Managing God's Gifts To Us

THIS MAY, ST. MARY'S PARISH IS CONDUCTING AN "INCREASED WEEKLY GIVING CAMPAIGN."

WHY?

- It has been nine years since our parish last asked everyone to make an increase in their weekly giving. In 2010 the weekly offertory goal of \$11,900 was achieved, which with careful economizing and budgeting has gotten us through until now.
- Over the past nine years, parish expenses have risen considerably. Even combined with the Grand Annual, the current offertory is no longer adequate to cover them all. Utilities are among the most challenging expenses our parish has, between \$2,000-8,000 per month. For the year, utility expenses total over \$55,0000 plus nearly \$68,000 more for maintenance of the buildings and grounds, provided that nothing major breaks.
- Our Business Manager and Finance Council calculate that a \$15,000 weekly offertory is now needed to stabilize St. Mary's Finances. \$15,000 is where our weekly offertory would now be if the weekly offertory average had increased a modest \$344 a year for each of the past nine years.
- St. Mary's weekly offertory has <u>dropped</u> \$20,000 in the current fiscal year, as compared to the same period last year. Largely due to important replacement hires, parish expenses are also up \$20,000 for that same period this year. We are therefore facing a \$40,000 shortfall.
- This summer, the church flooring is scheduled to be replaced and the pew kneelers repaired. This major project will be paid for by the 2019 Grand Annual next fall, but there are upfront costs and deposits that, because of the offertory fall off this year, our current cash flow will not be able to handle. Increasing St. Mary's weekly offertory can no longer be delayed.

HOLY THURSDAY, April 18

Fr. Mark washes the feet of twelve parishioners, in commemoration of Jesus' washing of His Apostles' feet at the Last Supper. This act of humility by Our Saviour reminds us all to serve one another, especially the poor, the suffering, the forgotten in our midst. Somehow a thirteenth parishioner appeared for the foot washing, prompting Father to comment that sometimes God calls us to serve more than we had expected, but never beyond what we can do with His Divine Assistance.

GOOD FRIDAY, April 19

At the Noon Stations, the children of St. Mary's acted out the Passion and Death of Our Lord. Shown right, Jesus is crucified, freely surrendering His life to save us from our sins. At the Evening Passion Service, parishioners venerated the Cross of Jesus with a kiss – symbolically undoing Judas' "kiss of betrayal" in the garden.

HOLY SATURDAY, April 20

One of the great joys of the Easter Vigil is the reception of new members into the Church. Shown left, Alexander Barberio made his Profession of Faith, then received the Sacraments of First Holy Communion and Confirmation. He chose John as his Confirmation name, in honor of St. John the Beloved Disciple. Standing to his right is parishioner Sophia Lindsay, who made her First Holy Communion on this sacred night. Other highlights of the Vigil included the lighting of the Easter Candle and the Sprinkling Rite, before which Fr. Mark invited all to call to mind those things they desired God to wash away – the mistakes, hurts, sorrows, regrets, griefs and anything else that has been keeping us from following Christ in peace and joy!

The Silver Jubilee Mass will be concelebrated by a number of Fr. Mark's brother priests, including several formerly assigned to



A Brief History of Vespers

The tradition of evening ritual predates the time of Christ, to the customs of ancient Judaism. In Exodus 30:8, it is written, "When Aaron sets up the lamps in the evening, he shall offer it, a regular incense offering before the Lord." However, the first mention of specifically Christian evening prayer is in the 2nd century AD by Pliny the Younger, who speaks of "coetus antelucani et vespertini," or gatherings of Christians in the morning and the evening. This evidence is corroborated by Tertullian's writings from the 3rd century AD. Tertullian, considered the Founder of Western theology, states, "we pray at least not less than thrice in the day, debtors as we are to Three – Father, Son and Holy Spirit: of course in addition to our regular prayers which are due, without any admonition, on the entrance of light and of night." This mandate was reinforced by a 4th century AD instruction for clergy known as the Apostolic Constitutions.

During the early centuries of the church, this communal evening prayer was referred to as "Lucernarium", which literally means "lamp lighting time." It took place at sunset, a time of day known as a "hinge hour"; the other hinge hour being dawn. As the day slowly turned to night, the lamps remained burning, gradually becoming more necessary as a source of light. Although this began as a practical matter, the light of the lamps eventually came to symbolize the light of Christ, present even in the darkness of evil.

It was not until the 6th century, however that this tradition of night prayer was codified into what we now know as Vespers by St. Benedict of Nursia, the founder of the Order of St. Benedict and Western monasticism as a whole. By this time, it was customary for those living the monastic life to pray eight times per day, forming what is known as the Divine Office. Monks would rise at 2 AM to pray Matins or Vigils. They would then go back to sleep before rising at dawn to pray Lauds, followed by Prime at 6 AM, Terce at 9 AM, Sext at noon, None at 3 PM (or ninth hour), Vespers at 6 PM and Compline at 7 PM. Out of all these offices, the most ancient are Vigils and Vespers.

Prior to the 13th century, the Divine Office was only celebrated communally or *in solidum*, either in monastic communities or at cathedrals. However, with the advent of friars, or religious priests who traveled to evangelize, it became increasingly difficult to continue the mandatory celebration of group prayer. Furthermore, with the development of the university, new clerical students were unable to pray communally and fulfill the obligation of their studies. For both of these reasons, it was permitted for the Divine Office to be prayed privately, although the communal setting was still preferred.

Contrary to popular belief, the first Breviary, or book containing all the liturgical texts for the Divine Office, was not compiled for private use or portable use. Rather, the purpose of the first Breviaries was simply to compile the numerous books used to recite the office, including: the antiphonary, homiliary, psalter, responsorial and legendary. The first Breviary to be mass-produced and used privately was printed in the early 16th century. Vespers remained relatively unchanged until the 20th century.

In 1911, Pope Pius X changed the structure and format in which the psalms were chanted. Over time, as the number of saints and their corresponding feast days multiplied, the practice of using commemorative psalms for individual saints meant that the original psalms for those days were almost never chanted. This was rectified by the creation of a separate psalter, or psalm book, which loosened the connection between individual psalms and specific days. In order to fulfill the original intention of reciting all 150 psalms each week, new rubrics called for flexibility in dividing the psalms so that an equal number of verses were recited each day, thereby accommodating feast day psalms. After Vatican II, the office of Prime (6 AM) was eliminated. In addition, the period of time over which the psalms were to be said was expanded from one week to four weeks.



Vespers has been used at times to symbolize unity among Christians. In 2016, Cardinal Vincent Nichols led a Roman Catholic Vespers service in the Chapel Royal at Hampton Court Palace, the chapel of King Henry VIII. This was the first Catholic service to be held in the chapel in 450 years and was done as a symbol of the easing of tensions between the Church of England and the Roman Catholic Church.

The tradition of Vespers truly has a profound and rich history spanning the ages. Please consider attending the last sung Vespers service of this academic year. It will be sung by the St. Mary's Youth Choir and will take place **this Wednesday, May 8 at 7:00 PM.**

MAY 30, Ascension Thursday, A Holy Day of Obligation ~

Vigil Mass, Wednesday, May 29, at 6:30 PM Feast Day Masses, Thurs., May 30, at 9:00 AM & 7:00 PM

The Feast of the Ascension of Jesus Christ is celebrated each year on the fortieth day after the Feast of Pascha (Easter). Since the date of Pascha changes each year, the date of the Feast of the Ascension also changes. The Feast is always celebrated on a Thursday, and marks an event of such importance that it is a Holy Day of Obligation. This means that Catholics attend Mass this day as on a Sunday. The Feast itself commemorates when, on the fortieth day after His Resurrection, Jesus led His disciples to the Mount of Olives, and after blessing them and asking them to wait for the fulfillment of the promise of the Holy Spirit, He ascended into heaven. Where He has gone, we hope one day to follow.



2019 Easter 'Urbi et Orbi' Message of Pope Francis

Dear Brothers and Sisters, Happy Easter!

Today the Church renews the proclamation made by the first disciples: "Jesus is risen!" And from mouth to mouth, from heart to heart, there resounds a call to praise: "Alleluia, Alleluia!" On this morning of Easter, the perennial youth of the Church and of humanity as a whole, I would like to address each of you in the opening words of my recent Apostolic Exhortation devoted especially to young people:

"Christ is alive! He is our hope, and in a wonderful way he brings youth to our world. Everything he touches becomes young, new, full of life. The very first words, then, that I would like to say to every young Christian are these: Christ is alive and he wants you to be alive! He is in you, he is with you and he never abandons you. However far you may wander, he is always there, the Risen One. He calls you and he waits for you to return to him and start over again. When you feel you are growing old out of sorrow, resentment or fear, doubt or failure, he will always be there to restore your strength and your hope" (Christus Vivit, 1-2).

Dear brothers and sisters, this message is also addressed to every person in the world. The resurrection of Christ is the principle of new life for every man and every woman, for true renewal always begins from the heart, from the conscience. Yet Easter is also the beginning of the new world, set free from the slavery of sin and death: the world open at last to the Kingdom of God, a Kingdom of love, peace and fraternity.

Christ is alive and he remains with us. Risen, he shows us the light of his face, and he does not abandon all those experiencing hardship, pain and sorrow. May he, the Living One, be hope for the beloved Syrian people, victims of an ongoing conflict to which we risk becoming ever more resigned and even indifferent. Now is instead the time for a renewed commitment for a political solution able to respond to people's legitimate hopes for freedom, peace and justice, confront the humanitarian crisis and favour the secure re-entry of the homeless, along with all those who have taken refuge in neighbouring countries, especially Lebanon and Jordan.

Easter makes us keep our eyes fixed on the Middle East, torn by continuing divisions and tensions. May the Christians of the region patiently persevere in their witness to the Risen Lord and to the victory of life over death. I think in particular of the people of Yemen, especially the children, exhausted by hunger and war. May the light of Easter illumine all government leaders and peoples in the Middle East, beginning with Israelis and Palestinians, and spur them to alleviate such great suffering and to pursue a future of peace and stability.

May conflict and bloodshed cease in Libya, where defenseless people are once more dying in recent weeks and many families have been forced to abandon their homes. I urge the parties involved to choose dialogue over force and to avoid reopening wounds left by a decade of conflicts and political instability.

May the Living Christ grant his peace to the entire beloved African continent, still rife with social tensions, conflicts and at times violent forms of extremism that leave in their wake insecurity, destruction and death, especially in Burkina Faso, Mali, Niger, Nigeria and Cameroon. I think too of Sudan, presently experiencing a moment of political uncertainty; it is my hope that all voices will be heard, and that everyone will work to enable the country to find the freedom, development and well-being to which it has long aspired.

May the Risen Lord accompany the efforts of the civil and religious authorities of South Sudan, sustained by the fruits of the spiritual retreat held several days ago here in the Vatican. May a new page open in the history of that country, in which all political, social and religious components actively commit themselves to the pursuit of the common good and the reconciliation of the nation.

May this Easter bring comfort to the people of the eastern regions of Ukraine, who suffer from the continuing conflict. May the Lord encourage initiatives of humanitarian aid and those aimed at pursuing a lasting peace.

May the joy of the resurrection fill the hearts of those who on the American continent are experiencing the effects of difficult political and economic situations. I think in particular of the Venezuelan people, of all those who lack the minimal conditions for leading a dignified and secure life due to a crisis that endures and worsens. May the Lord grant that all those with political responsibilities may work to end social injustices, abuses and acts of violence, and take the concrete steps needed to heal divisions and offer the population the help they need.

May the Risen Lord shed his light on the efforts made in Nicaragua to find as rapidly as possible a peaceful negotiated solution for the benefit of the entire Nicaraguan people.

Before the many sufferings of our time, may the Lord of life not find us cold and indifferent. May he make us builders of bridges, not walls. May the One who gives us his peace end the roar of arms, both in areas of conflict and in our cities, and inspire the leaders of nations to work for an end to the arms race and the troubling spread of weaponry, especially in the economically more advanced countries. May the Risen Christ, who flung open the doors of the tomb, open our hearts to the needs of the disadvantaged, the vulnerable, the poor, the unemployed, the marginalized, and all those who knock at our door in search of bread, refuge, and the recognition of their dignity.

Dear brothers and sisters, Christ is alive! He is hope and youth for each of us and for the entire world. May we let ourselves be renewed by him! Happy Easter!



From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Members of St. Mary's,

"Even when I am old and gray, do not forsake me." Ps. 71:18

As we enter Mary's Month of May, I am struck by Our Lady's journey following her visit by the Archangel Gabriel. Rather than being overwhelmed or immobilized by the news that she would bear God's Son, Mary immediately set out to visit her cousin Elizabeth, whom Gabriel had told her was also pregnant "in her old age." The journey from Nazareth to Ain Karim was nearly 100 miles long. But concerned for the health and wellbeing of her elderly cousin, Mary undertook it without hesitation. Her first act after accepting God's Son into her womb, was an act of love and compassion for an older person – a sign of why God chose Mary in the first place. The journey culminated of course, with the Visitation, a meeting between the pregnant mothers of John the Baptist and Jesus, a meeting that was Spirit filled and revealed the great destiny that lay before these unborn babes.

God blesses those who are a blessing to the elderly, sometimes even in this life. I remember one occasion at Market Basket when I saw a short, elderly woman unable to reach her oatmeal box on the top shelf. I helped her get it down, and as I did so was struck by the packaging of an oatmeal brand I had never noticed before. I gave it a try, liked it much better, and thereafter switched from Quaker Oats to McCann's Irish Oats! A tiny blessing and discovery, but one that started with noticing the need of an elderly person.

A bigger example occurred when my parents attended a church supper a few years back. They noticed an older couple, the husband in a wheelchair, sitting all alone. So instead of joining friends, my mom and dad introduced themselves and joined the lonely looking couple. During the supper, they learned that this elderly couple lived only one street away from them, with wooded land in between. They then discovered that because of medical bills, this couple was going to sell their back wooded lot for development, which would have placed a house in view of my parents' back yard, compromising their privacy. In the end, my parents ended up buying the land from that couple! If they had not chosen to sit with this older couple they didn't even know, they might never have gotten the chance.

God has a special love for the elderly, a love that Our Blessed Mother shared and demonstrated by her visit to Elizabeth. Consider honoring Mary this May by visiting an elderly person, or otherwise going out of your way to assist a senior in need. Blessings will flow and follow!

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

Say NO to Expanded Abortion Access

The Massachusetts State Legislature will consider passing into law two deeply troubling bills this legislative session. They are identical in text but differ slightly in their titles. The first, (House Bill 3320) is "An Act removing obstacles and expanding access to women's reproductive health". The second, (Senate Bill 1209) is "An Act to remove obstacles and expand abortion access". Current law would be dramatically changed by:

- 1) Expanding abortion access, including late-term abortions, during the nine months of pregnancy for virtually any reason.
- 2) Eliminating requirements that late-term abortions be performed in a hospital.
- 3) Eliminating the requirement that provides medical care to a child who survives an abortion attempt.
- 4) Eliminating the requirement that a minor under the age of 18 have the consent of a parent, guardian, or the courts.
- 5) Expanding state funding for women who cannot afford the procedure.

How can your voice be heard?

Contact your legislators, let them know you are a Massachusetts voter, and say NO on Abortion Expansion! Log on to www.macatholic.org and follow the links to find contact information for:

- Your individual State Senator and Representative via zip code link.
- Members of the Joint Committee on Judiciary who will consider House Bill 3320.
- Members of the Joint Committee on Public Health who will consider Senate Bill 1209.

MAY IS THE MONTH OF MARY: May is the month dedicated to Mary, Jesus' Mother and the Mother of our Church; she is also the patron of our parish. The practice of dedicating this month to special devotion to Mary goes back many centuries. At CatholicCulture.org you'll find more information about this practice. Once on the site, search May, the month of Mary. Jennifer Gregory Miller offers a number of ways to celebrate Mary and the month of May. The following are just a few ideas:

- * Celebration of the Word of God, imitating Mary when she pondered all these things in her heart.
- * Praying the Angelus, (or Regina Coeli during the Easter season)
- * Praying the Rosary
- * Praying Litanies of the Blessed Virgin Mary

A Mary Garden or planting certain plants honoring our Lady are age-old ways to honor Mary, particularly through the month that bring flowers. ("March winds and April showers bring forth May flowers.")

JUST WONDERING: Have you ever wondered about the origins of the Hail Mary prayer? Here is a bit of information to help with your understanding of the basis of the first half of this text. The line "Hail [Mary] favored one, full of grace... with you" is the greeting given to Mary by the angel Gabriel (Luke 1:28). "Blessed are you among women...fruit of your womb" are the first words spoken by Elizabeth to Mary when Mary comes to visit her (Luke 1:42). Many years ago Yvonne Racine and Colleen Toronto, leaders of our parish bible study program, *Quick Journey*, learned that these words echo what is spoke to Jael (Judges 5:24) and Judith (Judith 13:18), women of the Old Testament, who, in the strength of their faith, destroyed enemies of their people. This further recalls the text in Genesis 3:15 where God tells the serpent that the offspring of the woman (Eve) will crush its head, prefiguring the future destruction of Satan by Mary's son Jesus.
