
Come join your fellow parishioners for fine Italian fare, live music and great company at this year's Pasta Dinner on Saturday, November 16 from 6 to 8 PM.





Dear Fellow Parishioners,

For the past 64 years, St. Mary's, Holliston has relied on the Grand Annual - a once a year special collection that goes entirely toward parish operating costs. In combination with the weekly offertory, the Grand Annual allows St. Mary's to pay her staff and maintain her four buildings, three of which are over 100 years old.

As you know, the Grand Annual always takes place in November. The 2024 St. Mary's Grand Annual Collection is Veteran's Day Weekend - November 9 & 10. The goal is \$150,000 – the same as the 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023 Grand Annuals, which despite the pandemic were all achieved.

The single largest facilities item covered by this year's Grand Annual is the replacement of the large church skylight above the sanctuary. Installed in 1993, the seals have now worn out and the structure has degraded. This has allowed water and dirt to penetrate past the outer protective Plexiglass layer and onto the actual glass. If not replaced, it is only a matter of time before water starts to get into the church sanctuary.

As our parish grows, the Fr. Haley Hall kitchen is being used much more. The two very small sinks are inadequate for the size of our functions, and various kitchen surfaces need to be refinished. The refrigerator also needs to be replaced. This summer we had to install a new church bell system, since the one installed in 1978 finally wore out. Multiple front exterior areas of the church (Town Hall side), have rotten wood and peeling paint, while the interior of the rectory is also in need of repairs. A complete Grand Annual breakdown follows:

\$30,000	Church Skylight Replacement
\$28,000	Main Parish Center Kitchen Repairs and Renovation
\$14,950	Replacement of rusted-through Fr. Haley Hall parking lot double metal doors and frame
\$10,825	Church exterior rotted wood repairs and painting, multiple areas
\$16,084	New Church Bells installed over summer
\$20,000	Rectory Repairs including damaged flooring, stair carpets, plumbing leaks, ceiling stains,
	torn wallpaper, peeling paint, and shower and lighting repairs in third floor bathroom.

The remaining Grand Annual amount is applied to staff salaries (\$30,141).

Since successfully paying off the last of her \$1.2 million loan debts in the fall of 2010, St. Mary's has been able to pay her bills and remains debt free. Your generous support of St. Mary's 2024 Grand Annual will assure that the hard-won financial health of our parish continues. We realize that these current economic times are difficult for many. But if we <u>all</u> do what we can according to our means, then the 2024 Grand Annual will be a success. Thank you in advance for your generosity. And thank you for the many ways you personally help to build up our beautiful parish family.







PRAYER SHAWLS AND SECOND CHANCES

Sometimes, God places a special order for a handknit. In late January, 2017, I awoke with the image of a round, red blanket with a flower in the center and a feather-and-fan lace pattern...and I knew exactly who to knit it for. That'll wake you up in a hurry.

Decades ago, I had a compulsion to write fan mail to my favorite author. I tracked down her email address and even opened a document to write it, but I didn't. Why would she want to hear from me? The next week, she died. I've regretted it ever since. Therefore, when I get that nudge, I follow it. When God placed that special order for a blanket, I thought, "Do it now, do it now, do it now." I hit the yarn store before noon, printed the pattern before dinner, and by evening, I'd completed the first chart. Do it now.

Handknits (and hand-crochets) are warm, but handknits are also comfort. They're time. They're a squishy reminder that someone wants you surrounded by softness and beauty. We think of handmade baby blankets, and how the infant is soft and protected. Adults need care and love and softness, too, so our parish makes prayer shawls and lap blankets. People need beauty. We need the support of our parish when life gut-punches us. The knitter or the crocheter casts off the work, then brings it to the parish, and the parish sends it out to someone in need.



Ideally, the knitter or the crocheter has stepped out of the transaction at that point, and the love you're feeling is from God. Because God loves you, but the hands He uses to make blankets are ours. In January 2017, I knit like the wind. I bound it off, mailed it...and the recipient died that spring. Do it now. The Saint Mary's prayer shawl ministry needs more crafters. If you can make something, or if you've felt the urge to learn, please consider joining us. Do it now, do it now, do it now.

Stepping Up in Faith

How steps 6-9 of the 12-Step Program, and the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius of Loyola can help us on our journey toward holiness.

Over the previous few Newsletters, we have illustrated how the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius of Loyola and the Twelve Step Program of Addiction Recovery are closely related. It is important for us to understand that we do not have to be "in recovery" in order to practice these steps for a more fruitful and virtuous journey of faith. As spiritual companions in iTHIRST, Diane and I accompany those who are suffering from unhealthy attachments. They can include everything from social media to relationships to substance use disorder, and their afflictions can impact whole communities. We are all, to some degree, impacted by unhealthy attachments; whether they be to social media, gossip, various types of food or something more significant, we can all benefit from practicing these steps for a healthier life in Christ. So far we have covered steps one through five. Now let us look at the next four steps.

Steps Six and Seven: Conversion from Guilt

Saint Ignatius describes this step as moving from compliance to the Commandments toward loving relationship with God. This begins with an understanding of being completely forgiven, which is achievable through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It coincides directly with AA Steps Six and Seven: being entirely ready to have God remove all our defects of character and humbly asking Him to remove our shortcomings. According to Fr. Edward Dowling, the spiritual director of Bill Wilson (founder of Alcoholics Anonymous), "there are two liabilities when we commit a sin: the guilt of the sin... (and) the obligation of restitution." The sixth and seventh steps address the guilt of our sin, helping us move beyond self-loathing to self-loving and self-emptying. Thus, we begin to follow the example of Jesus, "Who emptied Himself by taking the form of a servant." [Philippians 2:7]

Steps Eight and Nine: Restitution

The second part of Fr. Dowling's equation of liability is the obligation of restitution. The eighth and ninth steps of the 12 Step Program address these liabilities. Steps eight and nine require us first to make a list of all persons we may have harmed, to have a willingness to make amends to them all, and finally to make direct amends to the people whom we have identified wherever possible. The only exception we're given is where offering restitution might injure them or others. These steps parallel the Unity phase of the Spiritual Exercises, which include our recognizing a deeper sorrow for sin and the compassion for God's suffering people, and then making a total response in love to God's love. These are important steps in our spiritual journey as Christians seeking holy lives. In order to obtain the graces of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, each of us needs to not only repent and disclose our sins to the priest, but to have a sincere intention to make reparation, and to actively carry it out [CCC #1491]. The Catechism describes reparation as "making amends for a wrong done or for an offense, which is an offense against God." The recognition of

our shortcomings and the willingness to address them with the help of God releases us from the burden of guilt and the hopelessness of despondency. It helps us to move forward in hope with the confidence of Zacchaeus, who hurried down from his cross to receive Jesus under his roof [Luke 19:1-9].
