FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

To see the face of God is our ultimate goal and aspiration as human beings. St. Paul says that "now we see as through a glass darkly," but that in the life to come "we shall see Him face to face and in His light see light and know the splendor of God forever." The thought of spending all eternity looking upon God's face might seem rather less than exciting, until we remember that to see God is to see all truth, all possibility, all that has ever been or could be.

Dante captured this perfectly in his image of the "Heavenly Rose," wherein are ranked like petals in a flower all the holy saints and angels of God. Describing the angels, Dante says, "These beings, since their first bliss in the sight of God's face, in which all things are revealed, have never turned their eyes from their delight." (Paradiso, Canto XXIX)

Although we long for the day when the beatific vision will be ours, today Christ reminds us that we are to seek Him on earth always in the faces of those who are poor or suffering. "Whatsoever you do to the least of these, you do unto me..." (Matthew 25:40).

So often Saint Mother Theresa spoke of seeking Jesus "in His most distressing disguise," an invitation to recognize our Savior's face in the faces of those very persons to whom we may find it most difficult to relate. We may never perfectly see Jesus' face in this life, but we touch Him nonetheless whenever we give, forgive, lift up, or otherwise embrace in love our fellow human beings.

That is why I am so very proud and grateful for the response of our parishioners to the Cardinal's Emergency Winter Clothing Drive for Immigrants and Refugees. Your generosity was truly tremendous, as seen by the following list of items. Many different kinds of donations were made, but they all have this in common – they are destined for the Lord. They are gifts to the Lord. And the Lord will not forget your kindness to Him in His time of need. In His own words, "I was naked and you clothed me." (Matthew 25:36).

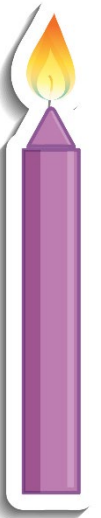

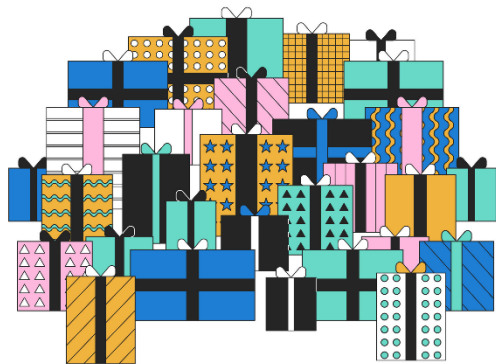


ADVENT IS COMING NEXT SUNDAY! Advent, the start of a New Year in the Church, starts next Sunday, December 3. Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "ad-venire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time and to the anniversary of Our Lord's birth on Christmas.

From the earliest days of the Church, people have been fascinated by Jesus' promise to come back. But the scripture readings during Advent tell us not to waste our time with predictions. Advent is not about speculation. Our Advent readings call us to be alert and ready, not weighted down and distracted by the cares of this world (Lk 21:34-36). Like Lent, the liturgical color for Advent is purple since both are seasons that prepare us for great feast days. Advent also includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas. Read below to learn about the many spiritual offerings at St. Mary's during this season of preparation for the Coming of the Lord!

FEAST OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION ~ A HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION:

Thursday, December 7 Vigil Mass at 6:30 PM. Friday, December 8 Feast Day Masses at 9 AM and 7 PM. The Immaculate Conception is that sacred moment when Mary was conceived in her mother Anna's womb and specially protected by God from any touch of original sin. In this way, Mary became the new Eve, a new beginning for the human race and a pure vessel to receive the Son of God and bear Him into the world. This is the Patronal Feast of the United States of America, a nation consecrated to Mary under her title as the Immaculate Conception.



GIVE A GIFT: December 9 and 10 at all Masses. Once again, we ask the people of St. Mary's to help make Christmas truly a season of sharing. All items go to needy families in Boston, and are distributed through two inner city Catholic parishes. Please bring an article of new clothing and a new toy, unwrapped together in a plain bag or gift bag with a tag stating "Boy" or "Girl" and size or age up to age 18. No adult gifts please. Kindly place your gift in front of St. Mary's altar at any Mass the weekend of December 9 and 10. Gift bags only please.

COOKIE WALK FOR HAITI: December 9 and 10, after all Weekend Masses. Long rows of tables will be set up in the Lower Church Hall – tables

loaded down with over 2,000 delicious homemade cookies baked by St. Mary's Middle School Youth Group Members. For \$6, you may purchase an empty cookie bag, then "walk" down the rows of tables and select a dozen cookies which youths (wearing plastic gloves) will place in your bag. All proceeds will benefit the poor of Haiti, a deeply impoverished nation recently rocked by a presidential assassination, a major earthquake, and a hurricane.

ADVENT ADORATION WITH CONFESSION: Every Monday of Advent, December 4, 11, and 18, from 7 - 8 PM. Bring your day to a restful end by basking in the True Presence of our Eucharistic Lord. Clear and quiet your soul from all that has come between you and God by making a good Confession – especially if it has been awhile. Confession is a healing encounter with Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins. The Lord's mercy, healing, and grace are given to us through this encounter. In it Jesus also strengthens us to resist future or ongoing temptation. The Sacrament of Confession is a moment of accountability for us before the Lord. The Lord's forgiveness and mercy is infinite. Nothing we have done can ever separate us from experiencing God's forgiveness through this sacrament. Confession will also continue to be offered on Saturdays in the church from Noon to 12:45 PM, **except on December 23 when Confessions will not be heard.**

THE LIVING STONES OF BETHLEHEM: Tuesday, December 12, from 7 - 8 PM in the church. Come learn more about Bethlehem, and the "Living Stones of the Church," the Christians who live there today. WHAT IS THE ROSE FOR LIFE? In every Sunday bulletin you see the name of an individual or family who has sponsored the "Rose for Life" that week. This tradition began at St. Mary's twenty-seven years ago. The cost of sponsoring the rose is \$10. Many women come to Pregnancy Help feeling totally alone, isolated and abandoned by family, friends and partners. Others have some support but they are confused and frightened about what to do. Whatever a particular woman's situation might be, Pregnancy Help provides a safe place where she can come, speak from her heart and find the support she needs.

Each year, Pregnancy Help assists more than 350 new clients at their two locations in Brighton and Natick. All their services are free and confidential. Christ the King Sunday, the final Sunday of the Liturgical year, is a feast day that focuses on the authority of Christ. While the problems our world faces today differ from the particular events that inspired Pope Pius XI to establish this feast in the 1920s, his message and call to honor Christ the King in a society that denies the authority of Our Lord is no less pertinent now than it was then.

History of the Feast

The Solemnity of Christ the King is a newer feast in the Catholic Church; it was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925. The pontiff was witness to a turbulent time in the world's history. Secularism was on the rise and dangerous dictatorships were emerging in Europe and beyond. Christ had long been referred to as King, but Pope Pius and the Christian faithful saw the respect and reverence for Christ's authority waning in the midst of the unrest during the first part of the 20th century. In response, the feast was set with the intent to reaffirm and refocus faith and respect in the kingship of Jesus. On the importance of the public world recognizing the kingly authority of Jesus, Pope Pius XI wrote:

"When once men recognize, both in private and in public life, that Christ is King, society will at last receive the great blessings of real liberty, well-ordered discipline, peace and harmony. Our Lord's regal office invests the human authority of princes and rulers with a religious significance; it ennobles the citizen's duty of obedience.

Further, if princes and magistrates duly elected are filled with the persuasion that they rule, not by their own right, but by the mandate and in the place of the Divine King, they will exercise their authority piously and wisely, and they will make laws and administer them, having in view the common good and also the human dignity of their subjects. The result will be a stable peace and tranquility, for there will be no longer any cause of discontent."

Pope Pius XI was hoping for these effects to occur:

That nations would see that the Church has the right to religious freedom.

That leaders and nations would see that they are bound to give respect to Christ.

That the faithful would gain strength and courage from the celebration of the feast, as we are reminded that Christ must reign in our hearts, minds, wills, and bodies.

The feast was initially fixed to the final day of October, the day before All Saints Day. Later, in 1969, Pope Paul VI moved the feast to the last Sunday before Advent, to emphasize the importance of the feast. This is fitting within the Church year. The liturgical year begins with Advent, the season of awaiting the coming of Christ, and now the year ends with celebrating the Kingship of Christ.

History of the Title "Christ the King"

While the feast is relatively new, the tradition of calling Christ "King" is not. Jesus is referred to as King throughout the New Testament: *To the King of ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen* – 1 Tim 1:17

Nathan'a-el answered him, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!" – John 1:49

Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus said, "You have said so." – Mt. 27:11

And this will be made manifest at the proper time by the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. – 1 Tim 6:15

And they sing the song of Moses, the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb, saying, "Great and wonderful are thy deeds, O Lord God the Almighty! Just and true are thy ways, O King of the ages!" – Rev. 15:3

And from Jesus Christ the faithful witness, the first-born of the dead, and the ruler of kings on earth. To him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood. – Rev. 1:5

On his robe and on his thigh he has a name inscribed, King of kings and Lord of lords. – Rev. 19:16

Clearly "King" was one of the earliest titles given to the Son of God. The title does not refer to a status of an earthly king, which many of the Jews had been expecting – someone to overthrow the Roman rule and be earthly king of the Israelites. Rather He came to be the spiritual king; His kingdom is in heaven, not confined to the earth alone. In respecting the name of Christ the King, and in celebrating the yearly feast, both citizens and leaders are to remain reverent and devoted to the higher authority of Christ.

**ADVENT WREATHS AND CANDLES:**

On Sunday, December 3, the Church enters the Liturgical season of Advent.

One of the symbols used in the Church today is the Advent wreath. Many families light their Advent Candles before their evening meal and pray together. Advent wreaths with a brass candle holder are \$15.00 each and a set of Advent candles is \$6.00. These items will be available on Sunday, December 3 in the Center Lobby after the 9:30 AM & 11:30 AM Masses.
