February 21, 2021 1st Sunday of Lent

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

As we enter the church today, we see the lush greenery of Ordinary Time replaced with bare branches and hard stones. This transformation of our worship space marks the start of our Lenten journey – a sojourn into the wilderness. For forty days we will forsake comfort and luxury in favor of fasting, prayer and almsgiving. Of these three Lenten practices, perhaps fasting is the most underutilized. Our Catholic faith instructs only that we fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. These days, however, represent a bare minimum. Persons in good health are encouraged to fast more often during Lent – perhaps one day each week (traditionally on Fridays).

Physically, such fasting allows the body to purify itself of toxins and to divert energy normally used for digestion to other needs. Spiritually, such fasting represents a self-emptying; a lessening of the hold this world has on us as we seek first the things that are of God. It also fosters a self-discipline that can be valuable in almost every other area of life. If a sinful habit has taken hold of us, for instance, to the point that we very much feel in the grip of something beyond our control, fasting can be part of finding our freedom again. Remember the occasion when the disciples came to Jesus bewildered that they had been unable to cure a possessed boy? *"Why could we not cast him out?"* they asked Jesus. And Jesus answered, *"This kind can be driven out in no way except by prayer and fasting."* (Mark 9:29)

Nor is our Lenten fasting to be limited only to food. In the words of St. John Chrysostom:

"Do you fast? Give me proof of it by your works. If you see a poor man, take pity on him. If you see a friend being honored, do not envy him.

Do not let only your mouth fast, but also the eye and the ear and the feet and the hands and all the members of our bodies.

Let the hands fast, by being free of avarice. Let the feet fast, by ceasing to run after sin. Let the eyes fast, by disciplining them not to look upon that which is sinful.

Let the ear fast, by not listening to evil talk and gossip. Let the mouth fast from foul words and criticism. For what good is it if we abstain from the flesh of animals, only to bite and devour our brothers through our speech?

May He who came to the world to save sinners, strengthen us to complete the fast with humility, have mercy on us and save us. Amen."

May the Lord of Our Lenten Journey bless you and yours.

I have included on the next bulletin page the communication we received from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops explaining this change. I did it the new way on Ash Wednesday, then promptly forgot at Friday's daily Mass. After almost twenty-seven years of priesthood saying the prayer one way, this change will take a while to get used to. Thank you for your patience when I lapse!



CHANGE TO THE CONCLUDING DOXOLOGY OF THE ORATIONS EFFECTIVE ASH WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 17, 2021

"One God, for ever and ever" becomes "God, for ever and ever."

In May of 2020 the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments wrote to the English-speaking Conferences of Bishops regarding the concluding doxology of the Collects in the Roman Missal (which also appear in other liturgical books).

Specifically, the Congregation pointed out that the current translation – which concludes "... in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever" – is incorrect. There is no mention of "one" in the Latin, and "Deus" in the Latin text refers to Christ. Therefore, the correct translation, which is already reflected in the Missal in other languages (including our own USCCB Missale Romanum) is simply: "[...] in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever." The Cardinal Prefect has pointed out the importance of affirming this Christological truth amid the religious pluralism of today's world.

A Brief History:

English translations of the Missal for use by the faithful prior to the Second Vatican Council reflected the correct translation, as for example the St. Joseph's Missals of the 1950's. However, when the post-conciliar texts were published in English, the word "one" was added. It should be noted that when the translation of the Missal currently in use was in progress, ICEL pointed out the discrepancy to the Congregation in Rome, but was told to retain the use of "one God" in the new translation.

In light of the Congregation's most recent direction in this matter, the Latin Rite Bishops of the USCCB have voted to amend no. 54 of the U.S. text of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal to reflect the change, and the Congregation has confirmed this decision, as it already has for the Episcopal Conferences of England and Wales, Ireland, and Canada.

This change to the concluding doxology of orations is to be implemented on Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021. The words "one God, for ever and ever" are simply replaced with "God, for ever and ever." It is likely a change that will take ongoing repetition to fully integrate into the liturgical practice of each priest.

Fasting: Catholics over eighteen and up to the beginning of their sixtieth year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are the days of fasting. On these days, only one full meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed.

Abstinence: Catholics over fourteen years of age are bound to the obligations of abstinence. Abstinence is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent. On abstinence days, meat may not be used at all.

Regarding other weekdays of Lent, participation in daily Mass and the voluntary observance of fasting is recommended. Commendable, particularly during Lent, is generosity to local, national and world programs of sharing our abundance, the traditional Lenten Devotions and all the self-denial summed up in the concept of "mortification."

"Christ Ministered to By Angels," James Tissot French, c. 1886-1894

FAITH IN ART:

Rejecting art-historical traditions in which Jesus takes material sustenance from the angels in the form of dates and pomegranates, Tissot insisted on otherworldly agency.

In this image, Jesus lies prostrate on the ground, His arms outstretched as if already on the Cross. He is surrounded by row upon row of faintly seen, blue tinged airy spirits, each of whose heads bears a star-like flame.

Through his use of thin layers of color to represent the angels against the darkness of the night sky, Tissot captures the hue of moonlight. Here, however, their moonlit color comes not from themselves, nor from the sun, but from the Incarnate Son who lies before them.

Further, by his distortion of proportions (a few of the angels have arms that would be impossibly long for most human beings) he emphasizes the non-human nature of these spirits. They offer Jesus, not material, bodily refreshment, but spiritual sustenance, consolation and adoration.

This year, which Pope Francis has named the Year of St. Joseph, is a time to reflect on the life and witness of the great patron saint of fathers. We are also entering into the season of Lent, a time when we solemnly reflect on the life, passion, and death of Jesus and practice selfless works of love through which we grow closer to Jesus and His most Sacred Heart. As we walk together through this sacred time of sacrifice and mercy, let us embrace the humble ways of St. Joseph, who was the devoted spouse of our Blessed Mother, Mary, and the earthly father to their Son, Jesus Christ, our Redeemer.

Although we do not hear much at all about St. Joseph in the scriptures, we know that his humble obedience to God and faithfulness to his family made him a primary example of faith, hope, and unconditional love. Let us invite St. Joseph to accompany us during Lent as we embrace the Spiritual and Corporal Acts of Mercy. (CCC 2447) Ask St. Joseph to teach you, as he taught Jesus, to be obedient to God the Father and to embrace all people with the compassion and mercy.

As a parent or guardian, please guide your child(ren) through this Lenten journey. Each day contains an offering either in word or deed. If you feel one of the suggestions is not doable, replace it with one of your own. In-kind or monetary donations can be set aside and made all at once at the end of Lent for your convenience. For reference, the Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy are as follows:

SPIRITUAL WORKS OF MERCY

- 1. Admonish the Sinner: James 5:19-20 "My brothers, if anyone among you should stray from the truth and someone bring him back, he should know that whoever brings back a sinner from the error of his ways will save a soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins."
- 2. Instruct the Ignorant: Matthew 16:15-16 "He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter said in reply, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.'"
- **3.** Counsel the Doubtful: John 14:27 "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do, I give it to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid."
- 4. Comfort the Sorrowful: Matthew 11:28 "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest."
- 5. Bear Wrongs Patiently: Luke 6:27-28 "But to you who hear I say, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you."
- 6. Forgive Offences Willingly: Matthew 6:14 "If you forgive others their transgressions [sin wrongdoing], your heavenly Father will forgive you."
- 7. Pray for the Living and the Dead: Ephesians 6:18 "With all prayer and supplication, pray at every opportunity in the Spirit. To that end, be watchful with all perseverance and supplication for all the holy ones."

CORPORAL WORKS OF MERCY

- 1. Feed the Hungry: Matthew 25:35 "For I was hungry, and you gave me food, I was thirsty, and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me."
- 2. Clothe the Naked: Matthew 25:36 "I was naked, and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me."
- **3.** Shelter the Homeless: Matthew 25:35 "For I was hungry, and you gave me food, I was thirsty, and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me."
- 4. Visit the Sick and Imprisoned: Matthew 25:36 "[I was] naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me."

HOW TO ATTEND WEEKEND MASS ~ SAFETY PROCEDURES

(Daily Mass is exactly the same, except that there is no preregistration or sign in upon arrival. To save cleaning, only nave seating will be used on weekdays. To allow deep cleaning, the Saturday 9 AM Mass is suspended).

Please note that these rules have been mandated for all churches for health safety compliance. We did not devise them, but we must follow them in order to reopen.

For their protection, the elderly and those with underlying health vulnerabilities are discouraged from attending in Phase One. Anyone with a fever or other symptoms of illness should also not attend.

1) Pre-sign up for a Mass via Sign Up Genius. After taping the church pews apart by 6 feet, our allowed capacity is now 140 people per Mass (usually 600). Sign Ups are here: <u>https://stmarysholliston.com/</u>



2) Bring hand sanitizer with you and wear a mask at all times. Children under the age of two should not wear masks. Parents should judge for children between the ages of two and five whether they should wear a mask. All people who claim an exemption because of health can forego wearing a mask.

3) Bring a printout of the Mass Bible Readings if desired. To avoid possible cross-contamination, we are not permitted to provide missals or handouts. You may find the readings easily at: http://www.usccb.org/bible/ by calendar date. You can also access these on your smartphone, but please shut that ringer off for Mass! :)

4) Enter the church through the front center door facing the Town Hall, or the elevator if handicapped. Only these entrances will be accessible. If using the elevator, PLEASE hand sanitize before touching the glass entry door handles and elevator push buttons.

5) Sanitize your hands immediately upon entering the church. We have a limited supply of sanitizer for anyone who forgets to bring some, but please try to bring your own.

6) Sign in with the door volunteers at the Mass for which you preregistered.

7) Upon entering the church proper, keep your mask on at all times and follow 6 foot social distancing - except for families who may sit together as a group. Every other pew is taped off, and blue tape in each pew center marks out a 6 foot area between opposite ends of the same pew.

8) Please refrain from singing – spoken responses only.

9) For Holy Communion, follow the blue arrows which are spaced 6 feet apart. Receive with your mask on, in the hands only. Then step away from the Communion table. Once 6 feet from the priest or minister, remove your mask, place the Host in your mouth, and then immediately put your mask back in place.

10) If using the bathrooms in the Parish Center, follow the arrows to use one stairwell to go down and the other to come back up. This avoids people passing each other closely on the stairs.

11) Participants at Mass are asked to leave the church within a couple of minutes of the end of the Mass so as to allow time for cleaning the church before the next Mass. No social gatherings are permitted after Mass.

12) Please remove any papers or trash from your pew when you exit and place it in the receptacles provided at the church entrances. Please do not leave anything in the pew where a cleaner would have to touch it!

13) Shared collection baskets are not permitted, so no collection can be taken up at Mass. Please continue to make your weekly offertory support via Automatic Giving, WeShare, or by mailing in or dropping off your envelope via the rectory mail-slot. Thank you!

Throughout time, Almighty God has moved people to set apart places to pray, to worship, and to meet with God. Almighty God, we thank you for making us in Your image, for making Your presence known, and for calling us to know You. We set apart this time and this place for Your worship. Sanctify it all, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. May all we do here be to Your glory. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen. At this time, light your candle.

COMMUNION TIME: If watching Mass, make an Act of Spiritual Communion at Communion time. See Prayer Left.

MISSION OF THE REDEEMER



The Encyclical Letter "Mission of the Redeemer" (Redemptoris Missio) was promulgated by Pope John Paul II (JP II) in 1990. JPII explains in his letter that Jesus Christ entrusted His mission to the Church and that the mission is still in its infancy. Thus, forty one years ago, JP II realized that we must commit ourselves completely to this service and proclaim God's wonderful works.

JPII explained, "What moves me even more to proclaim the urgency of missionary evangelization is the fact that it is the primary service which the Church can render to every individual and to all humanity in the modern world; a world which seems to have lost its sense of ultimate realities and existence of self. Christ the Redeemer fully reveals man to himself.... "The person who wishes to understand himself thoroughly... must ...draw near to Christ..."

As he began his pontificate, JPII stated that the Church's fundamental function in every age, and particularly in ours, is to direct man's gaze, to point the awareness and experience of the whole of humanity toward the mystery of Christ. The Church's universal mission is born in Jesus Christ, as is stated in our Trinitarian profession of faith: "I believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father. . . For us men and for our salvation He came down from heaven; by the power of the Holy Spirit He became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man."

JPII was concerned for God's people in the modern world as he stated that there is a tendency to reduce man to his horizontal dimension alone. Without openness to the Absolute, what does man become? The answer is found in the experience of every individual, but it is also written in the history of humanity, in the blood shed in the name of ideologies or by political regimes which have sought to build a "new humanity" without God. Folks, it is now FY 2021 and it is Christ's command that we persevere to convert the heart of the world to Him.

IMPORTANT CORI AND PGC INFORMATION ~

FY2021 CORI VOLUNTEER RENEWAL ALERT:

Ministry Leaders must make sure that **all** their active volunteers (18 years and older) renew and complete a **FY 2021 CORI.** If you are planning to volunteer in any ministry, you must complete a **2021 CORI** form. You can scan in your license and completed 2021 CORI form and send it back to: <u>st.marysre1870@gmail.com</u>. Please call the Religious Education Office at 508-429-6076 if you need a **2021 CORI** form. It is important that all sections of the CORI form marked by an asterisk be completed in order to be properly processed. Thank you.

NOTICE: Due to the current restrictions and health concerns presented by the pandemic, the office of Risk Management at the Archdiocese has made the following **temporary adjustments** to their adult child protection training requirements. All employees and all volunteers who may have contact with children are required to complete Protecting God's Children training. However, due to our current inability to gather together for live trainings, volunteers can currently meet this requirement through participation in two online trainings: VIRTUS Online PGC Training and Massachusetts Online Mandated Reporter Training.

To complete the Online PGC Training, volunteers should go to <u>www.virtusonline.org</u>.

Click on "First time registrant."

On the next page click on "Begin the registration process."

Select "Boston" from the drop down list of dioceses and complete the registration process.

Once the registration is complete, you will be directed to an <u>online PGC training through VIRTUS</u>. Upon completion of that training, individuals will be directed to a link to an <u>additional online training on mandated</u> reporting in Massachusetts. Both online trainings must be completed to be in compliance with child protection requirements.

While staff are working from home, email and phone messages are checked at least hourly during normal work hours.
