Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

Today we celebrate a feast that only occasionally falls on a Sunday - the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome. The Lateran Basilica, dedicated to Christ the Savior and St. John the Baptist, is the Cathedral of the Bishop of Rome, our Holy Father, the Pope. As the Latin inscription on its façade states, it is "the Mother and Head of all the churches of the City and the World." It is a visible sign of the unity of the universal Church.

Historically, this magnificent basilica was dedicated in the year 324 A.D. by Pope St. Sylvester I, after the Emperor Constantine gave the Lateran Palace to the Church. Through wars, fires, earthquakes, and centuries of change, the Lateran has stood as a testimony to the enduring faith of Christ's people. The Feast of its dedication is not merely about a building of stone and marble. It is about what that building represents: the living Church, built of "living stones," as St. Peter reminds us, where Christ Himself is the cornerstone.

This feast also draws our eyes and hearts beyond the walls of any one church, even our own beloved parish. It reminds us that we *ourselves* are God's temple, sanctified by baptism and nourished by the Eucharist. As St. Paul tells us, "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?" (1 Cor 3:16).

Every time we make a good Confession, the building of our souls is cleansed, removing anything that is not worthy of God, so that He may dwell more perfectly therein. Every time we gather for the Mass, we welcome Jesus in the Eucharist "under our roofs," and our souls become renewed dwelling places for the Lord.

Today's feast also invites us to renew our love for the whole Church, not just as an institution, but as the Living Body of Christ. In a world where faith can seem fractured or forgotten, our unity around the successor of Peter is a powerful witness. The Lateran Basilica reminds us that, across continents and cultures, we are one people, one faith, one baptism, one Church.

As we give thanks for this mother church, let us also renew our dedication to making our own parish of St. Mary's a true temple of God's presence: a place of prayer, mercy, and welcome. May each of us strive to be a "living stone," joined together in faith, compassion, and love - building up the Body of Christ right here in our community.

Let us take to heart the words of St. Augustine, who preached on this very feast: "What was done here in this building, let it be done in your souls. Let your hearts be cleansed from sin, that they may become the dwelling of God."

## FOR REFLECTION

Reflection on John 2:13 - 22, "Zeal for Your House Will Consume Me"

In today's Gospel, we encounter Jesus in the temple at Jerusalem, driving out the money changers and merchants with a whip of cords, declaring, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" (John 2:16). This striking scene, sometimes called the Cleansing of the Temple, marks one of the few moments in the Gospels where Jesus' righteous anger flares visibly. Yet beneath this intensity lies a profound revelation of who He is and what true worship means.

St. John places this episode at the beginning of Jesus' ministry, unlike the Synoptic Gospels, which recount it near the end. John's placement is not merely chronological but theological. From the start, Jesus announces that He Himself is the new Temple - the definitive dwelling place of God among His people. When He declares, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up," the evangelist explains, "He was speaking of the temple of his body." (John 2:19–21).

In the Old Covenant, the Temple was the sacred locus of God's presence and Israel's worship. In Christ, that presence is now personal and incarnate. God no longer dwells in stone but in flesh - flesh that will be broken and raised for the world's redemption. Thus, when Jesus cleanses the Temple, He foreshadows both His passion and His resurrection, the destruction and raising of the true dwelling of God.

The disciples recall the verse from Psalm 69: "Zeal for your house will consume me." Jesus' zeal is not rage but love in its purest form - a consuming passion for the holiness of God's presence and for the integrity of worship. The merchants and money changers, though necessary in some respects for temple sacrifices, had allowed commerce to obscure communion. The outer courts of prayer had become noisy with transactions instead of reverent with divine encounter. Jesus' act is thus prophetic: He restores the temple to its sacred purpose.

We might ask: what "markets" have entered the temple of our hearts? The Apostle Paul reminds us, "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?" (1 Cor 3:16). Our own lives, by baptism, have become sanctuaries of the Holy Spirit. Yet worldly clutter - the distractions of ambition,

consumerism, resentment, or pride - can easily crowd out the quiet presence of grace.

When Jesus cleanses the Temple, He foreshadows not only His death and resurrection but also the ongoing purification He offers to His followers through the Sacrament of Confession. Just as the Temple needed to be cleansed to become a true place of worship again, so too our souls need regular cleansing to become fitting dwelling places for God's presence.

In Confession, Christ - the true Temple - welcomes us back into communion with the Father. He does not drive us out with a whip, but gently invites us to lay down our burdens and to let His mercy sweep away the disorder that sin brings. The priest's words of absolution echo that cleansing power: "Through the ministry of the Church may God give you pardon and peace."

This sacrament is, in a real sense, Christ's ongoing act of temple-cleansing in the Church. Every Confession renews the sanctity of the inner sanctuary of the soul. It restores peace where there was turmoil, and order where there was confusion. The zeal that once led Jesus to cleanse the Temple is now expressed as His merciful zeal for our holiness and healing.

Every time we receive absolution, we become once more what we are called to be - living temples, radiant with grace. This renewal overflows into our communal worship: when hearts are cleansed, the Church herself shines with greater purity. The Eucharist, then, becomes the natural culmination of Confession, a purified people entering the presence of the Living God.

Let us, then, cultivate a healthy zeal for the house of God, both the physical church where we gather and the spiritual temple within our hearts. Let us not fear Christ's cleansing work, for it is always an act of love.



In the quiet of the Confessional, He still overturns the tables of sin and restores the sanctuary of grace.

Lord Jesus, zealous for Your Father's house, cleanse the temple of my heart. Sweep away all that distracts me from Your presence. Through the gift of Confession, make me new again, that I may worship You in spirit and truth. Amen.

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

For the past 65 years, St. Mary's, Holliston has relied on the Grand Annual - a once a year special collection that goes entirely toward parish operating costs. In combination with the weekly offertory, the Grand Annual allows St. Mary's to pay her staff and maintain her four buildings, three of which are well over 100 years old.

As you know, the Grand Annual always takes place in November. The 2025 St. Mary's Grand Annual Collection is November 15 & 16. The goal is \$150,000 - the same as the 2021, 2022, 2023, and 2024 Grand Annuals, which through your good stewardship were all achieved.

The most expensive item is the installation of two industrial HVAC Units to replace the forty-six-year-old original units on the Parish Center Roof, which are both failing. The most visible facilities item is the upholstering of the wooden pew seats in the church. The hard wood can be difficult for older parishioners and others with medical conditions to sit on for the length of a Mass, concert, or other event. The new cushioned seats are custom designed to rest on the curve of our pews and should be in place before January 2026.

The Grand Annual will also cover major concrete repairs to the front and side entrances to the church, as well as the replacement of the stage spot lighting in Fr. Haley Hall. (One track was removed when it stopped working). Also, if you have felt lately that the back of the church has gotten darker, you are correct. After forty years, multiple high fixtures in the nave are so worn and cracked that they can no longer accept bulbs and must be replaced. New lighting is also needed in the Parish Center Lobby, where we are going through a bulb a week from failing fixtures.

While St. Mary's is blessed to have good handicap access via our elevator, those in wheelchairs, walkers, or crutches have difficulty opening the exterior parking lot glass door to access the elevator. We will soon be installing a push panel, automatic door system for them.

As you know from your Newsletter, St. Mary's Youth Ministry Programs have exploded in popularity in recent years. Associated costs have gone up significantly, and we hope to designate part of the Grand Annual to fund these programs that we know are so valued by our people. A complete Grand Annual breakdown follows:

\$47,000	Replacement of both failing industrial HVAC units on the Parish Center Hall roof.
\$17,000	Middle and High School Youth Ministry Programs.
\$14,000	Installation of pew seat upholstery throughout the church.
\$ 8,000	Lighting Fixtures for Hall Stage, Church Nave plus, and Lobby.
\$ 5,500	Concrete Repairs - demolition and new pouring.
\$ 5,500	Exterior Rectory and Church, Interior Sr. Ricci House, Painting and Repairs.
\$ 4,000	Handicap push plate door system for parking lot elevator entry.

The remaining Grand Annual amount is applied to our six full-time staff salaries (\$49,000).

Since successfully paying off the last of her \$1.2 million loan debts in the fall of 2010, St. Mary's has been able to pay her bills and remains debt free. Your generous support of St. Mary's 2025 Grand Annual will assure that the hard-won financial health of our parish continues. We realize that these current economic times are difficult for many. But if we all do what we can according to our means, then the 2025 Grand Annual will be a success. Thank you in advance for your generosity. And thank you for the many ways you personally help to build up our beautiful parish family.
