About three times a week, I take my dog Crispin and his best friend Charlie hiking on the Charles River Trails. At a certain point, the trail is covered by a wooden slatted "bridge." This is because sometimes that area becomes flooded with rainwater, especially in the spring. Frogs spawn in it, and the water becomes home to tadpoles.



Unfortunately, as the water dries up there is less and less room for the tadpoles. They become confined and crowded into just a few small puddles, all squirming together in an almost solid mass. When the last puddles dry out, the tadpoles all die.

Or at least most of them do. Because each spring when I see this happening, I take my plastic dog treat bag out of my pocket, empty it, and scoop up tadpoles and water from the jammed puddles. I then carry them a bit farther up the trail and release them into a permanent water pool connected to a stream.

Why bother? I think it's because my parents instilled in me a reverence for all life. When we found a spider or other creepy crawly in our house, for instance, my siblings and I were taught to capture it and carry it outside. This simple lesson had a lasting impact on me, one that goes beyond tadpoles to life in all its beautiful and varied forms.

Life is a gift that we humans cannot bestow where we please. And never should we then take a gift beyond our power to give. Hopefully our respect for life will go beyond doing no harm, to actively preserving life where we see it vulnerable and threatened. In doing so we honor God's Creation and fulfill our role as stewards of the world He has made. Trapped tadpoles are just a symbol and a start.



Our Journey to the Holy Land

Our Visit to Bethlehem: "Today in the city of David a Savior has been born to you, Who is Christ the Lord! And this will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." [Luke 2:11-12]. The church in the city of Bethlehem (translated in Hebrew as "House of Bread"), can only be entered through a doorway less than five feet in height (photo top left). Known as the "Door of Humility," it compels pilgrims to bow before entering the birthplace of Our Lord. Just outside Bethlehem, we also visited Fr. Issa and the people of our Sister Parish, Our Lady of Fatima in Beit Sahour. The name Beit Sahour means "House of the Night Watch," and it was in this area that the shepherds were visited by the angels who announced the birth of the Savior. Our guide from 206 Tours, Rami Munayer, told us how the shepherds were considered unclean by the inhabitants of the city, having kept dogs in their company watching over the sheep. The lambs for the Passover sacrifice would be selected from those flocks and brought to Jerusalem in swaddling in order to protect them from blemish. It is significant that the angel of God came to these shepherds first and gave them the sign of an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger, (Shepherd's Field Chapel, photo left). Jesus came to the earth to offer the holiest of sacrifices for the simple and unclean.

Our Visit to Jerusalem: "This is my blood of the New Covenant, shed for many for the forgiveness of sins." [Matthew 26:28] The most difficult journey of the pilgrimage for me was the descent into Jerusalem. Leaving the Mount of Olives, we descended down a narrow winding path to the garden of Gethsemani, where Jesus knelt in anticipation of His Passion. We celebrated Mass in the Church of All Peoples, built directly over the rock in which He prayed. (Photos below). Surrounded by a grove of olive trees, one can get the sense of Our

Lord's loneliness and trepidation, alone in that garden. The sorrow inside that church is real; the interior is dim, with dark purple hues, reminiscent of painful anticipation. But the color purple is also a symbol of nobility and power, and I

thought about the passage in which Jesus spoke of His moment of glory; reminding us of the fruit His sacrifice would yield: "And what shall I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? But it was for this purpose I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven: "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." [John 12:27-28].





Nothing of value comes without cost. Every cross we carry, every sorrow we hold, God shares with us in the price of His Son. Every church we enter, every Communion we share, brings us to the doorway of heaven's glory. Each of us, whether here or in the Holy Land, are pilgrims on a journey of faith. When we bend into our suffering we don't enter it alone; we have with us a God who has experienced it all. By His example we can raise our hearts to the joy He holds for us on the other side. Before we arrived in Jerusalem, we had ascended to top of Mount Tabor, where the church of the Transfiguration is located (photos right). During our celebration of the Eucharist there, Fr. Mark delivered a homily that captured the spirit of our journey. He spoke about Jesus as the door that links heaven and earth together [John 10:9-16]. On that mountain Jesus became the door that Elijah and Moses reentered in conversation of His Paschal sacrifice. On that mountain Jesus became the door which the Father peers through; beckoning His beloved children to enter into His joy. Whatever the reason we pass through this Door, we can be assured of one great truth: Jesus provides an opening for us. Not simply an opening into a church, but an opening into a whole new way of living.




Fidelity Month

As a natural complement to the Catholic Church's dedication of June

to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, Dr. Robert George of Princeton University is organizing an effort to establish June as national Fidelity Month. Fidelity Month is an invitation to embrace a virtue; a positive movement intended to call all Americans back to our founding principles. It is a movement intended to heal the deep divisions within our country today, and a way to unite us again in a common purpose. Fidelity Month will be formally initiated with an online symposium/webinar slated for June 1. It





will feature Dr. George, Harvard University's Dr. Jacqueline Rivers, Rabbi Dr. Meir Soloveichik and others. Dr. George, a prominent Catholic figure of the pro-life movement who recently received the prestigious Evangelium Vitae Medal by the University of Notre Dame, would like this movement to operate as much as possible under the principle of subsidiarity: a grass-roots effort to engage the energy and creativity of various groups and regions across the country. "Fidelity Month is not just Catholic," he said. "It's for everyone who is interested in restoring the importance of being faithful to God, our spouses and families, and our communities and country." Dr. George and his colleague Deacon Michael Forrest engaged the professional assistance of our own Deacon John Barry, a graphic designer and founder of Top Dog Design Studio in Millis, to create the visual identity and branding for the Fidelity Month movement. The mark features the word "Fidelity" embraced by a golden myrtle wreath on a blue field. Its symbolism is representative of divine purpose, achievement, wisdom and truth. Finding the next person to take a Cross Walk with, is an adventure that I always look forward to each month. I never know what treat is in store!



During a recent Mass, I heard a sweet little voice behind me singing. I smiled wondering

who the little cherub was. At the sign of peace, I turned around to see Claire, an adorable 6-monthold, mouth open, smiling and listening to her own voice praising God. After Mass, I introduced myself to her parents Andrew and Heather and soon we were planning a time to meet. The Santucci family lives in a lovely home in Hopkinton that Andrew built recently. It is warm and homey, the kind of place you immediately feel welcome. While Claire babbled and played on her play mat, we enjoyed a nice chat together.

Andrew grew up in Holliston attending Marian High School in Framingham. "My graduating class was only 60 or so," Andrew shared, "I remember feeling very respected by the principal and liked how the staff really got to know you. I received a good education there, which taught me basic life skills like good decision making and discipline." Andrew studied for his confirmation when Matt Chick was St. Mary's Youth Minister. "Our work and service projects taught me that there are a lot of people in the world living in very different circumstances." Andrew was confirmed in 2008, and chose St. Angelo, an early member of the Carmelite order who was martyred for his faith, as his saint's name.

Heather remembers hearing during her CCD classes, that they were looking for altar servers. She enjoyed being up where the action was.

"I am the type who studies a lot and wants to be prepared, but even after learning, I was still quite nervous." She said. "Being an altar server helped me understand the parts of the Mass, why they do certain things, and what happens behind the scenes to get ready."

Heather was confirmed at St. Pius X in Leicester. She chose someone close to the family, who had baby sat her, for her confirmation sponsor. "I remember feeling like I wanted to be like her," Heather said, "She was always very faithful and is still living that faith. To Andrew and I, faith is an important part of our life together now, something to fall back on. Learning about it as a youngster, gave us a good foundation and taught us good morals."

"My mother is an ICU nurse." Heather offered, "She had a patient who was critically ill. His family stayed by his bedside praying for two weeks

and miraculously, he turned around. My mother commented that she had no idea how he lived through it, but he did. Some things can't be explained, you take them on faith when you see these things happen."

The love and bond between Heather and Andrew was palpable to me, I asked them how they had met. "It was January 2020, just before the pandemic," Heather began, "Both of our sisters encouraged us to try online dating where we met. While we couldn't do the ordinary things like go to the movies, we chose to stay in each other's 'bubble.' It actually worked out well. There was nothing distracting us from getting to know each other. Soon we fell in love and in 2022 we were married." "We have always worked well together." Heather continued, "We have never really fought about anything. If we need to have a conversation on a difficult topic, we don't ignore it. We ask the other one to sit down and we talk it out. We take life day by day and know we will figure it out together. "

Their daughter Claire was born in October 2022. For her baptism, they realized how serious the church takes the role of godparent. There was certain criteria the person needed to meet. "We had to take time to really think about this decision.

Deacon John Barry was helpful in that process." I asked them what their wishes were for Claire regarding her faith. "The world has gotten so crazy." Heather shared, "Andrew and I want her to be educated in the Catholic faith

"You both speak so freely and comfortably about your faith," I replied, "what a beautiful witness this is to those around you."

I asked Andrew and Heather if there was a cross that has special meaning to them. Immediately, Heather pointed to the door. Sitting there on the molding was a palm leaf cross.



"We have a friend, Lisa, who we have known for years. Every Palm Sunday, she leaves a bag tied on our mailbox with a special gift. She weaves us a cross

out of the palm fronds from Mass. We look for the bag every Palm Sunday. This year, it did not show up, and we wondered out loud where it was. Sure enough, it showed up very soon with an apology for being late. It is such a sweet thing to do."

I love each month, how a simple hello turns into a wonderful conversation that makes me feel a greater part of the St. Mary's community. It was a pleasure to meet you, Andrew and Heather. You are such loving and faith-filled parents. Keep on singing Claire!

"FAITH SPEAKING" VOLUMES: This month's book recommendation is Timothy O'Malley's *Real Presence: What Does It Mean and Why Does It Matter?* This book, written in 2021, is part of the *Engaging Catholicism* series published by the University of Notre Dame, the aim of which is to highlight the connections between our Catholic doctrine and the way we live our Catholic lives. Although difficult to understand at times, O'Malley's book is a good one to pick up, as it helps us to see that we receive Christ, and the totality of His love for us, in the Eucharist, so that we might then give this love for others (p. 123). O'Malley explores the believer's perception of God's real presence in the world and in the Eucharist, as he looks at the Scriptures (Old and New Testaments) and the teachings of the early Church, respectively. He also offers information on the mystery of transubstantiation, the Catholic Church doctrine that states that, during the consecration of the Mass, the elements of bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ...though they still are perceived by our human senses to be bread and wine. O'Malley is a proponent of Eucharistic devotion and adoration and he dedicates a chapter in his book to this topic, presenting it through the experiences of several women in Catholic history. *Real Presence* is available for purchase from online booksellers. There is a copy of the book in the parish library as well.

SUNDAY READINGS: The Church celebrates the liturgical season of Ordinary Time once the feast of Pentecost is completed. The first two Sundays of this second round of Ordinary Time (the first round was between the Christmas season and the season of Lent) are the Solemnities of the Most Blessed Trinity (June 4) and the Body and Blood of Christ/Corpus Christi (June 11). Ordinary Time then continues uninterrupted to the Season of Advent, which begins in early December. During the summer months this year, the second readings for most Sundays are from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans. The US Bishops have written an introduction to this letter at <u>https://bible.usccb.org/bible/romans/0</u>. Gospel readings you might recognize this summer include Jesus' commissioning of His apostles (June 18) and the parable of the sower (July 16). You can prepare for the Sunday readings at <u>https://liturgy.slu.edu/</u>.

FATHER'S DAY: Father's Day is celebrated on Sunday, June 18 this year. The Farmer's Almanac has a page dedicated to Father's Day, its history and ideas for celebration: <u>https://bit.ly/June18FathersDay</u>. You can go to Creighton University's Online Ministries (<u>https://bit.ly/CUFathers</u>) to find prayers for fathers and husbands.



RACE AMITY: Race Amity Day is celebrated on the second Sunday of June, this year, June 11. According to the National Center for Race Amity (*https://raceamity.org/*), "race amity is the 'other tradition,' a tradition of close interracial partnership and collaboration that has served throughout our history as the moral counterweight to the dominant tradition of racism and oppression." There is a celebration of this day at the Weston Community Center on June 11, 6:00 - 7:30 PM. The program will focus on Indigenous Peoples, their history, and

cultural traditions. On Saturday, July 29, from 12:00 noon to 6:00 PM the annual Boston Race Amity Arts and Music Festival returns to Faneuil Hall Marketplace with a diverse musical lineup, community art projects, handmade local arts and crafts and free Ben & Jerry's ice cream from sponsor Boston Scoops!

PRAYER: The method of prayer highlighted this month is the Mass, our Eucharistic liturgy. During the Mass we have the opportunity to practice all the forms of prayer mentioned over these past few months: adoration, contrition, thanksgiving and supplication/petition (ACTS). The Mass also offers us the opportunity to both listen to and speak to God, and to do so as a community of believers. Amen!
