FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

In Catholic tradition, the month of November is dedicated in a special way to our beloved dead. As the leaves fall and the days grow shorter, we find our thoughts naturally turning toward the end things. In a special way we remember those who have already entered the winter of death and wait now for the springtime of the Resurrection. We honor their memories and more importantly, we give them the gift of our prayers.

Praying for the dead is a practice endorsed by the scriptures. We read in 2nd Maccabees how a great Jewish general sent gifts to the temple in Jerusalem, asking that prayers be said for his fallen soldiers. The scripture then observes that "In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way, inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in view; for if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again, it would have been useless and foolish to pray for them in death. But as he did this with a view to the splendid reward that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought. Thus he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from sin." (2 Macc. 12:43-46)

Most of our protestant brothers and sisters eschew praying for the dead, rightly observing that we each choose for ourselves whether to accept or refuse Christ in this life. Once death occurs, our choice is final and judged before God. "For we must all stand before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one might receive recompense according to what he did in the body, whether for good or for evil." (2 Cor. 5) Those who are judged worthy have no need of our prayers, they argue. And those who have rejected God's offer of salvation are beyond the help of our prayers. Why then pray for the dead at all?

The answer lies in one of the most beautiful and consoling truths of the Catholic faith – our belief in purgatory. Purgatory is a gift from God extended to those found worthy of His kingdom at the time of death. Many of us may ultimately choose Christ, but still have experienced sin, and the ravages of sin upon our soul, during our life's journey. Purgatory is the cleansing flame by which we are purified and made new in the Lord. We are restored to our best and truest selves – innocent and whole – before we enter fully into the divine presence.

Consider a man who has completed a long and dangerous journey to a city. He arrives there safely, but along the way has picked up dirt and grime from the road. His clothes have gotten worn and torn, and he himself is a little battered and bruised. Upon entering the city, this man is invited to come up to the palace and dine with the king at a great feast. Forever. Would that man not want first to rest and heal? To put aside his soiled garments, wash, and don his finest apparel before entering into the presence of the king?

That is the gift of purgatory – the opportunity to be purified and restored. Having passed through purgatory, the saved are then able to take their place at the table of God's children in heaven at their very best – able to reflect fully, and enjoy to the most perfect extent, the light and glory of God. The experience of purgatory is painful, as we face in turn each of our wounds, each of our sins. No longer is any self-deception possible – only truth and new awareness of ourselves and of the Lord. The pain of purgatory is the pain of an open wound being sewn up, a broken limb being reset. It is difficult, but we go through it knowing that new health, and indeed a new life, await us.

Nor do we face purgatory alone. Faith teaches us that the prayers of our loved ones on earth and the prayers of the saints and angels in heaven support us through our purification. Most powerful of all is the prayer offered when the Mass is said for us – the sacrament of Christ's own death and resurrection. The Mass like nothing else can support and encourage and help us on the final journey between this life and eternal joy in the Lord. And thus it is that we pray for the dead. We do not know which souls are in purgation, and so we pray for All Souls, begging the mercy and grace of God upon them.

God bless you. And may the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace.

Many have been asking for news of our Sister Parish in Palestine during these tragic times in the Holy Land. Below are messages received from Fr. Issa, the Pastor, and Mr. Jaraysah, the School Principal.

October 21, 2023, From Fr. Issa:

Dear Father Mark and Brothers and Sisters in Saint Mary's Parish. Here in the Bethlehem area it is calm. Just that the Israeli army enters every night to arrest people. They arrested 1,000 persons in Palestinian territory.

The situation in Gaza is really very bad. Many people were killed by Israeli army, among them 1,661 children. Many building were destroyed, houses, hospitals and church buildings. The last attack destroyed an ancient building which belongs to the Greek Orthodox Church. In this building, 350 Christians refugees were buried in rubble. As of now 28 persons were saved, and 20 persons found killed (6 of them children). Most of them remain lost under the rubble.

We really don't know when it will finish. We hear many Rumours about how the war will continue or end but what seems to us is that the war will continue for several weeks.

Our people in Holy Land need your prayer, because the real peace come from God, not from this world. Peace will be possible when every people gets their rights. Otherwise, things will remain the same from one war to another. So we pray for Love, Peace, fraternity and Justice.

People, from both the Israeli and Palestinian sides, are afraid. Many of them want the war to end. Many of them want the Peace, and it is possible. They can live together. The war is not the solution! The solution begins first when the war stops; when every prisoner and hostage from both sides will be returned safely to his family; when every people gets their legitimate rights.

I end here with words from the book of Psalms 2,10:
"Therefore, you kings, be wise; be warned, you rulers of the earth".

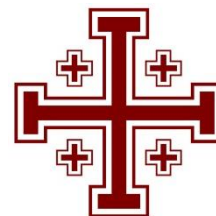
October 28, 2023, From Mr. Jaraysah:

Dear Father Mark, Thanks again for your feelings and prayers for us. Regarding the school: yes, it is open despite some days being obliged to close due to tensions in the area.

The Situation in the Bethlehem is difficult, most of the families whose work is inside Jerusalem lost their jobs and income, the hotels are closed, most of the Christian families who work in olivewood workshops have stopped working due to the lack of tourism in Bethlehem and Jerusalem.

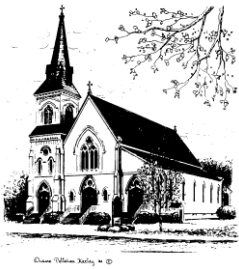

This morning, Friday, October 27, I had the privilege of recording a Zoom conversation with Sami El-Yousef, the CEO of the Latin Patriarchate. During our conversation, Sami touched on many topics including: the situation in Gaza and at the Holy Family Parish, military actions in the West Bank and new movement restrictions, humanitarian needs and economic losses increasing rapidly through the Patriarchate, and the thoughts on the post conflict future. The Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem is the Catholic Bishop of Isreal, Palestine, Jordan and Cyprus. Sami El-Yousef is the CEO of the Latin Patriarchate, or Catholic Diocese, that covers all these areas. In 2020, Sami was instrumental in helping St. Mary's in Holliston connect with a Parish in Palestine to become our Sister Parish.

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

For the past 63 years, St. Mary's, Holliston has relied on the Grand Annual – a once a year special collection that goes entirely toward parish operating costs. In combination with the weekly offertory, the Grand Annual allows St. Mary's to pay her staff and maintain her four buildings, three of which are over 100 years old.

As you know, the Grand Annual always takes place in November. The 2023 St. Mary's Grand Annual Collection is Veteran's Day Weekend - November 11 & 12. The goal is \$150,000 – the same as the 2020, 2021, and 2022 Grand Annuals, which despite the pandemic were all achieved.

The single largest facilities items covered by this year's Grand Annual are the renovation of the Sister Ricci House downstairs bathroom, and upcoming repairs to the church boiler pumps. The bathroom was severely deteriorated, and with Sister Ricci House receiving more and more use by various groups the repair was overdue. Both church boiler pumps have recently developed serious leaks and must be repaired or replaced. Here is a complete Grand Annual breakdown:

\$12,840	Sister Ricci House Bathroom Repairs
\$5,100	Painting inside of Sister Ricci House (1st & 2nd Floor)
\$7,000	New Flooring for Choir Loft and Elevator
\$4,609	Emergency Roof and Siding Repairs from storm damage
\$2,347	Carpeting of Music and Youth Ministry Offices
\$8,408	Crack sealing and Sealcoating of the main Parking Lot
\$3,000	Parking lot repairs
\$6,200	Exterior Church Repairs
\$3,815	Electrical Repairs - Outside Light Poles and Father Haley Hall
\$6,200	Lower Church Emergency Exit Stairwell Repairs
\$9,000	Church Windows Exterior Woodwork Repairs
\$3,000	Sacristy Repairs
\$10,000	Boiler Pumps in Church

The remaining Grand Annual amount is applied to staff salaries (\$68,481).

Since successfully paying off the last of her \$1.2 million loan debts in the fall of 2010, St. Mary's has been able to pay her bills and remains debt free. Your generous support of St. Mary's 2023 Grand Annual will assure that the hard-won financial health of our parish continues. We realize that these current economic times are difficult for many. But if we all do what we can according to our means, then the 2023 Grand Annual will be a success. Thank you in advance for your generosity. And thank you for the many ways you personally help to build up our beautiful parish family.

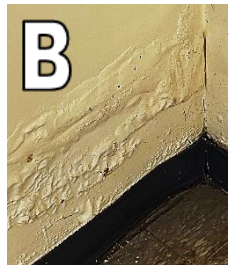

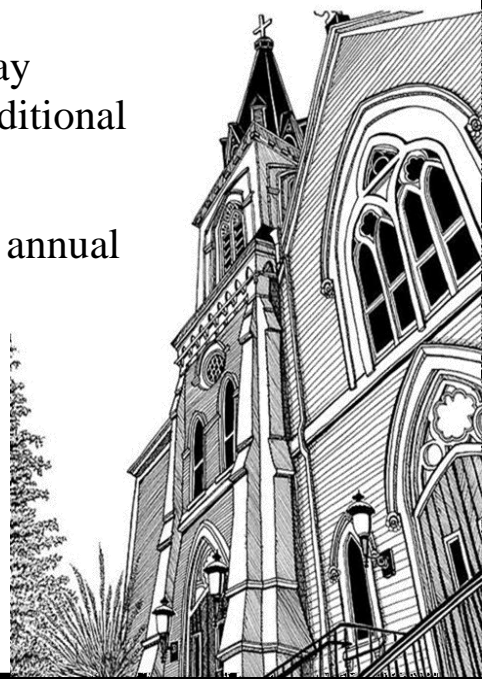

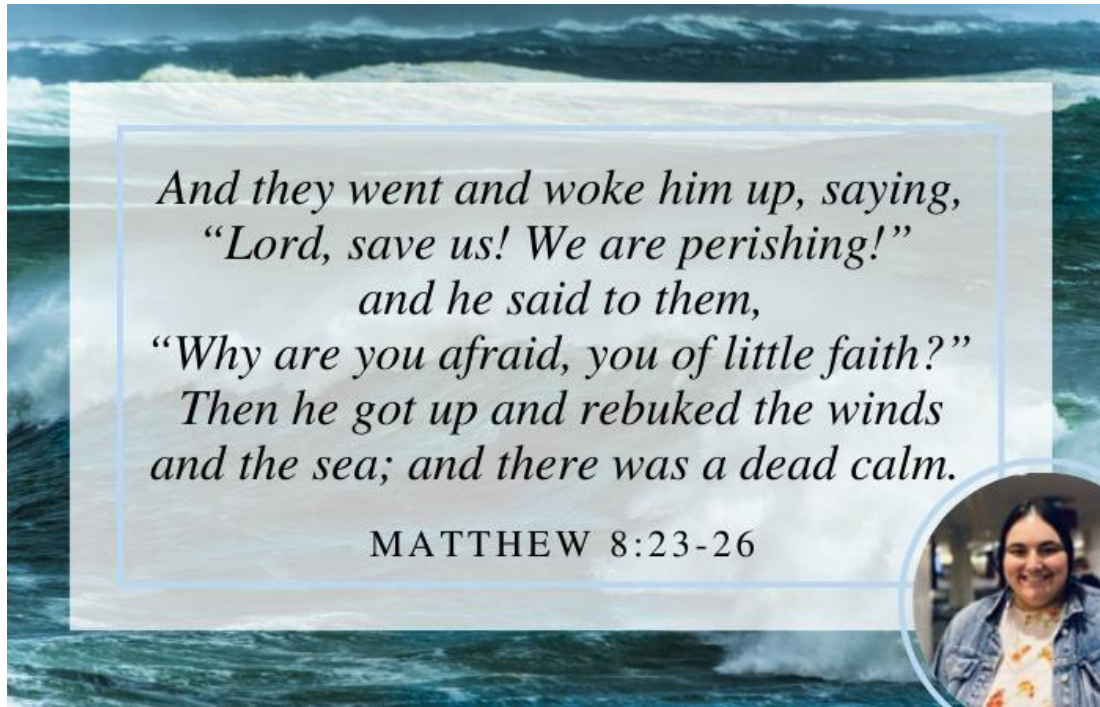
