From the Pastor's Desk


Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

POPE FRANCIS' NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS FOR CATHOLICS

When Pope Francis recently met before Christmas with Vatican employees, mostly lay people with families, he asked them to do 10 things.

- "Take care of your spiritual life, your relationship with God, because this is the backbone of everything we do and everything we are."
- "Take care of your family life, giving your children and loved ones not just money, but most of all your time, attention and love."
- "Take care of your relationships with others, transforming your faith into life and your words into good works, especially on behalf of the needy."
- "Be careful how you speak, purify your tongue of offensive words, vulgarity and worldly decadence."
- "Heal wounds of the heart with the oil of forgiveness, forgiving those who have hurt us and medicating the wounds we have caused others."
- "Look after your work, doing it with enthusiasm, humility, competence, passion and with a spirit that knows how to thank the Lord."
- "Be careful of envy, lust, hatred and negative feelings that devour our interior peace and transform us into destroyed and destructive people."
- "Watch out for anger that can lead to vengeance; for laziness that leads to existential euthanasia; for pointing the finger at others, which leads to pride; and for complaining continually, which leads to desperation."
- "Take care of brothers and sisters who are weaker … the elderly, the sick, the hungry, the homeless and strangers, because we will be judged on this."
- "Making sure your Christmas is about Jesus and not about shopping."



Pregnancy Help offers free and confidential counseling, referrals and assistance on a wide range of medical, social service, housing and financial issues. Many women come to Pregnancy Help feeling totally alone, isolated and abandoned by family, friends and partners. Others have some support but they are confused and frightened about what to do. Whatever a particular woman's situation might be, Pregnancy Help provides a safe place where she can come, speak from her heart and find the support she needs.

An Unexpected Gift

A beautiful smile highlighted with red lipstick. Nails, polished to a cherry shine. Outfit and jewelry just so. Pearl white hair thick and full, curved under in a bob with a vintage grey beaded headband. Her bangs combed down softly resting above her blue eyes. My dear, sweet friend, Carolyn.



"Really, ninetythree?" I asked, shaking my head in disbelief. "Yes," she said quietly, almost shyly, adjusting the napkin on her lap. And with those brief words a lovely conversation

began and an unexpected friendship was born.

Each week, visiting my neighbor Don at the assisted living home in Franklin, I would pull a chair up to the table where our friends Carolyn, Phil and Vinnie enjoyed conversation over lunch. This group of four, forming a small family, watching out for each other and sharing stories. Wednesdays couldn't come fast enough. I looked forward more and more to seeing Carolyn and her bright smile. When Don moved to another nursing home, the thought of not seeing Carolyn and my new friends at The Estates again was unimaginable, so I added a second visit to my calendar each week.

When my granddaughter, Hadleigh was born, I longed to introduce her to my mother who lived many states away. But due to my father's illness, my mom's trip always got delayed. When Hadleigh was three months old, I brought her to meet Carolyn. I remember holding Hadleigh on my

shoulder,
heading toward
the doors to

With each step,
my anticipation
grew.
I smiled seeing
Carolyn lifting
her fork several
tables away. I
could feel my
heart quicken.
The minute she

saw me walking toward her, she dabbed her red lips with her napkin, pushed out her chair and rose to her feet. As if in slow motion, she lifted her arms out in welcome. The rest of the lunch room faded away as we embraced in a hug. My heart was full.

At each of the visits that followed, Carolyn always asked how "the baby" was before even saying hello to me. She immediately wanted to hear the latest news about Hadleigh. "I think I have some new photos," I would offer, her blue eyes lifting in a sparking anticipation as I scrolled through my phone. Seeing the image, she would giggle, grab my phone "talking" to Hadleigh as if she were right there, "Look at you, my little darling! Such a sweet little baby! My you're getting big!"

For nearly two years, Hadleigh and I visited Carolyn and her friends, making the rounds of each lunch table bringing the quiet out of their shell, creating a smile where there had been none, soft little fingers curling in friendship around wrinkled hands, peek-a-boo, singing rounds of "You are my Sunshine," and savoring dishes of strawberry ice cream.

Carolyn's love and friendship filled my heart in a way that I cannot fully explain. She needed me and I needed her. One day when I felt compelled to tell her how special she was to me, the words, "I love you, Carolyn" spilled out telling her how glad I was that we were friends. Her eyes welled up, shaking her head in disbelief, as if she couldn't believe someone could feel that way about her. "Unbelievable," she said.

As time went on, there were several falls, trips to rehab and the hospital. Each time, I would track her down showing up unexpectedly with flowers and a comforting hand. As the door slid open, her eyes would roll and with that shy smile, shake her head again and say, "Unbelievable." Then last May, Carolyn began to slow

down, her favorite soup grew cold and visits were shorter as she tired more, but each one a pearl in the necklace we were beading of our friendship. I slowly began to realize that Carolyn might be on her way home to God.

Now under hospice care, snuggled under a fleece blanket, her soft bangs still falling delicately on her forehead, she slept. Hadleigh, now shy of two, sat on my lap on the side of her bed. We talked to her like always, telling her the latest news, singing her the ABC's, and just being with her while she slept.

"We need to let Carolyn rest, Hadleigh" I said. "Time to say bye bye." And with that Hadleigh reached her little hand out and patted Carolyn's, leaving it there while she said, "I yah you, Carewin." Sobbing, I grabbed my phone and captured the moment.

During the next days, I sat on Carolyn's bedside as often as I could, softly singing her hymns, gently rubbing her hand while I prayed and reading to her stories of faith and friendship from *The Book of Virtues* by Bill Bennett. For a brief moment, the morphine fog lifted and she

stirred and I knew she was aware I was there. "Its Cathy, Carolyn, your crazy friend who can' t seem to leave you alone." I laughed. After a moment, her eyes slipped open and she whispered, "Unbelievable."

The hospice nurse came in to make her more comfortable and she drifted off to sleep

with a smile on her face. Rising from my chair, I brushed her hair back and put my cheek to hers whispering the words to her that she always said to me when I had to go home "I love you, dear friend. Be safe and be well." The next evening, she passed away peacefully into God's arms.

In reading this Crosswalk, one can easily feel sad. Was this difficult? Yes... but honestly, I would not have missed this moment or the many 'pearls' of visits we had together for the world. Looking back there were many unexpected gifts here that God gave: By reaching

out to my neighbor in friendship, I received the gift of nearly twenty 90+ year old friends; my granddaughter, Hadleigh came to learn about and give the gift of compassion over months of visits; Carolyn's children were comforted knowing a stranger who had become a friend, was giving the gift of her time to their mother, and after she passed, her son Robert gave me the gift of a lovely conversation where he shared a few of the Jewish prayers that Carolyn so loved.

SUNDAY READINGS: In January we celebrate the end of the Christmas season and begin Ordinary Time. The gospel reading for January 6 recounts the adoration of the Magi at the manger (Epiphany) while the January 13 gospel reminds us of Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River. January 20's gospel reading is the story of the wedding feast at Cana, where Jesus performed his first miracle. (Verses 1 and 2 of the hymn *Songs of Thankfulness and Praise* speaks of these three events in Jesus' life, which, along with his birth, make him manifest to the world. This hymn is in our misalette on page 226.) The gospel on January 27 recalls Jesus' startling announcement in his hometown synagogue that the scripture passage he had just read from Isaiah 61 was fulfilled in their hearing. WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY: We celebrate this week of ecumenical prayer from January 18 to January 25. The theme this year is "Justice, Only Justice You Shall Pursue" (Deut 16:18-20) and the materials for this year's week of prayer were prepared by Christians in Indonesia.

WORLD DAY OF PEACE: January 1, in addition to being New Year's Day and, on the Church's liturgical calendar, the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, is the World Day of Peace. Each year, the Pope releases a statement about peace in recognition of this day. The 2019 message has not yet been posted on the Vatican website, but here's the address for the page on which it will appear: https://bit.ly/1Ze3IDR. Pope Francis' previous messages have focused on migrants, nonviolence, indifference, slavery and fraternity.

JUST WONDERING: Have you ever wondered about the Church's position on violence against women? Here it is: "Violence against women, inside or outside the home, is never justified. OUR ENVIRONMENT: We continue our focus on the environment this month. In the book of Genesis (Gen 1-2) we are told that God created all the earth, including man and woman. We understand from this story that humans are made in the image and likeness of God and are given dominion over the earth and its creatures. Anne Clifford, CSJ, a theology scholar specializing in Christian thought and the natural sciences, wrote a chapter on creation in a 2011 publication on systematic theology. In this chapter she says that "Dominion is modeled after a loving God who protects the defenseless and gives justice to the oppressed". In her chapter, she argues for a "theology that the earth can live with", citing the writings of Pope St. John Paul II and Pope Benedict in the process. More to come next month.
