All Christmas Masses are by RESERVATION ONLY (No Walk-Ins).

The Pandemic regulations have dropped our church seating from 600 to about 140. The Archdiocese has advised us to have only reserved seating for 2020 Christmas Masses.

This is the only way to avoid "no room at the inn." We do not want anyone to try to come in and be turned away for lack of space. By requiring an Advance Mass Sign-Up Reservation, we avoid that happening.

Hall: Please enter through the black door to the left of the double glass Parish Center parking lot doors.

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

Family has been very much on my mind recently, as like many of you the Pandemic prevented me from travelling to be with my family on Thanksgiving Day. Thanks to the kindness of parishioners, I was well-stocked with Thanksgiving goodies at the rectory. But it was not the same as gathering at table with my parents, siblings, and many nieces and nephews. Thanksgiving is about more than food – it is about renewing the bonds of love that keep families united and at peace.

It is not by accident that Jesus chose a meal, the Holy Eucharist, to ensure those same gifts for His Family the Church. This is expressed beautifully in the Mass when the priest says, "Humbly we pray that, partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ, we may be gathered into one by the Holy Spirit." The Eucharist is the Body and Blood of Jesus, Who is the great unifier – the One Who connects God to man, heaven to earth, the dead to the living, and believer to believer.

Sharing faithfully in the Eucharist each week is one of the most effective ways a family can foster unity, allowing Jesus to strengthen the love that draws them to God and to each other. Chief among these are patience, selflessness, fidelity, purity and humility.

Blessed Adolph Kolping once observed that, "The first thing a person finds in life and the last to which he holds out his hand, and the most precious that he possesses, even if he does not realize it, is family life." As a New Year is about to begin, let us each consider the place of family in our lives – both our individual families, and our faith family the Church. Let us try to renew these relationships as needed, recognizing them as opportunities to embrace sacrificial love and in so doing imitate Jesus.

With just one final Sunday of Advent standing between us and Christmas, I also make my annual call for you to please reach out to any of our Catholic brothers and sisters who have fallen away from the practice of their faith. Invite them to accompany you to Mass, or in these pandemic times to participate virtually. Tell them how much they are missed. Encourage them to come home to the Eucharist, a word which means "thanksgiving," and a celebration that is never so beautiful as when all the family is gathered together to share it.

May the Lord of Our Journey keep you and yours both physically healthy and spiritually safe.



A Christmas Message to the People of St. Mary's from Fr. Issa, Pastor of Our Lady's, Beit Sahour ~

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ of the Parish of Saint Mary / Holliston,

First, I would like to thank Fr. Mark for allowing me to address our twin parishioners in this blessed time, the Advent.

Nowadays, we all share the same circumstances and challenges. The Covid-19 pandemic crisis has seriously harmed us all, and consequently we are deprived of enjoying our

daily life and the beautiful moments as before. Indeed, the pandemic has taken the life of many of our beloved ones, and every day we hear about new cases many of which end in death. We feel now powerless. Therefore, we acknowledge our weakness in confronting our invisible enemy. We are physically, psychologically, socially, and economically paralyzed because of home confinement, as if we lie alive in limbo.

Yet, in the midst of these dire circumstances and of this paralysis, the Advent comes to remind us that the joy of Christmas is coming soon, where the Child Jesus (The Life) is born. Christmas invites us to follow the footsteps of the shepherds of Beit Sahour to look up to the highest where the angels are, and to discover the joy of God's loving presence in our life. It also invites us to move spiritually with the shepherds to the Manger of Bethlehem, to in spirit life in us again through Jesus Christ.

God wanted His Son to live among us, and so His name is Emmanuel. He loves us and will never leave us. We are called to experience His presence and to keep Him in our heart during this difficult time. His love for us does not necessarily mean that he spares us from these circumstances, but rather makes us realize that He is present with us and cares for us. Thus, when we are happy, He is with us, and when we suffer, He will also be with us.

Dear brothers and sisters; we can experience God's presence in this blessed time through vigil and repentance. Vigil means that we can read the signs of God's presence in our daily life in all details, regardless of how simple they are, and this can be realized in our daily prayer and in hearing his word. Yet, repentance means that we turn to Him with all our hearts, acknowledging our helplessness, our weakness, and our desperate need for Him and for His love. That is how, my dear brothers and sisters, we are ready to meet God through the Child Jesus.



I wish you a blessed and joyful Christmas, full of life, love, and of God's merciful presence. Please remember us in your prayer, and we in turn, will pray for you and for your beloved ones, especially those who left you for eternal life, where there is no crying, pain, sickness, or sorrow, but lasting joy and peace with the Lord and with his Mother, the Virgin Mary. English Book Donations ~

We are happy to report that the second box of book donations given by the people of St. Mary's, Holliston, has arrived safely at our Sister Parish's School in Beit Sahour. (Photo Left). They are most grateful for these, as they assist the children in learning the English language. The Latin Patriarchate School in Beit Sahour was founded in 1864. At that time, it was a very small school, and the number of students and teachers was limited. The school continued to expand until the 1970s when it consisted of nine classes and kindergarten. In 2003, the school became a full secondary institution and the first "High School" class graduated in 2005.

2020-2021 Holliston - Holy Land Friendship Scholarship Recipients ~

Through this new scholarship program, St. Mary's has committed to fully fund a year's education at the Beit Sahour Patriarchate School for one boy and one girl, to be chosen by Our Lady's Parish - one each from the "Middle School" and from the "High School." The cost is roughly \$1,200 per student, so the cost to St. Mary's is about \$2,500 in total. The students who benefit from the scholarship have shown a strong commitment to their studies and have a demonstrated need. This year's Inaugural Scholarship Recipients are:



AN ANGEL COMES TO ST. MARY'S

Eleven years ago, a widow of our parish made a bequest to St. Mary's. Her will stipulated, however, that the gift was "not for use in paying bills, but to add something of beauty to the parish that generations to come will be able to enjoy."

The widow's request was finally realized on November 24, 2020, with the installation of a stained-glass window above the double doors leading from St. Mary's parking lot into the Parish Center.

The window depicts an angel bearing a scroll which in Latin reads, "Let us bless the Lord!" The other stipulation of the will was that the gift remain anonymous. But when you see this new addition to St. Mary's, we hope you will say a prayer for the repose of the woman who gave it.

Where did the angel originate? St. Mary's new angel was crafted in the late 1890's in Germany by the Franz Zettler Studio. Like the stained-glass windows in St. Mary's Church, it was made in what became known as the "Munich Style." In this method, the religious

scenes are painted on larger sheets of glass, and then fused to the glass through firing in intense heat. This allows for a blending of colors not attainable by the old medieval style, in which any change of color in a scene required a separate piece of colored glass. The leaded seams do not interrupt or intrude upon the images portrayed but are camouflaged by the design in a way that makes them hardly noticeable. This style also allows for extremely detailed depictions of the subjects.



The thousands of stained-glass windows executed by the Franz Zettler Studio for cathedrals, churches, and chapels all over the world include: by order of Pope Pius X in 1912, a stained glass window for St. Peter's Church in Rome, Italy, representing the dove, symbol of the Holy Ghost, surrounded by golden rays; a number of windows in four chapels of the North American College in Vatican City; and many of the stained-glass windows in Roman Catholic cathedrals in the cities of the United States, such as Buffalo, Cleveland, Covington, Los Angeles, San Francisco, St. Augustine, and Spokane.



The Franz Zettler stained-glass angel now at St. Mary's Parish in Holliston, was originally created for Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Central Falls, Rhode Island, (church photo above left; angel in its original window configuration above right). This church was torn down in 1989, and for the last thirty-one years the angel has been in a dark crate in warehouse storage. How lovely that this beautiful piece of art is now in a window again, bringing light, color, and beauty to the people of God. We think the widow would be pleased!

The Process: St. Mary's chose the angel from a collection of stored pieces owned by the New England Stained Glass Company of North Attleboro, Massachusetts. Their artists then proposed layouts by which it might be re-purposed into the clear, arched window above the Parish Center doors. It was decided to go with a clear glass arrangement, centering the angel, with a multicolored border along the window frame. These photos show the project in progress.

"Benedicamus Domino!" The significance of "Let us bless the Lord!" In the Psalms, we often find verses that speak of blessing the Lord. For example, Psalm 104:1 reads, "Bless the Lord, O my soul! O Lord my God, you are very great! You are clothed with splendor and majesty." Psalm 16:7 notes, "I bless the LORD who gives me counsel; in the night also my heart instructs me."

But what does it mean that we can bless God? If God is perfect, how can we bless Him? To bless God simply means to praise Him or to honor His name. The Hebrew word translated "bless" in the Old Testament literally means "to kneel," indicating the idea of honoring the Lord. We do not add anything to Him when we bless Him, yet we worship Him as our appropriate response to His greatness and His love for us. Psalm 103:1-5 includes the idea of complete worship of the Lord without holding back: "Bless the LORD, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless His holy name! Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits, Who forgives all your iniquity, Who heals all your diseases, Who redeems your life from the pit, Who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy." May our new angel remind us always to bless the Lord!

- ❖ We meet the **God of love** in the Mass.
- ❖ Before coming to Mass, we should make an Act of Contrition. We want "the house of our soul" to be uncluttered for Jesus.

BSA'S & TROOP 14'S ANNUAL "SCOUTING FOR FOOD" SERVICE PROJECT: Due to the Pandemic, the demand on the Holliston Pantry Shelf is greater now than ever. Teen Leaders are already confirmed juniors and seniors who in addition to their lives of worship and prayer, volunteer their time to help with the faith formation of teens a few years younger than them.

This academic year we are blessed to have five awesome teen leaders assist with our Grade 9 Tuesday Confirmation prep class. These are juniors Caroline Salley and Kathleen Fitzgerald and seniors Michaela DeToma, Reagan Boice, and Michael Ringie (pictured above alongside youth minister Jake Thiringer). These teen leaders work with our adult leaders to facilitate activities, discussions, and learning among the teens preparing for Confirmation.

New Year's Resolutions for Catholics

With Christmas nearly upon us, it's a good time to contemplate the New Year in light of the gift of the Christ child. What does his coming mean to you and how can you take that with you into 2021? Diet, exercise, and quitting smoking are typical New Year's resolutions. Improved health is great, but for Christians with our sights on heaven, we can do better. Let's not forget the spiritual realm where improvements last longer than a lifetime. Here are suggestions to consider while setting goals for a holier year.

Commit Random Acts of Prayer. Resolve to pray for at least one person each day who does not even know you or perhaps would never suspect you would pray for them. It could a public figure, or someone in a passing car, or in the grocery line. Better yet, pick someone who has been nasty to you, or cut you off in traffic.

See Jesus More Often. Make a commitment to visit Jesus in the tabernacle. The more you give of your time to Jesus, the more he can give to you.

Do a good deed every day, no matter how small. When I was a kid we used to say: "I'm rubber and you're glue, whatever you say bounces off of me and sticks to you." Think of God telling us: "I'm God and I made you, whatever you do for others comes back to you."

Find a Charity to Donate Time or Money. By giving to others, we accumulate everlasting treasure. Consider also visiting a lonely relative, an elderly neighbor, or a young mother who could use some help.

Read the Bible. Protestants think Catholics don't read the Bible. Prove them wrong.

Go to one more Mass. If you don't always go to Sunday Mass, resolve NEVER to miss Mass and Holy Days of Obligation. If you only go on Sundays, find another day you are not obligated to go and simply attend for the extra graces and for the love of Jesus. If you go daily, try to get more out of it and really focus.

Turn your Dial to Catholic TV and Radio. Find some Catholic programing you enjoy and make a point to tune in regularly. Have you tried WQOM 1060 AM – Boston's Catholic Radio?

Read Catholic Literature and Listen to CD's. There's no lack of such resources. It's the next best thing to going on a retreat.

Fast a Day or Two During the Week. Jesus fasted for 40 days. Scripture says, "And when you fast..." (Matt 16:6) not *if* you fast. There's power in fasting. How you fast is up to you. Bread and water is too extreme for many. You can fast from TV or Facebook, or simply eat for nutrition i.e., plain tuna, broccoli and dry toast--not so tasty but maintains health while sacrificing. Or, consider leaving something out at every meal such as no mayonnaise on your sandwich or dressing on your salad. Make it a pure gift to God, not a diet for you.

Go to Confession more often. It's a gift Jesus gave to us after his Resurrection. He breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them and whose sins you retain are retained" (John 21:22). Just prior to giving them the power to forgive sins, Jesus sent them out into the world to act in his place: "As the Father sent me, so I

am sending you." The only other time the Bible mentions God breathing on anyone was in Genesis 2:7 when he breathed life into the first human beings. Likewise, confession breathes new life into our souls.

Don't dismay if you keep bringing the same sins back to Confession. I had a friend tell me that she told the priest she was embarrassed to keep confessing the same sins. The priest chuckled. "Just be glad you aren't bringing any new ones in," he said. It's about improvement, not perfection.

ENVIRONMENT: The Vatican document, *JOURNEYING TOWARDS CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME: Five Years after Laudato Si'* has been released in English. You can find it at http://bit.ly/LaudatoSiJourney. The document is a product of the Interdicasterial Working Group of the Holy See on Integral Ecology and was released in commemoration of the fifth anniversary of Pope Francis' encyclical on the environment, Laudato Si', On Care for Our Common Home. Each of the 24 general sections of the document includes a statement of good practices and a list of some concrete lines of action. Check out the document and see what you can do to help care for our common home.

SUNDAY READINGS: We celebrate liturgies of both the Christmas Season and Ordinary Time during this month. The Christmas Season extends to the Sunday feast of Jesus' Baptism, this year held on January 10. The next three Sundays in January are ones of Ordinary Time, beginning with the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time on January 17. The readings on January 17 and January 24 remind us of God's call to us to follow him. Both weeks have Old Testament readings about the call of prophets and the gospels focus on Jesus' call of his first apostles. How is Jesus calling you to be of service to him and your community? You can prepare for each Sunday's readings at https://liturgy.slu.edu/.

CHRISTIAN UNITY: The 2021 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is January 18-25. This week of prayer is held every year at the same time; the theme this year is from the Gospel of John, Chapter 15: "Abide in my love...you shall bear much fruit." Preparation of this year's prayer was assumed by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland (https://www.grandchamp.org/). On the Graymoor website about the week of prayer, https://bit.ly/UnityPrayerWeek, you will find a very informative history of this annual observance and an inspirational write-up about the background

to this year's theme; there are also a number of prayer and liturgical resources. The conclusion of the background write-up states things perfectly: "Human society is reminded that through the struggle of 2020 we are needier for love, fellowship and support than we have been in generations. So, let the sap flow! Let us bear much fruit."

YEAR OF THE EUCHARIST: The Eucharist: *A Mystery of Faith*. Pope Benedict, in his Eucharistic exhortation, *Sacramentum Caritatis* (https://bit.ly/SacramentumCaritatis), highlights these words spoken at Mass - *The Mystery of Faith* - and refers to "the substantial change of bread and wine into the body and blood of the Lord Jesus" as "a reality which surpasses all human understanding" (6, emphasis added). The US Bishops remind us, however, that "a lack of faith on the part of the person eating and drinking the Body and Blood of Christ cannot change what these are, but it does prevent the person from obtaining the spiritual benefit, which is communion with Christ."
