

#### ASH WEDNESDAY IS A DAY OF **FASTING** AND **ABSTINENCE** FROM MEAT.

Why do we wear ashes on this day? Ashes symbolize two main things in the Old Testament – death and repentance. Ashes are equivalent to dust, and human flesh is composed of dust or clay (Genesis 2:7). For example, Abraham told God, "I am but dust and ashes" (Genesis 18:27), a reference to his human mortality. We use ashes on Ash Wednesday to remind ourselves of our own mortality. We are all born here, but none of us is staying here. Death may come sooner, or it may come later, but it will surely come. This is not a cause for fear, but for urgency to embrace the Gospel with new vigor. We only have so much time to accept Jesus' offer of salvation, and follow Him on the Way of the Cross, the way of sacrificial love.

Ashes are also a symbol of repentance for past sins. When the prophet Daniel shamefacedly clothed himself in sackcloth and ashes, they were a sign of his people's contrition for their rebellion, wickedness and treachery (Daniel 9:3). When Jonah warned the Ninevites that God planned to destroy their city because of their corruption and depravity, the people covered themselves with sackcloth and ashes as a sign of their intention to turn from their evil ways (Jonah 3:6,10). Ashes are a plea to God for mercy and compassion, pardon and forgiveness. Moreover, they are a public admission of guilt, an expression of sorrow for sins that have been committed, a promise to reform and a pledge to resist temptation in the future.

In His own words, Jesus "came to call sinners." We, too, are sinners. When we come forward to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday, we are saying that we are sorry for our sins, and that we want to use the season of Lent to correct our faults, purify our hearts, control our desires and grow in holiness so we will be prepared to celebrate Easter with great joy. **Our ashes say that we want to come back to Jesus.**

(Presentation Speech by Fr. Mark at St. Mary's Scout Sunday Mass, 9:30 AM, Feb. 2, 2020)

As many of you know, this past year saw the retirement of Charlie Paradie as the Scoutmaster of Troop 14. Charlie was Scoutmaster for the past 9 years and has been an active leader in our Troop for 26 years.

Charlie's tenure was marked by hard work, commitment, generosity – and the elevation of at least 25 Scouts to the rank of Eagle Scout.

In so many ways, Charlie has served as role model and mentor for our Scouts – including as a man of faith. On Scout Sunday we celebrate that a Scout is reverent. Which means among other things, that he 'fulfills the obligations of his religion.'

And Charlie does that – worshipping at Mass faithfully on Sundays and Holy Days, contributing his time and talents to his parish, and living out his faith by his love of God and neighbor.

Charlie represents the very best of Scouting because he excels not only in worldly things, but in the spiritual life.

### **HEARTS SURGE AT ST. MARY'S!**

For three nights, Catholics wanting to grow and strengthen their faith filled our Church for "Surge of the Heart" – our Parish Mission and the first major event of St. Mary's 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebrations. International speaker and best-selling author Jon Leonetti led the Feb. 9-11 event, entertaining and instructing a crowd of all ages.

On Night One, Jon focused on God as gift. "God does not need us," said Jon, meaning that God's love for us is pure gift. Jon talked about the awesome gift of Jesus' suffering as the great proof of God's love, using powerful images that made us appreciate Our Lord's Sacrifice anew.

On Night Two, Jon began by asking how many present hoped to be "saints" one day. When a minority raised their hands, Jon reminded us that everyone in heaven is a saint. Not all may be named and "canonized", but if you are in heaven you are a saint. Which is why sainthood should be the primary, overarching goal of our lives. He then used stories of the saints – with all their struggles and imperfections – to show that sainthood is possible. Purgatory was discussed as the great gift of final purification that allows us to enter heaven unstained and fully open to the joy of God.

On Night Three, Jon identified three characteristics that every saint had in common: A daily prayer life; a relationship with the Sacraments – especially Confession; and a devotion to Mary. He then offered practical steps to integrate these sources of grace into our lives, all with the goal of eternal life one day.



## From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

Thank you to all who made St. Mary's "Surge of the Heart" Parish Mission such a success. About four hundred people filled the church each night to reflect on and be inspired by the gift of our Catholic faith. Many thanks to Jon Leonetti for guiding us through these evenings of spiritual renewal. Our 150<sup>th</sup> Parish Anniversary celebrations are well begun!

About two years ago, when we first began planning St. Mary's 150<sup>th</sup>, parishioners stressed that it should be not only a celebration of our past, but also an opportunity to reach out to others in new ways. The idea was proposed of adopting a "sister parish" – a Catholic community of faith somewhere in the world with which we could enter into a relationship of mutual blessing and support. The criteria were as follows:

- 1) A parish in a part of the world where life is hard, and where our friendship would be a real balm.
- 2) A parish different from us in language and culture, allowing us a more diverse experience of Catholicism.
- 3) A parish accessible enough to receive gifts and visits from us.
- 4) A parish with enough electronic infrastructure that we could communicate and foster friendships.
- 5) A parish with leadership and people open to a "sister" relationship.

The first criterion led us to the Holy Land, where on our last St. Mary's Pilgrimage many parishioners were shocked at how difficult life is for the Arab Christian communities. As the result of government restrictions, discrimination, and at times outright persecution, the number of Christians in the Holy Land has plummeted. In 1950, for instance, Bethlehem and the surrounding villages were 86 percent Christian. But as of 2019, the Christian population has fallen to 11 percent. The territory of Bethlehem, (including Beit Sahour), is surrounded by an Israeli "security wall." In order to travel outside the city, residents must receive special, rarely granted permits, and then pass inspection by armed soldiers after waiting hours in line. This makes it very difficult to find work, go to the doctors, visit family, etc. Just this year, severe new restrictions were added to travel between Bethlehem and Jerusalem, a city just seven miles away. The Bethlehem territory itself is experiencing ongoing decay of its infrastructure.

Having settled on the Holy Land as a worthy prospect, we then reached out to the Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem, which provides the vast majority of funding for the Catholic Church in Israel, Palestine, Jordan and Cyprus. Together these areas make up the "Latin Patriarchate of Jerusalem." Officials of the Order assisted us in getting permission from Archbishop Pierbattista Pizzaballa, Apostolic Administrator of the Patriarchate. We then began working with Dr. Sami El-Yousef, C.E.O. of the Patriarchate, who helped us narrow down the most likely candidate sister parishes.

At our January 12, 2020 Meeting, St. Mary's Parish Council voted unanimously to select Our Lady of Fatima Parish in Beit Sahour, the Shepherd's Fields outside Bethlehem. On February 4, 2020, Fr. Issa Hijazeen, the Pastor of Our Lady's, accepted the sister parish relationship proposal. He will be writing soon to the people of St. Mary's, Holliston, and I am working on a letter to the Catholics in Beit Sahour. Already Fr. Issa has pledged that each First Friday the morning Mass at Our Lady's will be offered for our parishioners in Holliston. We will be reciprocating with a monthly Mass for them, shifting it to our First Fridays as the calendar allows. Both parishes will immediately begin supporting each other in prayer.

We look forward to seeing how our new relationship with our fellow Catholics in Beit Sahour will evolve. We hope it will lead to personal friendships, spiritual enrichment, and better understanding of the lives of Catholics in other lands. As we learn more about the specific needs there, we hope also to become a source of charitable support. Please take a moment to read about our new Sister Parish in this Newsletter. 




- Good quality colored pencils; Educational Audio CD's for learning the English language.



# Meet St. Mary's new Sister Parish ~ Our Lady of Fatima in Beit Sahour, the Shepherd's Fields outside Bethlehem!



Beit Sahour, the Land of the Shepherds, has one of the largest Christian communities in the Palestinian Territories. The Parish was established in 1859, with only 80 families. Today, it is one of the most active parishes in the area with pastoral initiatives for various activities and groups: three youth groups, a choir and Scouts.

The first Latin Patriarchate School was built in Beit Sahour in 1864. Since then, thousands of Christians and an increasing number of Muslim children have continued to attend classes at the pre-school,

kindergarten, elementary and primary grades (up to Grade 12). Over the years Beit Sahour School has undergone renovations and expansions to serve the increasing demand for space. There are weekly parent-teacher sessions and meetings of the Scouts (boys and girls). The existence of the Pastoral Center continues to promote public encounters and sharing. Christ the King Bookstore, the first Christian bookshop in the Palestinian Territories opened in 2011.



Despite its aging and deteriorating physical structure, the Beit Sahour school, due to its performance and high-quality education, is attracting more and more students every year. Townspeople and others from the vicinity are seeking to enroll their children in Beit Sahour School that they might later profit from the advanced, standard education and instruction it offers in an open environment.

Beit Sahour Statistics: Population 15,500. Christians 12,000.

We are honored to welcome His Eminence. Save the date for this highlight of our Anniversary Celebrations!


# Celebrating 150 years! St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church

**Did You Know?** This March Newsletter continues a series of 'Did You Know' articles with tantalizing tidbits from the research that's been done for the new history of St. Mary's book. A different story will appear in each Monthly Newsletter during 2020.

**Did You Know?** St. Mary's Parish Rectory was **not** built by our founding Pastor, Fr. Richard Quinlan. When Fr. Quinlan arrived in Holliston in December 1870, the rectory building was owned by a physician, Dr. Charles Spring, according to the *1882 Holliston Business Directory*. Dr. Spring settled in Holliston with his family around 1874, and was a member of the Holliston Board of Health and the School Committee. He died in October of 1890, allowing Fr. Quinlan to purchase the house in 1892.

Prior to Dr. Spring, the house was owned by James Simonds, a tailor who used the house as his residence and business. He was in Holliston as early as 1855, when the MA State Census recorded him living there with his wife and his son (also a tailor). His name is also on an 1875 map of Holliston at the corner of Church and Washington Streets. Ownership of the house cannot be traced before Mr. Simonds. It is possible he built the house.

So where was Fr. Quinlan living prior to purchasing the house in 1892? The same *1882 Holliston Business Directory* lists Fr. Quinlan as living in a house on Charles St. near Washington and his father

was boarding with him. As early as June of 1871, his accounts ledger includes an expense of "House Rent \$50.00." His ledger lists house rent monthly through Sept. 1880 when the accounts ledger ended.

The rectory photo above was taken around 1894 and was found in the book *One Hundred Years of Progress...Archdiocese of Boston* published in 1895. See if you can spot differences between this image and the current rectory.



Ash Wednesday is just around the corner (February 26), so I wanted to share my suggestions for great Lenten reads.




#### To Know Christ Jesus by F.J. Sheed

No other book has brought the Gospels alive for me like this one. Sheed offers all sorts of interesting thoughts on the life of Christ, without veering into unfounded speculation. He mines the Scriptures and comes up with gems that I'd never seen before. It is a bit dense (I almost gave up on it about 40 pages into it), but it really picks up around page 50. If you can stick with it, you'll be richly rewarded.



#### 10 Prayers God Always Says Yes To by Anthony DeStefano

This slim little book is packed with all sorts of interesting thoughts about what God's will is for you, and how to grow closer to God in times of silence. I found it to be particularly helpful in the discussion of the age-old "Why does God allow bad things to happen?" question. This is the perfect read if you've been feeling angry with God, wondering why he's silent, feeling like he hasn't been answering your prayers, etc. (I first discovered it through this recommendation from a mother whose only child was murdered in the Virginia Tech shootings.)




#### He Leadeth Me by Walter Ciszek

This stunning autobiographical account of Fr. Ciszek's wrongful imprisonment in Russia is one of the most life-changing books I've ever read. I read it more than a year ago and yet I still find myself thinking about it almost daily.


What was most surprising to me was how applicable the lessons he learned are to modern American life. His insights about everything from suffering to discerning God's will to trusting God in all things — which he learned the hard way during five years of brutal solitary confinement

and fifteen years in a Siberian death camp — are amazingly inspiring, whether you're experiencing great suffering or just feeling numbed by the daily grind. I particularly loved his thoughts on how to maintain a lively spiritual life even when life feels mundane or boring. I highly, highly recommend this book.



#### Journey to Easter by Pope Benedict XVI


Based on a Lenten retreat he gave for John Paul II in the 1980's (hosting a retreat to help John Paul II grow in faith — how's that for pressure?!), Pope Benedict XVI walks us through a series of meditations based on Scripture readings for Lent. I admit that there were two or three chapters that were just way over my head, but the rest of the book offered powerful insights on everything from prayer to the Paschal mystery to conversion to the Church. I find myself going back to this book over and over again for inspiration. An excellent read for Lent.



#### Introduction to the Devout Life by Francis de Sales

When I first read the 17th century classic *Introduction to the Devout Life*, I didn't feel like I got that much out of it. When I reached the last chapter I felt like I'd enjoyed reading it but couldn't point to anything specific I'd taken away from it. Then I picked it up off my desk one day and, as I flipped through and re-read the various passages I'd starred and highlighted, I realized just how much I really had taken away from this book.

Now that I've gone through it again, I count it among the best books I've ever read. It's the ultimate how-to manual for conforming yourself to Christ. Also, perhaps because the book is based on de Sales' letters of spiritual direction to his sister and other women who wanted to grow in faith, I find that his advice perfectly fits the things I struggle with on a day to day basis as a wife and mother. Just know that you may have to read it more than once to have the lessons really sink in.



#### **<u>Finding God's Will for You</u>** by Francis de Sales

How do we know what God wants us to do? Should we try to discern God's will even for little decisions like what to eat for dinner? What if we pray and it seems like God is telling us nothing at all? These were the questions I had when I decided to get a copy of this book. I found good answers to those questions and a whole lot more: the book has lots of practical advice for daily living that you can start applying to your life right now. It's also a little bit less dense and more readable than *Introduction to the Devout Life*.



**Book Review** by Sharon Febo: The new book, *Wild at Heart: America's Turbulent Relationship with Nature, from Exploitation to Redemption* by Alice Outwater, (New York, NY: St. Martin's Press, 2019) provides historical perspective on current environmental difficulties including climate change and plastic pollution in the oceans. For instance, Outwater outlines previous ecological challenges related to migratory birds and waterway pollution which, when met with determination and resolve, led to the growth of the Audubon Society in the early 1900's and the passage of the Clean Water Act in 1972, respectively. *Wild at Heart* provides an interesting look at the way our relationship with nature has evolved over time and gives some hope that we too may eventually be able to resolve our current issues.

**Lent**: Lent 4.2 is a "seven-week faith formation program of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving to heed the call of Pope Francis to care for our common home" (from the website). Each week there is a new theme along with church teaching on that particular theme as well as action steps to carry out the theme.

#### SNOWSHOE BACKPACKING TRIP IN THE WHITE

#### **FUN SCOUTING FACTS:**

The First Boy Scout was a British Baron - Robert Baden-Powell. Robert Baden-Powell was a colonel in the British Army during the second Boer War in 1899. When he and his troops found themselves surrounded - and vastly outnumbered - by the Dutch colonists, Baden-Powell enlisted a local Cadet Corps, 12 to 15 year olds who wore khaki uniforms and wide-brimmed hats (sound familiar?) to help out. The boys relayed messages and acted as guards and literal scouts, leaving Baden-Powell's adult troops free to fight.



In 1908, Baden-Powell published 'Scouting for Boys,' which focused on skills of the outdoors. Boy Scout Troops soon began popping up across the U.K. The United States' version, the Boy Scouts of America (BSA), was formally established on February 8, 1910.
