooner. Please call Fran or Robin at 508-429-6076 with any questions. Families will be instructed to use Sign Up Genius to register their family members on the parish website on the Wednesday before their selected Mass. Each family member must be signed up. Our office must know ahead of time in order to have the First Communion Certificates ready to distribute at the Mass their child will attend. All safety protocols must be observed during the Mass. Masks are worn, safe distance is observed, hand sanitizer is used before entering the church and before receiving Holy Communion.

THE EUCHARIST ~ THE SACRAMENTAL SACRIFICE: THANSGIVING, MEMORIAL, PRESENCE ~ The Sacrificial memorial of Christ and of His Body, the Church.

The Eucharist as the Sacrifice and Presence ~ continued from last week. Augustine admirably summed up this document that moves us to an even more complete participation in our Redeemer's sacrifice which we celebrate in the Eucharist: This wholly redeemed city, the assembly and society of the saints, is offered to God as a universal sacrifice by the high priest Who in the form of a slave went so far as to offer Himself for us in His Passion, to make us the Body of so great a Head Such is the sacrifice of Christians: "we who are many are one Body in Christ." The Church continues to reproduce this sacrifice in the Sacrament of the altar so well-known to believers wherein it is evident to them that in what She offers She Herself is offered. (CCC 1372).

The presence of Christ by the power of His Word and the Holy Spirit. "Christ Jesus, Who died, yes, Who was raised from the dead, Who is at the right hand of God, Who indeed intercedes for us," is present in many ways to His Church: in His Word, in His Church's prayer, "where two or more are gathered in My name," in the poor, the sick, and the imprisoned, in the sacrament in which He is the author, in the sacrifice of the Mass, and in the person of the minister. But "He is present ... most especially in the Eucharistic species" (CCC 1373). Continued next week.

The Year of the Eucharist and the Mass

We entered the Year of the Eucharist on Corpus Christi Sunday recently and it is important that we as Catholics know the importance the Eucharist is as believers. Jesus has already saved us through His Passion, death and Resurrection; however, one must not be complacent in believing that it is acceptable to ignore attending Mass occasionally when there is no valid reason not to receive the Sacrament that Christ surrendered His life on the Cross so that we may have the means to attain eternal life.

If we think that attending Mass is interfering with weekend plans or just to fulfill our obligation to satisfy God's Commandment, "to keep Holy the Sabbath" then souls are missing out on the most powerful source of God's Grace, Love and Mercy.

As Scott Hahn, a convert to the Catholic Church, writes in His book "The Supper of the Lamb" ...Of all things Catholic, there is nothing so familiar than the Mass with its unchanging prayers, the Mass fits Catholics like their favorite clothes. Yet most Catholics sitting in the pews on Sunday do not realize the powerful super-natural drama unfolding before them.

Scott Hann reveals a long-lost secret of the Church: The early Christians' key to understanding the mysteries of the Mass was the Book of Revelation in the New Testament. He tells us that we need to attend Mass each week with new eyes, pray the liturgy with a renewed heart, and enter into the Mass more fully, intelligently, enthusiastically, and more powerfully than ever before.

To attend Mass is to go to heaven, where "God Himself . . . will wipe away every tear" (Rev 21:3-4). Yet heaven is more than that . . . Heaven is where we place ourselves under judgment, where we see ourselves in the clear morning light of eternal day, and where the just judge reads our works from the book of life. Our deeds go with us when we go to heaven. Our deeds go with us when we to Mass.

To go to Mass is to renew our covenant with God, as at a marriage feast – for the Mass is the marriage supper of the Lamb. As in marriage, we take vows, we pledge ourselves, we assume a new identity. We are changed forever . . . we receive the fullness of grace, the very life of the Trinity. No power in heaven or on earth can give us more than we receive in the Mass, for we receive God into ourselves


KEEPING THE MISSION ALIVE/BOOK DISCUSSION:
