DANNY BARIBEAU ACHIEVES EAGLE SCOUT RANK!

St. Mary's Parishioner and Senior Altar Server, Danny Baribeau, celebrated his Eagle Court of Honor in Fr. Haley Hall on September 8. Danny's Eagle project involved building a raised, enclosed community garden for the Xaverian Missionaries at the Fatima Shrine. This garden was part of the Shrine's response to "Laudato Si," Pope Francis' Encyclical calling on Catholics to care for the earth, our common home. Danny's garden was the first of seven vegetable gardens built and maintained by various Holliston groups to provide fresh produce for the Holliston Pantry Shelf.

At his Eagle Ceremony, Danny spoke gratefully of the support he received from his fellow scouts, the Troop 14 leaders, and his parents. He mentioned how seeing his dad Chris's commitment to Troop 14 (Chris is the Scoutmaster), inspired him in many ways – not only to keep up his Scouting efforts, but to give fully of himself in all endeavors. Eagle Scout is the highest achievement or rank attainable in the Boy Scouts of America. Since its inception in 1911, only four percent of Scouts have earned this rank. Congratulations Danny! And may God bring to completion the good work He has begun in you. Amen.

St. Mary's High School Youth Group Teens Gather In Faith ~ See you on September 22!

JULY 21 - 27: My name is Lisa Dufault, and this past July, alongside my son Ben, I had the honor of participating in the TGIF Mission Trip to Mississippi. We were among eighty-three parishioners who went on this adventure! As an adult

on the trip, I anticipated this journey would be focused on guiding and mentoring our teens. What I didn't expect was how profoundly this experience would shape my own spiritual life. I knew that this trip would involve hard work, long days, and the challenges that come with serving in unfamiliar settings. Yet, from the moment we arrived, I felt a stirring of something deeper, a sense that this was not just a mission to help others, but also a mission for my own soul.

Working alongside the teens, I was struck by their energy and passion. Their faith was vibrant and raw. As they threw themselves into the work, I found myself reflecting on my own faith journey. In their eagerness to serve, I was reminded of the simple truth that serving others is one of the most direct ways to experience God's presence. I began to see my faith not just as something to be practiced within the walls of a church, but as something to be lived out in the world. The mission trip was a living expression of the Catholic principles of charity and solidarity, and it allowed me to experience firsthand the beauty of our faith in action.

The daily routines of the mission, whether it was painting, clearing debris, building animal habitats, building wheelchair ramps, removing coastline trash, or spending time with the local community, became acts of worship for me - became a reflection of the Gospel message of love and service. Each task allowed me to see the mission not just as a project to complete, but as a sacred opportunity to connect with God's love for His people.

One of the most powerful aspects of the trip was the sense of community that developed among us. "Us" as a whole, the adults as a unit and within our van groups. (Shout out to my van group #7, Megan, Aiden, Amelia, Hugh and Liam). This unity deepened my understanding of what it means to be the Body of Christ.

During the trip, I grew closer to God in ways that were both unexpected and deeply personal. The mission trip stripped away the distractions of daily life and brought me back to the basics of faith, serving, loving, and being present. I returned home not just with memories of what we accomplished, but with a heart that had been profoundly changed, carrying with me a clearer vision of how I want to live out my faith in everyday life.

The daily rhythm of prayer, work, and community on the trip deepened my connection with the spiritual traditions of the Church. Praying the Rosary with the group, attending daily Mass, and taking moments of quiet reflection amidst the busy days brought me closer to the sacraments. One memory that I tucked deep in my heart was witnessing the teens attend Confession during Adoration. It was profoundly moving. Seeing their courage to approach the sacrament, seeking forgiveness and healing, reminded me of the beauty of God's mercy. As they knelt in humble repentance in the pews of the church, I felt a deep sense of reverence and awe. Their willingness to be vulnerable before God was a powerful witness to the transformative grace of Confession, and it renewed my own appreciation for this sacred sacrament.

This mission trip was not just a journey to serve others; it was a pilgrimage of the heart. It reminded me that faith is not static but a living, breathing relationship with God that grows through service, community, and the sacraments. I returned home with a heart full of gratitude, not only for the work we were able to do but for the ways in which God used this experience to draw me closer to Him and to the richness of our Catholic faith.



St. Mary's High School Youth Group Teens Gather In Faith ~ See you on September 22!

JULY 21 - 27: My name is Luke Burgett and I am a Junior at Holliston High School and a member of St. Mary's TGIF High School Youth Group. This past summer, I had one of the most incredible experiences of my life attending the TGIF Mission Trip in Gulfport, Mississippi. It was my first

Mission Trip and I am very happy to say that it was a life-changing week. From the start, the teens and adults that had attended previous trips welcomed me and all of the many other first-timers with warm smiles and welcome arms. I feel that perfectly reflected the Catholic attitudes everyone adopted for the week.



Going into the trip, many teens were familiar with each other, but they didn't have that shared experience or closeness typical of really good friends. However, after the settling in and getting into the routine, at around the halfway point of the week, there was a complete shift and a visible joyfulness began to be felt throughout the Retreat Center. Many games were played, among them Thumper (a Mission Trip staple), Taps, soccer, basketball, and countless card games. What was amazing to see was that it wasn't the same teens playing the same games the entire week. Everyone was welcome to join in and participate. There was a unity in that Retreat Center characteristic of a close family.

Another huge piece of the trip was strengthening our relationship with God and Jesus Christ. Almost every night, there would be a spiritual activity, and these nights would allow us to reflect on the day and how we saw Jesus in those around us. It really kept me focused on the reason we were on the Mission - to spread Jesus' love by helping others. Not only did I get to grow my faith throughout the week, I was also a witness to others having revelations about their faith. It was amazing to see others find a deeper connection to God.



The worksite to which my Van Group was assigned was an animal rehabilitation center called Woodside Wildlife Rescue. We worked there for all five days of the week, and our task was to construct an "Owl Flight Enclosure" for the purpose of rehabbing injured owls. My Van Group worked tirelessly every day in the heat and humidity, but didn't ever complain and came to the site with a smile each day. It



was awesome to see, and it was such great motivation. One of my greatest witnesses during the experience actually came a day after getting home. The wonderful caretaker of the

center sent a text saying that she had walked down to the Owl Enclosure, looked around, and began to cry. She was so appreciative of the work we had done that she was moved to tears. That perfectly summed up the power of sharing Jesus' love and the power of the Mission Trip as a whole.



I want to thank Restore & Replenish, the company that helped run the trip smoothly and who helped lead much of the nightly spiritual activities; all of the adult chaperones that selflessly sacrificed their time to make this trip possible; to Father Mark and all of the Parish Members that supported us in fundraisers and in prayer; for Deacon John for being such an influential and impactful spiritual leader throughout the week, providing us with spiritual direction; and for Jesus Christ who gave us the strength and courage to help all of God's children in Mississippi. To close, in the words of St. Francis of Assisi that guided us through the week: "O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood, as to understand, to be loved, as to love; for it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life."

The Troop meets weekly during the school year, Mondays from 7 - 8:30 PM in the Lower Church. **2024 HIGH ADVENTURE TRIP:** In August, four Scouts and two adult Leaders travelled to Minnesota and Canada for a six-day, five-night wilderness canoe trek. The "Northern Tier" Canoe High Adventure is the oldest of the four Scouting "High Adventure" camps and is the ultimate test of Scouting skills and endurance.



While Troop 14 has more than 50 Scouts, the High Adventure trips are for the older and more experienced Scouts who want a major mental and physical challenge beyond what local camping trips provide. The canoe trek spanned 75 miles of the Quetico Provincial Park which is a wilderness area in Ontario, Canada. Quetico, along with the Boundary Water Canoe Wilderness Area in Minnesota, is over two million acres of wilderness. It is some of the finest backcountry canoeing on the planet with areas that see very few people per year.

The trek challenged Scouts Luke Roberto, Colin Hodgdon, Xander Hafford, and Jeffrey Hebert as they paddled over ten miles each day and traversed challenging portages, carrying their personal gear, three canoes, six days of food, and a kitchen. While some packs weighed more than one hundred pounds and terrain ranged from tall hills with roots and rocks to swampy grasslands with knee-high water, the four young Scouts showed exemplary physical skills, endurance, and a positive mindset to collectively accomplish this impressive feat.



After the end of a long day paddling and portaging, the Scouts, guided by their "interpreter" Ariella, cooked dinner, cleaned up, and hoisted the kitchen items on a rope to deter bears who can smell food from over a mile away. The remaining hours of the day were spent taking advantage of the finest freshwater fishing in North America or spending a few brief moments by the campfire and talking before sleeping. The trek had no official itinerary or schedule and things like weather or a local wildfire caused the route to shift, after discussing the implications and agreeing on possible solutions. Select older Scouts who meet age and rank requirements will be training throughout this new Scout year in preparation for next year's "High Adventure, New Mexico" trip to Philmont Scout Ranch, the largest and most impressive High Adventure camp there is!

Stepping Up in Faith

How Steps 4 & 5 of the 12-Step Program, and the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius of Loyola, can help us on our journey towards holiness.

In the Summer newsletter, we discussed how Steps 2 & 3 of the 12-Step Program of Addiction Recovery are linked to our journey of holiness. Step 2 focuses on a Belief that a greater Power than ourselves (which we know as God) can restore us to sanity. Step 3 enables us to make the decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understand Him. Let us understand better the next two steps, Steps 4 and Step 5.

Step Four: Honesty & Self Awareness

Step 4 of the 12-Step Program of Alcoholics Anonymous requires us to "Make a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves." It parallels with Ignatian Spirituality's step of conversion and self-awareness, calling for the recognition of sin and the desire for healing. This step in our faith process requires intellectual honesty and introspection of ourselves, our frustrations, our resentments; and of all people, things or principles with whom we have found disappointment and anger. This step enables us to face our resentments, our fears, our disappointments, and ask ourselves where we can take ownership of them. This step can be overwhelming for some who have suffered any kind of trauma or abuse and may expose feelings of shame and guilt that people can feel when having not followed their own moral compass. But it is important for each of us to overcome these obstacles, because they stand in the way of a right relationship with our Lord. What is most important to remember, despite any disappointments we may feel about ourselves or our actions, is that we are still beloved, beyond measure in the sight of our Creator.

Step Five: Accountability

The Spiritual Exercises align this step with the desire for deeper union with God, becoming aware of our own sorrow for sin and compassion for God's suffering people. Step 5 of the 12 Steps requires us to "Admit to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs". This process of awareness and sorrow allows us to step into the light of community. It calls us out of the darkness of shame and guilt and beckons us to share with another person the nature of our wrongdoings. The shame and guilt that we often feel, especially when in active addiction or attachment, is frequently at the root of a deeper problem: isolation. Isolation can be one of the most difficult obstacles to overcome in our faith journey, as it is common for people to remain alone in their pain and suffering.

Admitting to others our wrongdoings exerts a sense of control over the situation, freeing us from our guilt and pain. Asking God's forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation frees us from the weight of our sin, enabling God's loving grace to enter our hearts, and revealing the beauty of His merciful healing and love.

We will continue in upcoming newsletters to highlight the remaining steps, and how they connect with Ignatian Spirituality and our religious journey of discovery. In the meantime, let's concentrate on our honesty, self-awareness and accountability in relationship with a God who loves us beyond measure.
