From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

"Widows" are the common theme presented to us by this weekend's scriptures. Two different widows appear - the widow of Zarepath, who gives succor to the prophet Elijah in our first reading; and then the poor widow in the temple, who impresses Jesus by putting into the temple treasury all she had to live on, giving "not from her surplus wealth, but from her want." These widows are united by their generosity and compassion for others, even when they themselves possess very limited means.

One of the most beautiful women of faith I know is a widow; Mrs. Carrie Turner, who used to cook dinner on Saturday nights at St. Clement's Rectory in Somerville. Carrie's husband died about fifteen years before I met her in 1993, and her hospitality as a widow extended far beyond her parish priests. In fact, shortly after her husband's passing Carrie began renting out two rooms in her house; the rule being that you weren't a tenant, you were family. Even when she retired from the rectory and was slowed down by neuropathy, Carrie still invited friends to dinner at her home when she was up to it. (Her pepper steak was out of this world). The Common of Holy Women in the Liturgy of the Hours contains the following petition which always reminds me of Carrie when I pray it: "For widows, who ease their loneliness through hospitality."

This weekend's scriptures reveal that my friend Carrie is just one in a long line of widows who have taken in or otherwise supported people in distress. Having lost their husbands, these women know intimately what it feels like to be alone in the world. Through a kind of "ministry of hospitality" many of them bring consolation and love to others, and in so doing they find solace for themselves. By welcoming Elijah to her house and table, for instance, the widow of Zarepath saved Elijah and preserved him from his enemies. But she also was blessed – both by flour that did not run out and oil that did not run dry, and also by companionship and friendship. After all, the scriptures relate that Elijah stayed with the widow and her son for an entire year. Likewise, the widow who put all her money into the temple treasury was reaching out to support others in the kind of need she had experienced firsthand.

Widows in the time of Jesus were frighteningly vulnerable, bereft not only of a husband's love, but of his financial support and protection. In fact both the Hebrew and Greek words for widow stem from roots meaning "helpless" or "forsaken." It was perhaps not so much despite her poverty that the widow gave all her coin to the temple, but rather because of her poverty. Having experienced through widowhood a desperate struggle to survive, she desired to support the work of the temple in its outreach to others suffering as she was. May our own experiences of want always inspire a similar compassion and generosity in us.

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

For the past 61 years, St. Mary's, Holliston has relied on the Grand Annual – a once a year special collection that goes entirely toward parish operating costs. In combination with the weekly offertory, the Grand Annual allows St. Mary's to pay her bills and maintain her four buildings, three of which are over 100 years old.

As you know, the Grand Annual always takes place in November. The 2021 St. Mary's Grand Annual Collection is **Next Weekend - November 13 & 14**. The goal is \$150,000 – the same as 2020 which despite the pandemic was achieved.

The single largest facilities items covered by this year's Grand Annual are electrical in nature. First, the thirtyyear-old church sanctuary lighting system must be replaced. The technology is now outdated such that bulbs for it are no longer being made and are unavailable. We have only a six-month bulb supply on hand, so this work is time sensitive. The old church system will be taken out, and new lighting installed – higher up, less obtrusive, and more energy efficient. The new system will also allow us to light the area in front of the altar for weddings, funerals, concerts, and the Good Friday Stations of the Cross. The removal of the old system, and the purchase and installation of the new comes to \$41,850.

The second electrical project involves the long overdue upgrading of the wiring in our "Annex Classroom" building. On April 3, 2022, this 170-year-old building is going to be dedicated as "Sister Ricci House," in loving memory of our dear Sister Ricci Lloyd, CSJ, who went home to God on April 4, 2016. A new sign will be unveiled and Sister's portrait placed within. While most of this building will continue to be used for Religious Education classes, part of the first floor is now needed for office space and will be refurbished for that purpose. Unfortunately, this building still relies largely on antique "knob and tube wiring." For safety purposes, this will all be replaced with modern wiring, and upgrades made to allow for the use of computers and photocopiers. This electrical work comes in at \$8,930, plus an additional \$7,000 for wall and flooring repairs, painting, and office furniture.

Other 2021 Grand Annual needs include the church door repairs and threshold / frame replacements completed this past summer (\$11,200); and monitor screens and DVD players for all the Religious Education classrooms (\$1,600). The remaining amount is applied to staff salaries (\$79,420).

Since successfully paying off the last of her \$1.2 million loan debts in the fall of 2010, St. Mary's has been able to pay her bills and remains debt free. Your generous support of St. Mary's 2021 Grand Annual will assure that the hard-won financial health of our parish continues. We realize that these current economic times are difficult for many. But if we all do what we can according to our means, then the 2021 Grand Annual will be a success. Thank you in advance for your generosity. And thank you for the many ways you personally help to build up our beautiful parish family.

WISDOM FROM THE EARLY CHURCH:

Commentary by Paulinus of Nola

"What have you," asks the Apostle, "that you have not received?" This means, beloved, that we should not be miserly, regarding possessions as our own, but should rather invest what has been entrusted to us.

We have been entrusted with the administration and use of temporal wealth for the common good, not with the everlasting ownership of private property. If you accept the fact that ownership on earth is only for a time, you can earn eternal possessions in heaven.

Call to mind the widow who forgot herself in her concern for the poor, and, thinking only of the life to come, gave away all her means of subsistence, as the judge himself bears witness.

Others, Jesus says, have given of their superfluous wealth; but she, possessed of only two small coins and more needy perhaps than many of the poor - though in spiritual riches she surpassed all the wealthy - she thought only of the world to come, and had such a longing for heavenly treasure that she gave away, all at once, whatever she had that was derived from the earth and destined to return there.

Let us then invest with the Lord what he has given us, for we have nothing that does not come from him: we are dependent upon him for our very existence. And we ourselves particularly, who have a special and a greater debt, since God not only created us but purchased us as well - what can we regard as our own when we do not possess even ourselves?

But let us rejoice that we have been bought at a great price, the price of the Lord's own blood, and that because of this we are no longer worthless slaves. For there is a freedom that is baser than slavery, namely, freedom from justice. Whoever has that kind of freedom is a slave of sin and a prisoner of death.

So let us give back to the Lord the gifts he has given us; let us give to him who receives in the person of every poor man or woman. Let us give gladly, I say, and great joy will be ours when we receive his promised reward.
