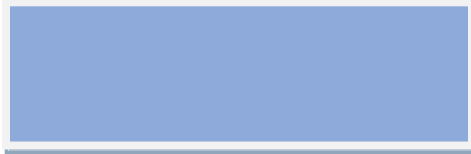

ASH WEDNESDAY IS A DAY OF FASTING AND ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT.

Why do we wear ashes on this day? Ashes symbolize two main things in the Old Testament – death and repentance. Ashes are equivalent to dust, and human flesh is composed of dust or clay (Genesis 2:7). For example, Abraham told God, "I am but dust and ashes" (Genesis 18:27), a reference to his human mortality. We use ashes on Ash Wednesday to remind ourselves of our own mortality. We are all born here, but none of us is staying here. Death may come sooner, or it may come later, but it will surely come. This is not a cause for fear, but for urgency to embrace the Gospel with new vigor. We only have so much time to accept Jesus' offer of salvation, and follow Him on the Way of the Cross, the way of sacrificial love.

Ashes are also a symbol of repentance for past sins. When the prophet Daniel shamefacedly clothed himself in sackcloth and ashes, they were a sign of his people's contrition for their rebellion, wickedness and treachery (Daniel 9:3). When Jonah warned the Ninevites that God planned to destroy their city because of their corruption and depravity, the people covered themselves with sackcloth and ashes as a sign of their intention to turn from their evil ways (Jonah 3:6,10). Ashes are a plea to God for mercy and compassion, pardon and forgiveness. Moreover, they are a public admission of guilt, an expression of sorrow for sins that have been committed, a promise to reform and a pledge to resist temptation in the future.

In His own words, Jesus "came to call sinners." We, too, are sinners. When we come forward to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday, we are saying that we are sorry for our sins, and that we want to use the season of Lent to correct our faults, purify our hearts, control our desires and grow in holiness so we will be prepared to celebrate Easter with great joy. **Our ashes say that we want to come back to Jesus.**

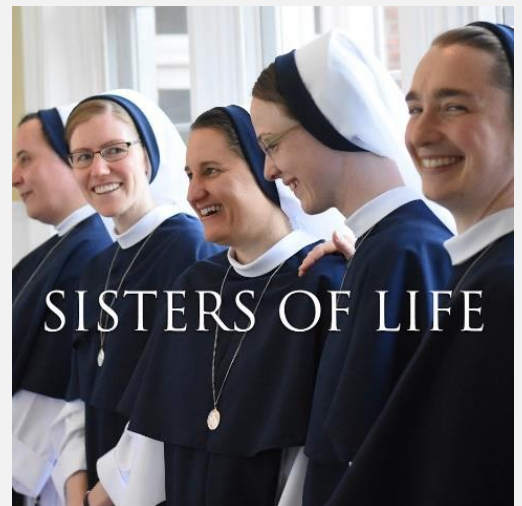

This will be a beautiful opportunity for prayer, contemplation, and fellowship with the Sisters of Life - a vibrant and thriving religious order doing courageous work to support a culture of life. Enjoy live music performed by the Sisters, a Lenten reflection by them, spend time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, and gather for fellowship and refreshments afterward in Fr. Haley Hall.



More about The Sisters of Life: The Sisters of Life are a contemplative/active Roman Catholic community of women religious, who profess the three traditional vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, and a fourth vow to protect and enhance the sacredness of human life. They were founded by Cardinal John O'Connor in New York in 1991, and received formal approbation as a religious institute in 2004, under Cardinal Edward Egan. They currently serve in the [Arch]dioceses of New York, Albany, Bridgeport, Philadelphia, Denver, Phoenix, Washington, D.C., and Toronto, Canada. Their missions include serving women who are vulnerable to abortion, giving them the support and resources to be able to choose life for themselves and their children; hosting weekend retreats; evangelization; outreach to college students; and helping women who have suffered after abortion to encounter the mercy and healing of Jesus Christ (www.sistersoflife.org).

This evening is being offered in conjunction with St. Benedict's, and high attendance is expected.

loved ones can dominate our attention and confine our spiritual life. 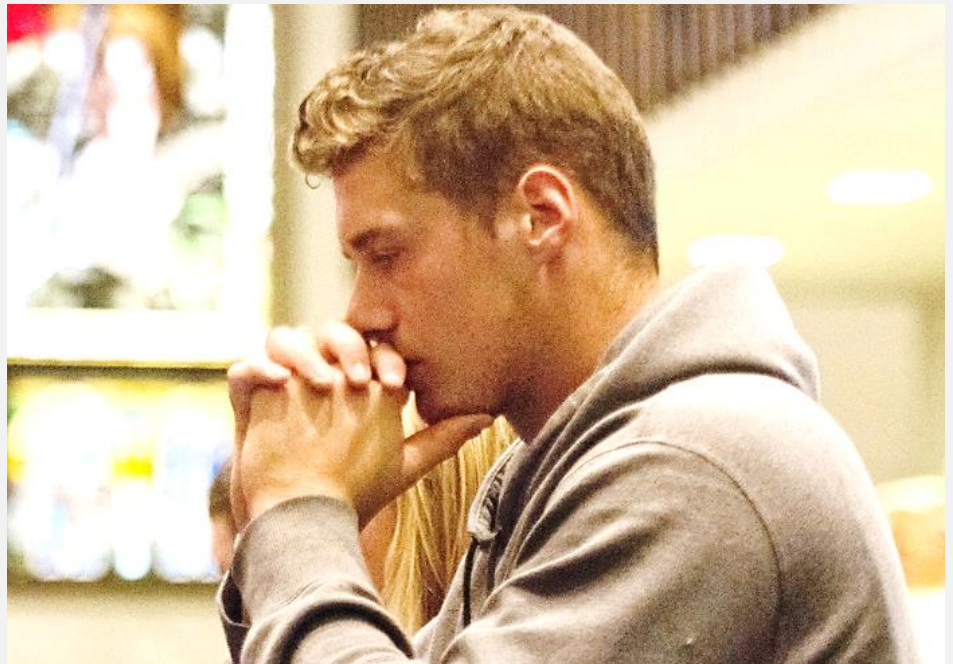
February 22: Please pray for Peace in Palestine and Israel.

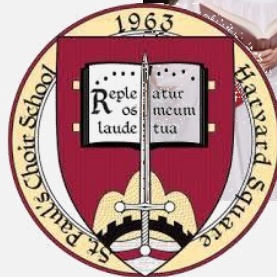
Our Lenten Suppers will take place in Fr. Haley Hall and will include a range of food options while observing Friday's abstinence from meat - as well as child friendly food.

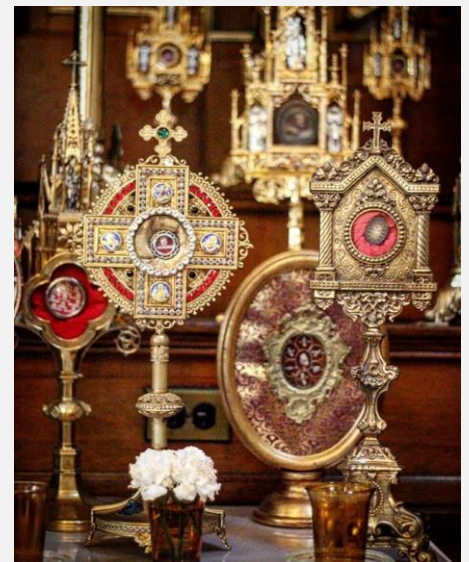

Meet Him With the Saints ~ Sunday, March 17

The Holy Relics of more than one hundred saints will be Exposed for Veneration at St. Mary's on Sunday, March 17, from 6 - 8 PM in the church. They include relics of St. Francis of Assisi, St. Therese of Lisieux (the Little Flower), and St. Anthony of Padua. Also, some of the rarest relics of the Passion will be present.

The Exposition will begin with a presentation and teaching about relics that is aimed at answering most questions the guests come with. Spiritual points are made about praying, intercession, and healing. Emphasis is on the Gospel message of healing to bring people to encounter Jesus.

There is no cost, but a free will offering basket will be available to support the Relic Ministry. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick will be available during the Relic Exposition for anyone facing serious illness - mental or physical.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

This past summer, a lot of work was done to repair and spruce up Sister Ricci House. As our parish grows, more space is needed for various groups, and we had to get the rooms there into better shape.

We also cleaned out the Sister Ricci House basement, and in the course of doing so found two old stained-glass windows from our pre-renovation church. They were leaning in a dark corner, covered with dirt and grime.

We brought the windows up and outside, then scrubbed the many layers of dirt off of them. I discovered that they leaned perfectly into / against two windows in a back room off the rectory kitchen, which is where they now reside.

Every time I pass through that room, I am struck by the beauty of the colored light they produce, somehow made even more beautiful because the glass had been obscured and in darkness for so long – unable to serve its true purpose.

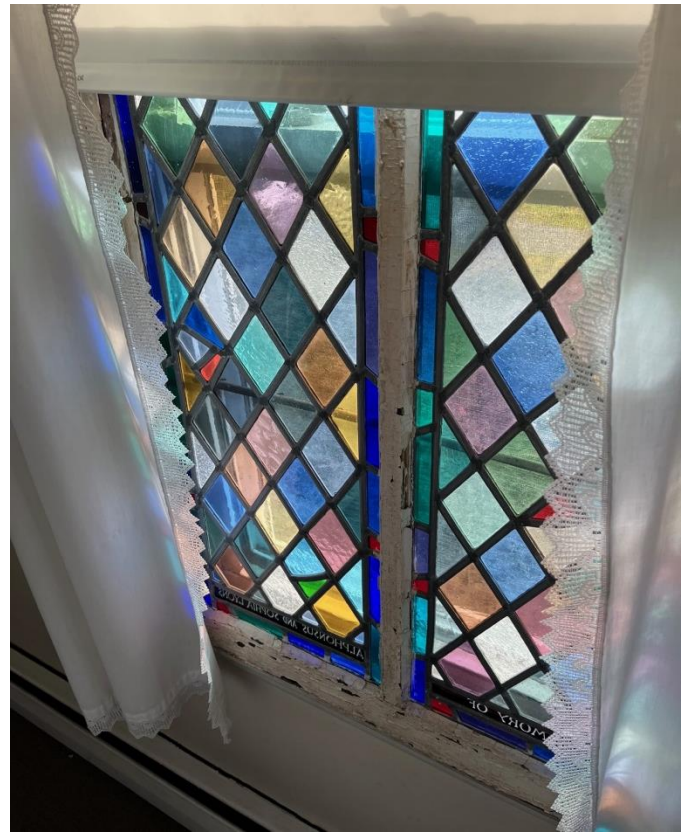
Those windows speak to me of the Lenten Season about to begin. Our souls are magnificent things, meant to receive and shine with the light of God's grace and love. But they can become darkened by sin, obscured by worldly concerns.

The forty days of Lent are that precious time when through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving we scrub away all that which is not of God. We work to remove the stains of selfishness, pride, and passing pleasures, so that once more the light of God can enter our souls undimmed.

The colored light from the two rescued windows shines onto both the white curtains beside them and onto the white wall opposite them. Just so, when we spend these forty days in true penance and preparation for Easter, then God will use us to shine upon and bless the people He places in our life's path.

Thank you to all who contributed so generously to the January collection in support of the "Holliston - Holy Land Friendship Scholarship." The total cost for each student is \$1,050 US. That includes tuition, all school fees, books, and uniform.

In response to a request from our Sister Parish, Our Lady's in Beit Sahour, the St. Mary's Parish and Finance Councils had both voted unanimously to scholarship four Palestinian Catholic children this school year, instead of our usual two.

The current war has made it impossible for many to meet tuition, and our support this year will truly be a light and a lifeline for these children.

They are: Pellar, a 7th Grade girl; Farah, a 6th Grade boy; Bisan, a 7th Grade girl; and Andrea, an 8th Grade boy.

In the end, the collection took in more than \$5,000 - enough to sponsor a fifth student. We notified Fr. Issa and Principal Anton of this good news and have just received the following reply.

Dear Father Mark

Many thanks for your prayers and for St. Mary's continuing the sponsoring of our needy students. Your generosity helps us in keeping hope alive among the Christian families here in Bethlehem and Beit Sahour. About the new sponsorship, here is the information about the fifth student.

Hana Awadh is a student in the Fifth grade. [photo below]. He has two sisters, one of them studying at the school. [Also shown in the photo].

Hana belongs to a family who are suffering from the socio-economic situation besides some medical problems. Lately, the father had a surgery in his foot (for the second time) due to maltreatment. the mother has a thyroiditis.

The father used to work in olivewood while the mother is a housewife.

Your sponsorship to the family is highly appreciated as it will help the parents to take care of other issues and to fulfill the other needs of the family such as home rent, medical care and so on.

Once again, on behalf of the students and their families I would like to thank you and the people of our Sister Parish in Holliston for your continuing support and the sponsoring of our Parish Students.

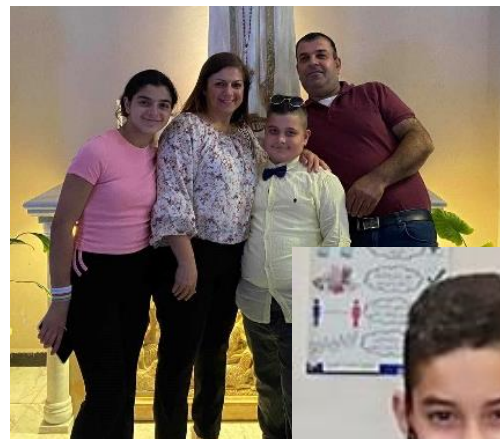

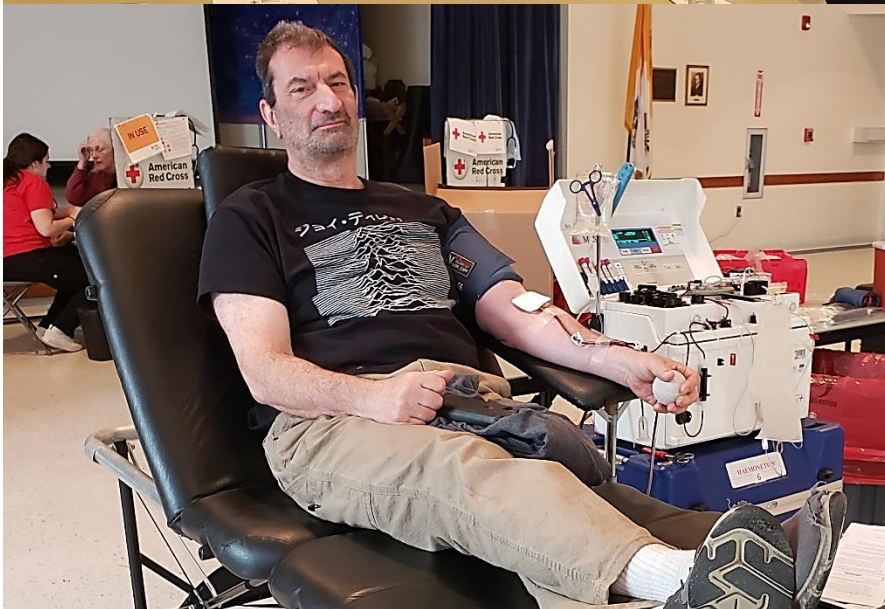

Lift Up Your Voice!

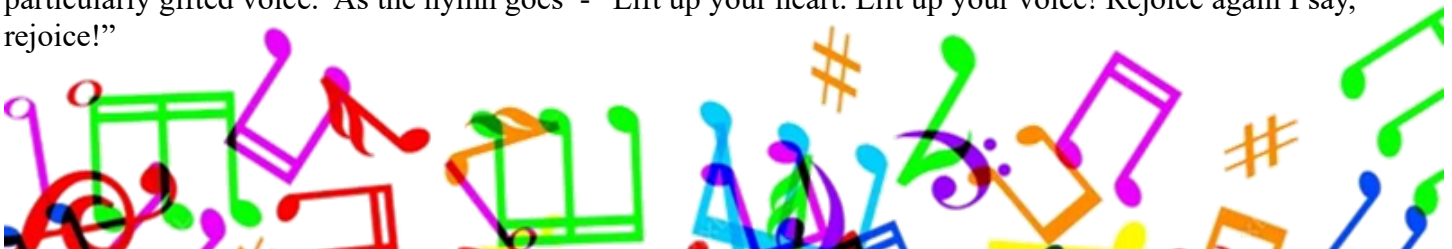

In my parish we sang all the verses to each hymn except the optional (underscored) ones so there was a lot of singing!

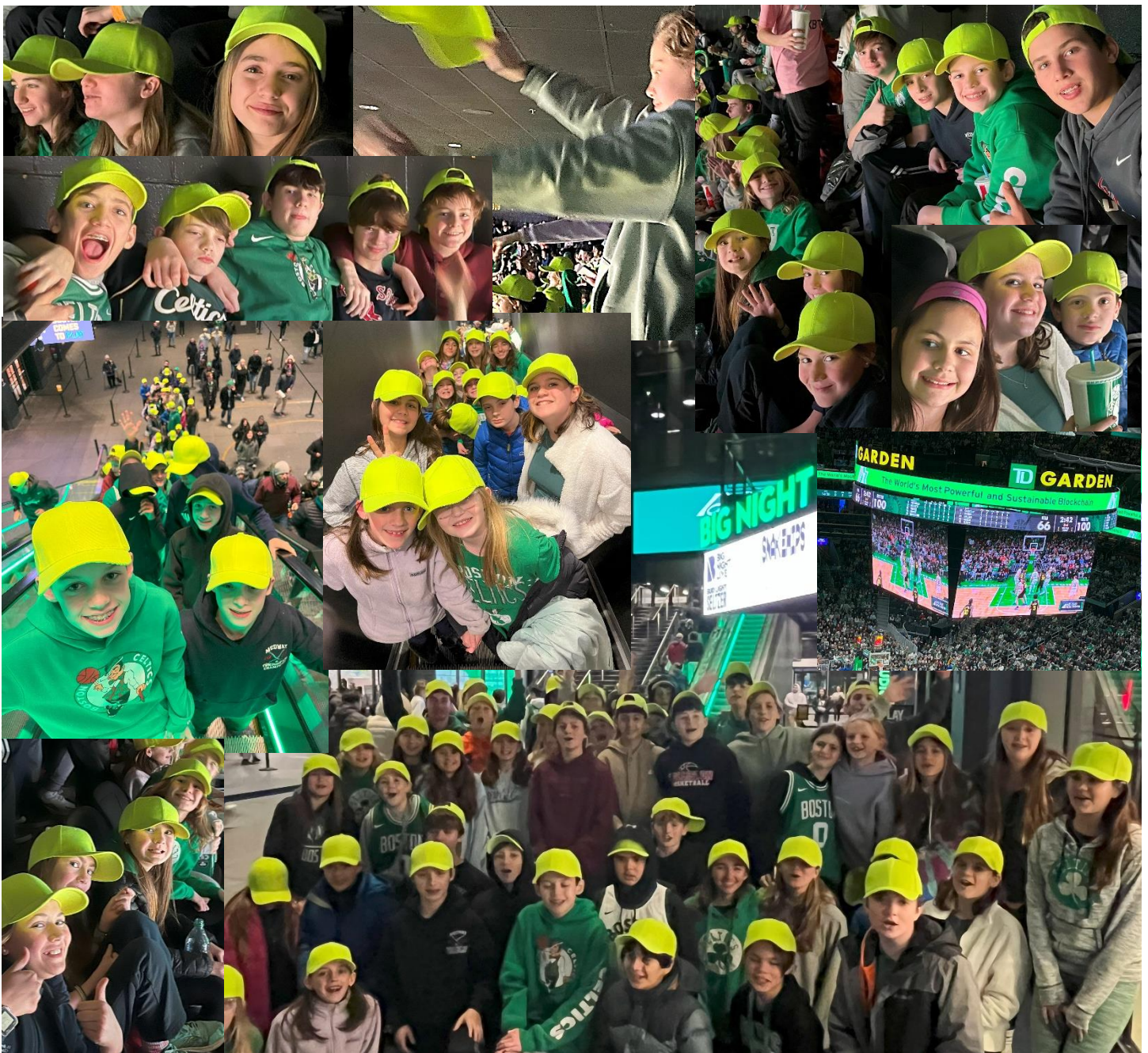
St. Mary's Parish Middle School Youth Group
