

FOR ALL THE SAINTS!

This coming Tuesday, November 1, we celebrate a great Feast of the Church – the Solemnity of All Saints. The Church has always honored those early witnesses to the Christian faith who have died in the Lord. In fact the Greek word for ‘witness’ is martyr. During the first three hundred years Christians were severely persecuted, often suffering torture and violent death - because they were faithful. They refused to deny Christ, even when this denial might have saved their own lives, or the lives of their children and families. The early history of the Church is filled with stories of the heroic faith of these witnesses to Christ's truth. The stories of these saints - these baptized Christians of all ages and all states in life, whose fidelity and courage led to their sanctity or holiness - have provided models for every other Christian throughout history.



Many of those especially holy people whose names and stories were known, the Church later canonized (that is, the Church formally recognized that the life of that person was without any doubt holy or sanctified - a ‘saint’ who is an example for us.) The Church's calendar contains many saint's days, which Catholics observe at Mass - some with special festivities. But there were thousands and thousands of early Christian martyrs, the majority of whose names are known only to God - and throughout the history of the Church there have been countless others who really are saints, who are with God in heaven, even if their names are not on the list of canonized saints.

In order to honor the memory - and our own debt - to these unnamed saints, and to recall their example, the Church dedicated a special feast day - a sort of ‘memorial day’ - so that all living Christians would celebrate at a special Mass the lives and witness of those who have died and gone before us into the presence of the Lord. This feast that we know as All Saint's Day originated as a feast of All Martyrs, in Rome sometime in the 4th century. Pope Gregory IV (827-844) extended the celebration of All Saints to November 1 for the entire Church. It is a principal feast of the Catholic Church and a Holy Day of Obligation, which means that all Catholics are to attend Mass on that day.”

It might be worthwhile for all of us, parents in particular, to consider the time and effort we put into the secular holiday of Halloween, which also falls this coming week. Let us add up the time and expense of getting supplied with Halloween candy, decorating, preparing costumes, and trick or treating Monday night. Then let us compare all of that to the one hour of prayer at Mass our faith asks of us this Tuesday in order to honor and seek the aid of the saints. Halloween is a fun night, and as always the rectory will be decked out and well stocked with goodies for the little ones who come by (angel costumes get you extra). But let us be very careful that our children do not see us go all out for Halloween, only to fall short in honoring the Saints of God the very next day. Let us like the saints themselves, be good witnesses of what is most important in life.




NOVENA FOR THE HOLY SOULS IN PURGATORY AT ST. MARY'S CHURCH:

From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

In Catholic tradition, the month of November is dedicated in a special way to our beloved dead. As the leaves fall and the days grow shorter, we find our thoughts naturally turning toward the end things. In a special way we remember those who have already entered the winter of death and wait now for the springtime of the Resurrection. We honor their memories and more importantly, we give them the gift of our prayers.

Praying for the dead is a practice endorsed by the scriptures. We read in 2nd Maccabees how a great Jewish general sent gifts to the temple in Jerusalem, asking that prayers be said for his fallen soldiers. The scripture then observes that "In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way, inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in view; for if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again, it would have been useless and foolish to pray for them in death. But as he did this with a view to the splendid reward that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought. Thus he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from sin." (2 Macc. 12:43-46)

Most of our protestant brothers and sisters eschew praying for the dead, rightly observing that we each choose for ourselves whether to accept or refuse Christ in this life. Once death occurs, our choice is final and judged before God. "For we must all stand before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one might receive recompense according to what he did in the body, whether for good or for evil." (2 Cor. 5) Those who are judged worthy have no need of our prayers, they argue. And those who have rejected God's offer of salvation are beyond the help of our prayers. Why then pray for the dead at all?

The answer lies in one of the most beautiful and consoling truths of the Catholic faith – our belief in purgatory. Purgatory is a gift from God extended to those found worthy of His kingdom at the time of death. Many of us may ultimately choose Christ, but still have experienced sin, and the ravages of sin upon our soul, during our life's journey. Purgatory is the cleansing flame by which we are purified and made new in the Lord. We are restored to our best and truest selves –

innocent and whole – before we enter fully into the divine presence.

Consider a man who has completed a long and dangerous journey to a city. He arrives there safely, but along the way has picked up dirt and grime from the road. His clothes have gotten worn and torn, and he himself is a little battered and bruised. Upon entering the city, this man is invited to come up to the palace and dine with the king at a great feast. Forever. Would that man not want first to rest and heal? To put aside his soiled garments, wash, and don his finest apparel before entering into the presence of the king?

That is the gift of purgatory – the opportunity to be purified and restored. Having passed through purgatory, the saved are then able to take their place at the table of God's children in heaven at their very best – able to reflect fully, and enjoy to the most perfect extent, the light and glory of God. The experience of purgatory is painful, as we face in turn each of our wounds, each of our sins. No longer is any self-deception possible – only truth and new awareness of ourselves and of the Lord. The pain of purgatory is the pain of an open wound being sewn up, a broken limb being reset. It is difficult, but we go through it knowing that new health and a new life, await us.


Nor do we face purgatory alone. Faith teaches us that the prayers of our loved ones on earth and the prayers of the saints and angels in heaven support us through our purification. Most powerful of all is the prayer offered when the Mass is said for us – the sacrament of Christ's own death and resurrection. The Mass like nothing else can support and encourage and help us on the final journey between this life and eternal joy in the Lord. And thus it is that we pray for the dead. We do not know which souls are in purgation, and so we pray for All Souls, begging the mercy and grace of God upon them.

Starting this Wednesday night, please feel free to inscribe in the Book of Remembrance the names of any departed loved ones you would like kept in prayer here at St. Mary's throughout the month of November. The Book will be located in front of the Easter Candle. If you would like a Mass said for a departed loved one, please contact the rectory office. Finally, please keep in your own prayers the persons buried from St. Mary's since last All Souls.

May the Lord of Our Journey
continue to bless you and yours.

TODAY’S GOSPEL ~ LOST AND FOUND: *Jesus is shockingly hard on the rich. In the four “Woes” that parallel the four Beatitudes in the Sermon on the Plain (Luke 6:24-26), Jesus categorically condemns the rich. Filled, laughing, and well thought of now, the rich will be hungry, grieving, and weeping. Zacchaeus, the protagonist of today’s Gospel, would seem a prime candidate for those woes. Not only is he rich; he is rich in the worst way. He has become wealthy by exploiting his people by collecting taxes for the hated Romans. And he is a chief tax collector, meaning that he has profited from the exploitation done by others, the collectors who work under him. Yet the narrative shows him to be one of the New Testament’s clearest examples of Christian conversion.*

Luke is careful to hint at what it was that opened this man to Jesus' call to a change of heart. Luke says that Zacchaeus was "seeking to see who Jesus was," and that because he was short he climbed up a sycamore tree in order to see Jesus. In describing the man in this way, Luke surely presumes that we have not forgotten what we have read in the passages immediately preceding this account in his Gospel.

Luke 18 is full of talk about the kingdom of God and who gets to enter it. "Amen, I say to you, whoever does not accept the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it" (Lk 18:17). This is immediately illustrated by the counterexample of the rich official who refuses Jesus' invitation because of his attachment to his wealth. This is followed by the famous sayings about the near impossibility of the wealthy entering the kingdom, followed by the hopeful hint that "what is impossible for human beings is possible for God." There follows the third prediction of the passion to the Twelve, who fail to comprehend. Then comes the curing of a blind man who knows exactly what ails him: "Lord, please let me see." To which Jesus replies, "Have sight; your faith has saved you."

With these episodes in the immediate background, we can recognize that Zacchaeus has what the rich ruler (blinded by his wealth) lacked. However ill-gotten his wealth, Zacchaeus has retained a childlike ability to keep seeking the truth. He really wants to see who Jesus is. And "fat cat" though he may be, he has the childlike capacity to take the necessary means to see Jesus: he scampers up a tree to get a better look. When Jesus calls him by name and invites himself into the tax collector's hospitality, Zacchaeus receives him with joy. Predictably, the general population objects to this further example of Jesus' eating with tax collectors and sinners. Zacchaeus shows the effect of this encounter with Jesus by announcing his resolve to amend his ways: "Behold, half of my possessions. Lord, I shall give to the poor, and if I have extorted anything from anyone I shall repay it four times over."

Zacchaeus is expressing a resolve issuing from a deep change of heart resulting from his reception of Jesus ... Nothing is impossible with God; even a heart toughened by ill-gotten wealth can be changed if there is a residue of childlike seeking and openness. - Rev. Dennis Hamm, reprinted with permission.


