

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

On Tuesday, December 6, I entered the church just before 7 PM for the weekly Advent Holy Hour and Confessions. Deacon John was about to start Exposition, and I expected to step right into the Reconciliation Room to welcome folks for Penance, This is what I saw when I opened the door:



No, the room had not been vandalized. Rather, I had totally forgotten to remove the props used for the Children's Mass homily the Sunday before. Reflecting on John the Baptist's cry to "prepare the road and make a straight path," the kids identified items that can block a road. Branches then were placed in the main church aisle, large stuffed trash bags followed (representing rocks), and finally white packing peanuts were dumped out as "snow." It was truly a mess!

We then talked about how sins can block the way of Jesus, preventing Him from coming directly and powerfully into our hearts. When asked if there was a place we can take all these obstacles and be rid of them, the kids did not hesitate. "Confession!" they shouted.

Then they all helped grab the items lying in our road, and carried them into the Reconciliation Room. Where they remained totally forgotten by me until Tuesday night.

As I frantically cleaned everything out to make room for penitents to enter, I found myself reflecting that if these objects were really sins, then this would never have happened. Because once we bring our burdens to Christ in Confession, those sins are gone. They are forgiven. Some of the saints say that they are even totally "forgotten," by God.


We may in our weakness sin again and have to confess again. But as St. Don Bosco put it, once confessed, "you achieve something most important – you remove all doubts about your past confessions. You may then say, 'I have no worries about the past. I can look more cheerfully to the future.' You can indeed count on Our Lord's help in all circumstances because you are His sons and daughters by grace."



ST. MARY'S PARISHIONERS TAKE ON NEW MINISTRY IN CHIVALRIC ORDER

On Saturday, November 5, 2022, three St. Mary's Parishioners were among those invested by Cardinal O'Malley as Knights and Dames of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of

Jerusalem. They are Kristin Roberto, Jennifer Schiller, and Thomas Brodo. Four current Members of the Order were promoted to the rank of Knight Commander and Dame Commander. They are Brendan Cavalier, Sue Cote, Kim Latifi, and Anthony Nunes. The Mass of Investiture took place at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Manchester, New Hampshire.



The Equestrian Order is a worldwide Catholic Order of Chivalry that is comprised of lay and clerical members. One of the oldest international Orders of Knighthood, it was founded in 1099 to safeguard the Holy Sites in the Holy Land, especially the Tomb of Christ. Today, members of the Order commit themselves to continue growing in their knowledge and love of Jesus, and to supporting the Church's works of mercy in the Holy Land – particularly through schools, hospitals, clinics, and the Latin Patriarchate. They assist in the preservation of a living and viable Christian presence in the Holy Land held dear by all Catholics as the land where Our Lord was born, preached, died and rose to save us.

The Order of the Holy Sepulchre has approximately 30,000 members, of which 14,291 are in the United States of America. It is comprised of Catholic men and women who have distinguished themselves in their adherence to the teachings of the Church and in meritorious service to their parish and diocese. Membership is by invitation only. The nomination of a person to the rank of a Knight or Lady of the Holy Sepulchre is extended to Catholics who have demonstrated a "heart for service" and who desire to work together for an important cause of the Church – the preservation of Christianity in the Land of Christ. 

"Let the Children Come to Me"

anuary is a month when Catholics commemorate the Baptism of Our Lord and His Presentation in the Temple. It is also a month to remember the innocent children who have lost their lives before baptism; not only through abortion, but by miscarriage or a sudden infant death as well. Parents who have lost a child at such a tender age carry a great burden, and they should have every opportunity to grieve and to pray for the salvation of their child, but most are not afforded such opportunity, due to the fast pace of our modern society.

A feast day we celebrate each year, just three days after Christmas, is one that I have always identified with. Known as the Feast of the Holy Innocents, it commemorates the children mentioned in Matthew, 2:16-18 who were martyred by Herod in response to the birth of the Messiah. Every year I think of the anguish those parents must have felt, having lost their child to the aggression of a brutal, fearful dictator. And I reflect on the similar pain parents of miscarriage or a sudden death are experiencing after losing their child today. I have felt it; we have experienced a miscarriage of our own. And when we lost our child more than twenty years ago, we were not made aware of any funeral or burial rite that the Church could offer for our child. We just tried to move on. "It is important for us to have closure," one parent told me. "We want our child to know that we have not forgotten; that we will never forget (them)."



To provide a sense of closure and to offer our prayers for unbaptized children, St. Mary's will celebrate a special Mass on Thursday evening, January 26, at 7:00 PM. The Mass will be offered for the souls of every child lost before receiving the Sacrament of Baptism. By commending these children to Jesus, Whose tenderness toward them caused Him to say: 'Let the children come to Me, do not hinder them,' (CCC1261) we will be surrendering our grief, and the hope that God, Who desires that all people should be saved, will see to it that His precious children, and ours, may soon share His joy in heaven.

If you have lost a child prior to baptism, know someone who has, or just want to show your solidarity for grieving families, come to our special Mass on January 26. Add your voice to theirs in Communion with our Lord.



CROSSWALK

For those of you new to my Crosswalk articles, this is how it all began.

A few years ago, I found myself in a very difficult situation, I never thought I'd be in. I slunk down into the hard bench, mind racing; praying as hard as I could for God to hold me up in my weakness. The clock ticked in slow motion. Nervously, my eyes darted around the room, looking for something to slow my breathing. Then I saw it. There, in the embellished wall, the flat amber wood had perfectly aligned in one spot to make a cross. I stared... breathing slowed... shoulders softened. My focus gently shifted to the Divine. I felt God slip His hand into mine. His triumph over the cross reassuring me that with His help, I could get through this; and with His grace I did.

This experience inspired me so, that I began looking for crosses everywhere. I called it my "Crosswalk."

The word had dual meaning for me; a fun scavenger hunt

to see the shape of a cross in the ordinary, but also where the paths of God and I could intersect. On weekend walks, I continued to find crosses everywhere. My husband laughed as I would abruptly stop, run up to something and take pictures. "Another cross?" he would smile and ask. When I'd find one when joyful things happened, they reminded me to say thank you and in the tough times, they were a tool to give me strength and discernment.

Fast forward to 2012, I was going through some of the most difficult days of my life. I had lost my job, my daughter and mother in law were both dealing with cancer. All this, while flying back and forth to Birmingham, Alabama to help my mother struggling with the decision and the logistics of moving my disabled father to a skilled care facility. Any one of these would have been quite enough.

Seeking solace at Mass one Sunday, I listened closely as a confirmation candidate walked up to the ambo and shared a bit about his life as a Catholic at St. Mary's. I found it fascinating and hopeful to hear

about his faith journey and times where he had felt God active in his life. It was such a rare moment, seeing a high school student be so beautifully vulnerable, talking about something so deeply personal. I was inspired. My Cross Walk idea kept simmering, getting richer, and filling with flavor.

My eyes scanned across the breadth of the church; gray hair and brunette, retired and just born, male and female...I realized how many of this faith community I had never met, and that each of them was someone just like me, going through events good or bad and trying to see God in the midst of it all. I hungered to know more.

I began to imagine what taking "Crosswalks" with others would look like. Little by little God's 'recipe' for this "Crosswalk" idea He gave me was nearly ready to 'bake'.



Then, in God's perfect timing, it all came together. Father Mark asked me if I would be interested in writing for the newsletter. Immediately, I offered my idea of taking some

"Crosswalks" with parishioners to hear about a their faith journey; a struggle, a moment of hope, of clarity or comfort. I reminded him of Steve Hartman, the CBS news correspondent, who does a segment on TV where he throws a dart at a map and finds someone in that town and features their story. "Why couldn't this be done with faith stories?" I asked. He smiled and replied, "It sounds good, but NO darts!".



And so it began. I came in a different door each week to Mass and sat in a place I was not used to.
Admittedly, at first it was a bit uncomfortable.

We are certainly creatures of habit, aren't we? After our final "Hail Mary" at the end of Mass, I'd introduce myself to my "neighbors in the pews" and begin chatting. Often my invitations lead to coffee and a lovely faith sharing. We both came out of the chat feeling more connected and richer for having shared our faith experiences.


Since my first walk in 2017, I have "walked" with over 16 people sharing my reflections in the newsletter. It has been a remarkable experience. Now, after taking a break with the pandemic, I am eager to get back to my Crosswalk chats with St. Mary's parishioners. ADULT FAITH RESOURCES JANUARY 2023





SEASONS AND SUNDAYS: As we look at the liturgical calendar, January 2023 is a bit different than other Januarys. The first Sunday of January is January 1, the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God; the second Sunday, January 8, is the Feast of the Epiphany. Both of these Sundays are within the season of Christmas. Often, the next Sunday is remembered as the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, and it

concludes the Christmas Season. However, this year, we commemorate Jesus' baptism on Monday, January 9; the following day, Tuesday, January 10, marks the beginning of Ordinary Time. The readings for the first two Sundays of January are specific to the Solemnity/Feast of the day. The gospel readings for the first three Sundays of Ordinary Time (January 15, 22 and 29) encourage us in our Christian identity as a light to the nations, invite us to reflect on Jesus' call to his first apostles and challenge us to live the Beatitudes. We are also asked to respond with the psalmist "[h]ere am I, Lord. I come to do your will," and "the Lord is my light and my salvation." You can prepare for the Sunday readings at https://liturgy.slu.edu/.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY: The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is January 18-25. The week of prayer, previously called the Church Unity Octave, was first celebrated in 1908 in Garrison, New York after being developed by Servant of God, Fr. Paul Wattson, SA (Society of Atonement). The theme this year is "Do Good; Seek Justice" (Isaiah 1:17). St. Mary's Cemetery Policies

One full size grave can have three cremations and/or one full size burial.

The maximum monument (headstone) size for the number of graves purchased is as follows: single grave (2×1) under 3 feet in height; two graves (3×1) ; three graves (4×1) ; four graves (4×1) . The only exception is in the older sections of the Cemetery.

Flowers may be planted within 12 inches directly in front of the stone.

Bushes may be planted on either side of the monument (never to exceed two feet in height) and must be kept pruned by the planter accordingly. Rose Bushes are not allowed.

No planting of trees.

No planting or any other alterations in the back of the headstone.

No fences, borders, curbing, statues, chairs, hedges or hardscapes shall be erected.

Benches may be placed only if serving also as the grave headstone and located accordingly at the head of the grave.

Seasonal flowers may be placed on graves with the understanding that the cemetery staff will remove them if they interfere with maintenance of the area.

No glass containers may be left on graves as they are a safety hazard.

The Parish reserves the right to change, alter and or amend any of the above policies or to add new ones at any time without notice.
