THE JESSE TREE

Shown left, some Saint Mary's 6th Graders recently created and hung ornaments on a Jesse Tree in the Parish Center Lobby. Each ornament contains a symbol representing the story of one of the ancestors of Jesus.

The Jesse Tree tradition is rooted in Isaiah 11:1: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots." Jesse was the father of David, Israel's greatest king. And Jesus is descended from the line of David. He is the branch God promised would grow from Jesse's family tree.

Each symbol represents a story from within this family tree and a step toward the birth of Our Lord.

150th ANNIVERSARY!

Several hundred St. Mary's parishioners came together on Saturday, November 13, for a night of fine food, dancing, friendship, and reminiscence. The Gala celebrating our parish's 150th Anniversary was held at the Regency Ballroom in Milford.

Fr. Rocco and Fr. Francis represented our good friends the Xaverian Fathers, and Bishop Robert Reed delivered the keynote address. The bishop described St. Mary's as exceptional and said how impressed he has been by this lively community of faith. Referencing Diane Collin's remarks at the May Anniversary Mass, he agreed that "While St. Mary's is located at the very western edge of the Archdiocese, it is a parish at the very heart of the Catholic Church."

Special thanks to Karen Magrini, Jennifer Schiller, Lisa Dufault, Betty Febo, Mary Beth Harris, and Mike Roberto for their amazing efforts organizing the Gala. The celebration was a joyful moment for all who took part, and we thank everyone who contributed to it by their presence. Thank you also to all who took part in the Gala Silent Auction - virtually or in person. Nearly \$9,000 was raised towards St. Mary's outreach programs, including the High School Youth Group's Summer Mission Trip.





150th ANNIVERSARY GALA!

Our Pastor Fr. Mark opened the evening with these words: Good evening, everyone and welcome. Some of you may be familiar with the story of the young man who was running late for a very important business meeting. This meeting could literally make or break his career, but no matter how hard he tried, the young man couldn't find a parking space.

Again and again he circled the block, until finally in desperation he stopped the car, raised his eyes to heaven and prayed. "Dear God," he said. "Please help me. If you get me a parking space I swear that I'll start going to church every Sunday. I'll stop drinking. And I'll start giving generously to the poor!"

No sooner had the young man uttered these words, than miraculously, a car pulled out and a parking space opened up right in front of him. At which point the young man said, "Never mind God – I found one!"

It's easy to take credit for what God does – easy to not recognize the movement and work of His hand. But the 150th Anniversary of a Parish is not one of those times. You and I belong to a beautiful family of faith that has not only LASTED for a century and a half. But that has grown. And prospered. And been a blessing to countless people in Holliston and beyond.

And that would not have happened without the grace of God. The grace we invite by prayer and worship. The grace we live out in holy works. The grace that makes St. Mary's the spiritual home that so many cherish.

Earlier today I was working on the labels for our upcoming December Newsletter. And I was struck by the number of former parishioners who have moved away – but who have requested to still be mailed the St. Mary's Newsletter each month. They live on the Cape, in Maine, in Florida – I saw one label for an address in Louisiana.

These people live far away now – but they still feel CONNECTED to St. Mary's. They still care about what goes on here. And that I think, says a lot, about the love, and faith, and goodness of this our parish home.

Gracious God, as we celebrate our past and rejoice in our present, we also look forward with eager eyes to the future.

We pray that you will continue to make Your love known among us and through us.

Give us a zeal for mission. Help us to look beyond our walls to those who do not know You.

Make this parish a blessing to those around us, and embolden us to move forward with faith, hope, courage, and love toward what lies ahead.

In all things may we seek Your will.

Family has been very much on my mind recently, as I was unable to be with mine on Thanksgiving Day. I was blessed to visit with gracious friends, but it wasn't the same as gathering at table with my parents, siblings, and many nieces and nephews. Thanksgiving is about more than food – it is about renewing the bonds of love that keep families united and at peace.

It is not by accident that Jesus chose a meal, the Holy Eucharist, to ensure those same gifts for His Family the Church. This is expressed beautifully in the Mass when the priest says, "Humbly we pray that, partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ, we may be gathered into one by the Holy Spirit." The Eucharist is the Body and Blood of Jesus, Who is the great unifier – the One Who connects God to man, heaven to earth, the dead to the living, and believer to believer.

Sharing faithfully in the Eucharist each week is one of the most effective ways a family can foster unity, allowing Jesus to strengthen the love that draws them to God and to each other. "The family that prays together, stays together," is a common sight on bumper stickers, but it is far more than a slogan. Those who invest time in their relationship with God by visiting His House, listening to His Word, and partaking of His Table, can only grow in the qualities so essential to Christian family life. Chief among these are patience, selflessness, fidelity, purity, and humility.

There is a reason that just one day after Christmas, on Sunday, December 26, we Catholics will gather at Mass again for the Feast of the Holy Family. The family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph was holy not because they never struggled or suffered, but rather because they always had Jesus in their midst. This is exactly what happens at the Holy Mass, when He comes to join us and accompany us home through the Holy Eucharist.

Blessed Adolph Kolping once observed that, "The first thing a person finds in life and the last to which he holds out his hand, and the most precious that he possess, even if he does not realize it, is family life." As a New Year is about to begin, let us each consider the place of family in our lives – both our individual families, and our faith family the Church. Let us try to renew these relationships as needed, recognizing them as opportunities to embrace sacrificial love and in so doing imitate Jesus.

With Christmas coming fast, I also make my annual call for you to please reach out to any of our Catholic brothers and sisters who have fallen away from the practice of their faith. Invite them to accompany you to Mass. Tell them how much they are missed. Encourage them to come home to the Eucharist, a word which means "thanksgiving," and a celebration that is never as beautiful as when all the family is gathered together to share it.



TROOP 14 CAMPOUT AT THE SPORTSMAN ASSOCIATION NOVEMBER 5-7: The onset of the cold weather did not slow down Troop 14 in early November. The Troop had an action packed campout with 25 Scouts and four leaders attending, that included two nights of camping and huge bonfires each evening; Distributing Scouting for Food flyers throughout Holliston (see article below); 18 Scouts participated in a Gun Safety course taught by the Sportsman Association, with 12 Scouts perfecting their Trap shooting skills; Leader Appreciation Lunch (burgers, dogs and chips prepared by the Scouts); and 13 Holliston Webelos that spent the afternoon with the Troop and participated in a round robin of five Scout skill stations, including fire building, tent set-up, axe and saw safety, cooking and tomahawk throwing (the most popular station). Sadly this year, no Turkey Roast dinner with the Troop and Webelo families but hopefully we will be able to bring back this tradition next year.

BSA'S & TROOP 14'S ANNUAL "SCOUTING FOR FOOD" SERVICE

PROJECT: This year marks the 15th year that Troop 14 has participated in the BSA's Annual "Scouting for Food" Service Project, with all of the food collected going directly to the 200+ local families that use the Holliston Pantry Shelf. On the morning of November 6, 24 Scouts, eight Cub Scouts and a number of leaders and parents spent a few hours distributing



2,117 custom made door hangers to 15 neighborhoods around Holliston. Then a week later, on November 14 they retraced their routes and collected 502 bags (which equals over 5,000 pounds of food), slightly under last year's record-breaking total. Thanks to all the Holliston residents who donated food to help our neighbors in need!

I am looking forward to a year full of fun, faith, friendship, and getting to know each and every one of you! Please know that I am praying for you always!



There is a third chapter to this "divine showing" and it is heard in the gospel of the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time on January 16; it is Jesus' miracle at the wedding feast at Cana. Listen to the hymn, Songs of Thankfulness and Praise (verses 1 and 2, especially) for references to these three holy events: https://bit.ly/ChristManifest. SAINTS: Among the saints celebrated this month are Elizabeth Ann Seton (January 4), Francis de Sales (January 24) and Thomas Aquinas (January 27). AMORIS LAETITIA YEAR: As noted on the October got faith? page, this is a year designated by the Vatican for learning across the church about Pope Francis' Post-synodal Exhortation, Amoris Laetitia (The Joy of Loving): On Love in the Family. This exhortation gets much of its foundation from the Scriptures. For instance, in Chapter 1, Pope Francis discusses Psalm 128, a psalm often prayed at Catholic weddings and in Chapter 4 he writes about the reading about love we all recognize, he refers to it as a lyrical passage, from First Corinthians ("Love is kind", etc.). Turning to a later point, in Chapter 9, Pope Francis writes "[i]t is a profound spiritual experience to contemplate our loved ones with the eyes of God and to see Christ in them." Join the reading/discussion group mentioned above and learn about this inspiring work. —Leo Racine
