A RARE HONOR

On Sunday, January 5, at the 11:30 AM Mass, St. Mary's Parishioner Danny Baribeau received a rare honor - the Pillars of Faith Award. This award provides special recognition to those Boy Scouts who have earned all four of the traditional Catholic Religious Awards. Less than 4% of Scouts earn the top rank of Eagle Scout, and even fewer earn a Religious Award from their faith. So to earn all four Religious Awards is a monumental feat and demonstrates tremendous commitment to their Catholic Faith. For this reason the award is usually given only about once every five years in our Archdiocese.

The name and design of the award represent the fact that the four traditional Religious Awards for each program are like pillars, supporting the Scouts' development in and appreciation of their religious faith. The Religious Awards are the pillars, not the roof, for none are ever done growing in their faith. The design also includes the Church, the Bible, and the Cross - other essential elements in faith.

Scouts must have completed Light of Christ, Parvuli Dei, Ad Altare Dei, and Pope Pius XII Awards - all at the proper age. Danny received his Pius XII emblem along with five other Scouts at the January 5 celebration. Congratulations Danny!





Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

Later this month, we will celebrate St. Valentine's Day. Saint Valentine was a Catholic priest in ancient Rome. When he kept marrying couples even after the Emperor Claudius had prohibited new marriages, Fr. Valentine was arrested, imprisoned, and eventually martyred for his Christian faith.

Fr. Valentine left behind in his jail cell a beautiful note to a friend, signing it, "Love from your Valentine." Thus began the custom of giving gifts and messages of love on February 14 - the day Valentine died in the year 269 AD.

St. Valentine's Day is now customarily a day when we give gifts of love. And as February 14 approaches, let us pause to remember that God gave us the greatest gift of love in the person of Jesus, His Only Son, Who died to save us from our sins. It is a gift that fills us with gratitude, joy, and hope.

I saw a great video recently which went something like this. Imagine you are drowning in the ocean. You are struggling to stay afloat, but you are far from shore and cannot make it there. You start to sink, to swallow water ... you are dying.

Suddenly, you are grabbed by the arm. A stranger is rescuing you - he lifts your head above water and swims, pulls your exhausted body along with him through the water, and finally manages to drag your body onto the beach.

Then without warning - the stranger collapses. He has had a heart attack. The strain of rescuing you was too much. And he dies right there, literally having given his life to save yours.

A few days later, the wife of the man who died saving you calls you. She tells you they are having a memorial service for her husband, Sunday morning, and she would like you to come. Would you say, "Oh I'm sorry, but Sunday is my morning to sleep in? Would you say, "I'd like to, but my daughter has a soccer game?" Would you say, "No, but don't worry, I'll honor your husband in my own way by thinking of him during the commercials of the football game?"

Of course not! You would go. You would be grateful! You would want to honor the memory of the man who saved you. You would want to learn all you could about the man who gave his life for yours.

Well, you and I have such a man. His name is Jesus. And at the Last Supper, the First Eucharist, Jesus established a Memorial for Himself - saying "Do *this* in memory of me." He blessed bread and wine, and gave us the gift of the Holy Mass - in which we honor and remember and meet Jesus anew every Sunday.

Can you imagine, if you are a Catholic who has been away from the Sunday Mass - the smile - no the BEAMING GRIN that it would bring to God's face - if He looks out into His Church on Sunday, and finds your place no longer empty - but filled? So that He can talk to you again in Scripture, nourish you in sacrament, and in so many powerful and mysterious ways, grow closer to you, in love.

If that is not a gift and joy that you have given to God in a while, then I hope you will consider making it your Valentine's gift to Him this year.



THE BLACK WATCH TARTAN: Boy Scout Troops often wear customized neckerchiefs with unique colors and designs to represent their Troop. The Black Watch Tartan is the name of the pattern on the neckerchief worn by Troop 14 Boy Scouts. On

December 9, Father Mark presented the history of the Black Watch Tartan to Troop 14. His talk included a slideshow, samples of the tartan, and he even had a Black Watch Uniform Badge, photo right.

The Black Watch is a Scottish Army Regiment, first formed in 1725 to serve the British Crown following the Jacobite rebellion. Today the Black Watch is officially The Black Watch, 3rd Battalion,



Royal Regiment of Scotland. The name is derived from the dark color of the tartan the men wore, and the company's role to "watch" over the highlands. Troop 14 has the distinction of being the only BSA Troop to wear the Black Watch Tartan by special permission from that regiment given in 1968.



After sharing the rich history of the Black Watch Tartan, Fr. Mark ended his presentation with these words:

"We hope that the next time you put on your neckerchief, you'll remember that it's not just a random pattern you are wearing - it's a part of history.

It's a reminder of a friendship between Boy Scout Troop 14 and a Scottish Scout Leader way back in the 1960s when our Troop was just finding its feet.


It's a connection to a very long and distinguished military organization that has fought in more than 100 major battles and has seen active duty all over the world.

The Black Watch, whose tartan you wear, is known for courage, brotherhood, loyalty, and sacrifice - all ideals also held up by the Boy Scouts of America.

I mentioned that when I first became the Pastor of St. Mary's, the Troop 14 Paperwork I received said, 'Proud Wearers of the Black Watch Tartan.' And we hope that after what you have learned tonight, you will be truly proud to wear it!"

POPE PIUS XII RELIGIOUS EMBLEM: On Sunday, January 5, at the 11:30 AM Mass, six Boys Scouts were awarded the Pope Pius XII emblem for their completion of this year long program. Led by Deacon Ron Dowding, the six Scouts explored vocations (single, married, religious, ordained) and ministries in the Church as calls from God. The program included lessons taught by Deacon Ron with discussions on current issues facing the church and society, speakers from each vocation, a day long retreat that included Scout presentations, reflection and adoration.

CROSS WALK

Walking with John Leary

Attending 7:30 PM Mass on Saturdays with my dear friend Ann Chiango, has been such a blessing. Along

the way, I have been able to meet many of her friends, including John Leary. Over the past few weeks, we have seen each other at Mass, and at a friend's wake. Each time, I could see both his strength and the love and tenderness in his heart for his wife. One day after Mass, John pulled a card from his pocket and shared with Fr. Mark and I the



beautiful 90th birthday card that his family had made for him. "90?" I said in disbelief. I could tell he had a lifetime of stories, and I invited him for a Cross Walk.

John grew up in New Bedford, one of five children. Tragically, one sister died very young. They were a devout Catholic family, whose faith origins began with his grandmother, who immigrated from Ireland, and died six weeks before John was born. She was a very faithful Irish Catholic, who had great influence on the importance of faith and church to John's mom. "I have



some Catholic prayer books that were my grandmother's" John said, "Inside she has recorded each time she went to confession."

John became an altar

server in 4th grade and by his sophomore year in high school, was taller than the priest! He reminisced about helping at communion by holding the paten under people's chins while they kneeled at the altar rail.

He went to Catholic School for eight years taught by The Sisters of Mercy. He recalled one incident that left an impression. A bully, named Jack, a real "hell-raiser," was picking on John one day, when they were both called to the principal's office. The principal took the side of the bully. John told me how Sister Francella, a young nun, and one of his teachers, stood up for him. It

really made an impression on him, and nearly 80 years later still brought a tear to his eye.

In 8th grade he was selected to serve a special High Mass with three priests and three other altar servers. As luck would have it, the altar server he was paired with was the same bully that he had known in 4th grade. "The good news is," John added, "this bully went on to do very well in his life."

When time for high school rolled around, his mother commented to him, "The nuns are good for eight years, after that you need males." So, he was sent to Msgr. James Coyle High School in Taunton where he was taught by the Brothers of Notre Dame. During High School, John frequented the local drugstore where they had a soda fountain. He got a job there being a "soda jerk" (for those who are younger - preparing and serving ice cream sodas). He thought John would make a good pharmacist and encouraged him. John ended up going to Mass College of Pharmacy, the second oldest one in the country (est. 1823). After 4 years of schooling and lots of Biology and Chemistry courses, he got his license.

Back then, the pharmacist couldn't substitute brands of medication. If you can imagine, all records kept were paper ones, with communication via landlines. John learned how to compound and make eye drops. He worked to get through grad school where he studied Pharmacognosy, the study of medicinal drugs obtained from natural sources such as plants, microbes, and animals. Throughout his career, John worked in pharmacies located in retail shops, community drug stores, hospitals, and skilled nursing homes. He received his doctorate from UConn in 1963 and taught about natural medicinal products at St. John's University in Jamaica, NY. He then worked for 25 years teaching at Mass College of Pharmacy. In 2001, John retired from being a pharmacist and worked for the Framingham Heart Study for 14 years. This was particularly meaningful to him because of his

mother's challenges with high cholesterol and how it had affected her health. John met his beloved wife Mary, through a grammar school friend. A Memorial Day picnic to Purgatory Chasm was their first date. John didn't have a job at the time and things kind of quieted down, till one day he was invited to a square dance and needed a partner. He went to the phone booth at the pharmacy, pulled a dime out of his pocket and called and asked her. They were novices at square dancing, making mistakes left and right. But the rest is history. They have been married for 67 years, and have been blessed with four children, eight grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren with another due this spring.



One particularly challenging time, money was very tight. John had an opportunity to go to Oregon for ten weeks at a higher paying position.

Incredibly, he did what he had to do for his family and took an apartment, living thousands of miles away across the country. Since his wife, Mary, was expecting their second child, they decided it would be best for her and their son Jay, to stay here with her mother and father. Forty-eight hours after he left, Mary went into labor and gave birth to their daughter Martha. John welled up with tears sharing that he did not get to meet his daughter till two months later on a trip home for Christmas. I cannot imagine how hard that was for him.

In 1968, John and Mary moved to Holliston and have lived here ever since. When the Leary family joined St. Mary's Parish, Fr. O'Brien was the pastor. John enjoyed teaching H.S. Religious Ed and later, Mary worked as a part-time secretary with Mary Beth Harris.

John and Mary served as Eucharistic ministers for many years. To be able to touch and share the Eucharist has been a very moving experience for him. One Sunday, someone called and couldn't make it, so John filled in. Walking toward him, a gentleman who was terminally ill with a brain tumor came up to receive Communion. As John said, "Body of Christ," and gave the Host to him,

John was moved to tears. The fact that he could be the one to connect Christ to this very ill man was overwhelming. What a gift it must have been for this man to see John's deep faithfulness shining forth from his face as he received our Lord.

Among the religious highlights in John's life are:

- His trip with Fr. David Lewis to eastern Italy to see St. Padre Pio and to Paris where they visited the chapel where St. Catherine Laboure lies incorrupt.
- Visiting the Vatican and Sistine Chapel. "I found these experiences very moving," John said.
- John has a special devotion to The Divine Mercy Chaplet and really enjoyed a day trip to The National Shrine of The Divine Mercy in Stockbridge with Fr. Mark and Deacon Ron.
- Attending a very meaningful Marriage Encounter event with Mary in 1975.

In the late 80's, Mary and John were instrumental in forming the NE Chapter of Retrouvaille, a program for couples in difficult marriages to rediscover the goodness in their spouse. Their chapter presented three weekends a year for about 30 couples per weekend with six follow up sessions to expand on the weekend talks. Retrouvaille was 75% effective in saving the marriages of those that attended. John mentioned how grateful he was for the support Fr. Haley gave to this program.
