WISDOM FROM THE SAINTS: "The Gospel passages about our Lady show her as the Mother of Jesus, following her Son step by step, playing a part in his redemptive mission, rejoicing and suffering with him, loving those whom Jesus loves, looking after all those around her with maternal care.

Just think, for example, of the marriage at Cana. Our Lady was a guest at one of those noisy country weddings attended by crowds of people from many different villages. But she was the only one who noticed the wine was running out. Don't these scenes from Christ's life seem familiar to us? The greatness of God lives at the level of ordinary things ...

Notice also that it is John who tells the story of Cana. He is the only evangelist who has recorded this example of our mother's concern for us. St. John wants us to remember that Mary was present at the beginning of the public life of our Lord. He alone has appreciated the importance of that fact. Jesus knew to whom he was entrusting his Mother - to a disciple who had learned to understand and love her as his own mother."

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

A dramatic change greets us as we enter the church building this weekend. Gone are the evergreens, poinsettias, and lights of Christmas. In their place is the simplicity of Ordinary Time. The term "ordinary" comes from the word "ordinal," meaning counted. Ordinary Time then, means "counted time," not time that is common or mundane.

The green color worn these days has traditionally been associated with new life and growth. In Hebrew, for instance, the same word for the color "green" also means "young." In our Christian tradition, green has come to symbolize the life of the Church born at Pentecost, as well as symbolizing the hope of new life in the Resurrection.

God delights in us! What a wonderful reminder Isaiah offers in our first reading - that God delights in us even as a new groom delights in his bride. We are not a burden to God, we are not a tedious task for God, we are a delight for God, whose joy is to unite our lives with His own. Even as a man and a woman promise in marriage to be true to one another "in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health," so does God promise to be faithful to us in all the stages and circumstances of our lives.

It is no accident that Jesus chose to perform His very first miracle, the changing of water to wine, at a wedding celebration. Because marriage represents the love and joy with which God embraces those who give themselves to Him, and the totality of His commitment to us. To be wedded to God is to have the watery emptiness of fear and doubt transformed into the rich wine of faith.

As in any marriage, we may be solicitous and faithful to God in varying degrees. But God is the true and perfect Spouse who always forgives, always welcomes us back, and never fails in the promises He has made to us. The more we come to imitate God in our relationships with each other, the more we will share in His delight.

When we find ourselves delighting in God, filled with joy at the realization of His love for us, then we know that our faith is approaching its perfection.


TAROT CARD READINGS

Due to the decision of the Holliston Public Library to host and promote Tarot Card Readings for "Tweens, Teens, and Adults," this past Friday, we provide the following reminder.

"All forms of divination are to be rejected: recourse to Satan or demons, conjuring up the dead or other practices falsely supposed to 'unveil' the future. Consulting horoscopes, astrology, palm reading, interpretation of omens and lots, the phenomena of clairvoyance, and recourse to mediums all conceal a desire for power over time, history, and, in the last analysis, other human beings, as well as a wish to conciliate hidden powers. They contradict the honor, respect, and love that we owe to God alone.

All practices of magic or sorcery, by which one attempts to tame occult powers, so as to place them at one's service and have a supernatural power over others - even if this were for the sake of restoring their health - are gravely contrary to the virtue of religion." (C.C.C. art. 2116 & 2117)

It is true that the faithful Christian has absolutely nothing to fear from spiritual evil of any type, for as St. Paul reminds us, "To the name of Jesus every knee must bend, of those that are in heaven, on earth, and under the earth" (Phil. 2:10). But when we freely choose to open ourselves up, even jokingly, to supernatural forces other than the One, True God, then we render ourselves vulnerable. At worst (and rarely) we might attract some malevolent spiritual attention. At best, we are invoking and placing our needs before powers other than Jesus Christ, a rejection of Him who shed His blood to free us from darkness in all its forms.




K of C FREE THROW CHALLENGE – NEXT SATURDAY, JANUARY 25!

"I could plainly see His heart, pierced and bleeding, yet there were flames, too, coming from it and a crown of thorns around it. He told me to behold His heart which so loved humanity. Then He seemed to take my very heart from me and place it there in His heart. In return He gave me back part of His flaming heart." - St. Margaret Mary Alacoque

Love is symbolized by the heart. The Biblical meaning of the heart is the whole interior life of the person: his or sentiments, memories, thoughts, reasoning and planning. Jesus has the most perfect human feelings and perceptions. He feels the sting of man's ingratitude. He feels the severity of being rejected. This rejection took the form of crucifixion.

He continues to love those who reject his love. He doesn't force us to love him. Every sin is in some way a rejection of Christ's love. Our failure to love him as we should hurts us. It also hurts him. He told St. Margaret Mary that the ingratitude of man for his love was worse than his physical sufferings. We need to console Him and do reparation, first for our own sins and then for those of others.

We console him by placing our faith and trust in him, following his commandments, being faithful to our daily duty, honoring his Sacred Heart, loving God and our neighbor.

Below are the promises of the Sacred Heart of Jesus to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque:

- 1. I will give them all the graces necessary in their state of life.
- 2. I will establish peace in their homes.
- 3. I will comfort them in their afflictions.
- 4. I will be their secure refuge during life, and above all in death.
- 5. I will bestow a large blessing upon all their undertakings.
- 6. Sinners shall find in My Heart the source and the infinite ocean of mercy.
- 7. Tepid souls shall grow fervent.
- 8. Fervent souls shall quickly mount to high perfection.
- 9. I will bless every place where a picture of My Heart shall be set up and honored.
- 10. I will give to priests the gift of touching the most hardened hearts.
- 11. Those who shall promote this devotion shall have their names written in My Heart, never to be blotted out.
- 12. I promise thee in the excessive mercy of My Heart that My all-powerful love will grant to all those who communicate on the First Friday in nine consecutive months, the grace of final penitence; they shall not die in My disgrace nor without receiving the Sacraments; My Divine heart shall be their safe refuge in this last moment.

HAPPY MARTIN LUTHER KING DAY!



As is our custom at St. Mary's, the closing patriotic hymn at our Masses with music this Martin Luther King Weekend is the "Battle Hymn of the Republic." Here is some interesting history about the hymn.

In the early days of the Civil War, the song "John Brown's Body" was wildly popular. Although in its original incarnation it had nothing to do with the notorious abolitionist leader hanged at Harpers' Ferry on December 2, 1859, it became inextricably identified with him and acquired new verses that were sung by Federal troops and Union sympathizers alike. The tune was borrowed from an old Methodist hymn, "Say, Brothers, Will You Meet Us?" by William Steffe.

In November of 1861, Julia Ward Howe (photo above), was touring Union army camps in the vicinity of Washington, D.C., with her husband, Dr. Samuel Gridley Howe, a member of President Lincoln's Military Sanitary Commission and an avid abolitionist. With them was Reverend James Freeman Clarke. During the course of their visit, the soldiers began to sing the currently popular war song "John Brown's Body."

Hearing this, Reverend Clarke was moved to suggest that Mrs. Howe pen new, more uplifting lyrics to the familiar tune. She replied that she had often thought of doing exactly that. The following morning, as Mrs. Howe later described it, she "awoke...in the gray of the early dawn, and to my astonishment found that the wished-for lines were arranging themselves in my brain. I lay quite still until the last verse had completed itself in my thoughts, then hastily arose, saying to myself, 'I shall lose this if I don't write it down immediately."

Mrs. Howe's lyrics first appeared as a poem on the front page of the Atlantic Monthly in February of 1862. Editor James Fields, who paid her \$5 for the piece, is credited with having given the song the name by which it is known today. The poem has become perhaps the best-known Civil War song of the Union Army, and has come to be a well-loved American patriotic anthem. It also came to be associated with the Civil Rights movement.

Here is "Battle Hymn of the Republic" as written originally by Julia Ward Howe:

Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord: He is trampling out the vintage where the grapes of wrath are stored; He hath loosed the fateful lightning of His terrible swift sword: His truth is marching on.

I have seen Him in the watch-fires of a hundred circling camps, They have builded Him an altar in the evening dews and damps; I can read His righteous sentence by the dim and flaring lamps: His day is marching on.

I have read a fiery gospel writ in burnished rows of steel:
"As ye deal with my condemners, so with you my grace shall deal;
Let the Hero, born of woman, crush the serpent with his heel,
Since God is marching on."

He has sounded forth the trumpet that shall never call retreat; He is sifting out the hearts of men before His judgment-seat: Oh, be swift, my soul, to answer Him! be jubilant, my feet! Our God is marching on.

In the beauty of the lilies Christ was born across the sea, With a glory in his bosom that transfigures you and me: As he died to make men holy, let us die to make men free, While God is marching on.
