CHRIST THE KING SUNDAY: The final Sunday of the Liturgical year, is a feast day that focuses on the authority of Christ. While the problems our world faces today differ from the particular events that inspired Pope Pius XI to establish this feast in the 1920s, his message and call to honor Christ the King in a society that denies the authority of Our Lord is no less pertinent now than it was then.

• The Solemnity of Christ the King is a newer feast in the Catholic Church; it was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925. The pontiff was witness to a turbulent time in the world's history. Secularism was on the rise and dangerous dictatorships were emerging in Europe and beyond. Christ had long been referred to as King, but Pope Pius and the Christian faithful saw the respect and reverence for Christ's authority waning in the midst of the unrest during the first part of the 20th century. In response, the feast was set with the intent to reaffirm and refocus faith and respect in the kingship of Jesus. On the importance of the public world recognizing the kingly authority of Jesus, Pope Pius XI wrote:

"When once men recognize, both in private and in public life, that Christ is King, society will at last receive the great blessings of real liberty, well-ordered discipline, peace and harmony. Our Lord's regal office invests the human authority of princes and rulers with a religious significance; it ennobles the citizen's duty of obedience.

Further, if princes and magistrates duly elected are filled with the persuasion that they rule, not by their own right, but by the mandate and in the place of the Divine King, they will exercise their authority piously and wisely, and they will make laws and administer them, having in view the common good and also the human dignity of their subjects. The result will be a stable peace and tranquility, for there will be no longer any cause of discontent."

Pope Pius XI was hoping for these effects to occur:

That nations would see that the Church has the right to religious freedom.

That leaders and nations would see that they are bound to give respect to Christ.

That the faithful would gain strength and courage from the celebration of the feast, as we are reminded that Christ must reign in our hearts, minds, wills, and bodies.

The feast was initially fixed to the final day of October, the day before All Saints Day. Later, in 1969, Pope Paul VI moved the feast to the last Sunday before Advent, to emphasize the importance of the feast. This is fitting within the Church year. The liturgical year begins with Advent, the season of awaiting the coming of Christ, and now the year ends with celebrating the Kingship of Christ. 

CHRIST THE KING ~ KING OF THE UNIVERSE

The Liturgical year of Ordinary Time is coming to a close and on the last Sunday before the first Sunday of Advent begins we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King.

This feast is designed to give special recognition to the dominion Christ our Lord has over all aspects of our lives. But why and how did it come about? And why is it so important today? Governments were in economic chaos, unemployment was rampant and people in many places were literally starving to death. Pessimism, a sense of helplessness compounded by hatred among the nations, was overwhelming. The festering philosophies of fascism, National Socialism (the Nazis) and communism now spawned people like Benito Mussolini, Adolf Hitler and Joseph Stalin. Pope Pius XI's predecessor, Pope Benedict XV, had warned about this prophetically in 1920 when he wrote, "There can be no stable peace or lasting treaties, though made after long and difficult negotiations and duly signed, unless there be a return of mutual charity to appease hate and banish enmity." During these times people clung to anyone who offered them hope and direction out of the chaos and promised to put food on their tables such as the dictators. In despair they sought to be self-sufficient leaving God out of their everyday lives.

Many people considered the basics of morality and the teachings of the Church to be out of date, no longer relevant in 20th-century. The new Modern thinking allowed that, Christ might be king in the private life of the individual, but not in the public world. Even political regimes advocated the banishment of Jesus altogether, not only from society, but from the family as well. As nations were being reborn and governments restructured after World War I, their foundations, policies and laws were often being fashioned without regard to Christian moral principles and values.

With all this chaos in the world, the new Pope Pius XI witnessed the denial of Christ in favor of a lifestyle dominated by secularism, materialism and a false hope created by these new dictators. He knew that he had to address the political and economic forces that were crowding out the kingship of Jesus.

To guide the people back to Christ, the pope dedicated his reign to "The Peace of Christ in the Kingdom of Christ" (Pax Christi in Regno Christi). And in 1925, the Church celebrated a jubilee year in honor of the 1,600th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea. The council fathers taking part in that ancient gathering in A.D. 325 had affirmed the full divinity of Jesus Christ as God the Son, one in being with God the Father. Their pronouncement became a creed that was later expanded into what we now call the Nicene Creed, which we still profess to this very day at Mass on Sunday.

Throughout the jubilee year, Pope Pius constantly emphasized the kingship of Christ as declared in the Creed: "His kingdom will have no end." He stressed that theme throughout the year as it repeatedly appeared in the Church's celebrations of the Annunciation, the Epiphany, the Transfiguration and the Ascension. His efforts resulted in hundreds of thousands of pilgrims flocking to Rome, demonstrating great fervor for their faith during the Holy Year.

Thus, on December 11 of the jubilee year, in order to acknowledge perpetually the supremacy of Jesus Christ over all men, nations and earthly allegiances, the Pope Pius XI issued the encyclical *Quas Primas*, which added the feast of "Our Lord Jesus Christ the King" to the annual Church liturgical calendar.

All praise and Glory to Christ the King of all Nations and the Universe.
