STEERING HER ON HER COURSE

In the dining room of St. Mary's Rectory there is a painting of a ship in a storm at sea. (Photo left / next page). It depicts a sailing ship surrounded by mountainous waves, fighting its way out of dark storm clouds and into a ray of light. Whenever I look at this painting, I am reminded of something St. Boniface once said. "In her voyage through this world, the Church is like a great ship being tossed and battered by the waves of life's different stresses. Our duty is not to abandon ship, but to steer her on her course."

Certainly in recent times the Church has gone through terrible storms, shaken and damaged by the crimes committed by some, and the mishandling of those crimes by others. Despite massive efforts to assure safety and restore trust, at times new revelations of past sin have made it feel like we just cannot escape the storm. And yet, the Church belongs to Christ. It is His chosen vessel to bring souls safely to the distant shore of heaven. As members of the Church, our duty remains to steer her into the light. To commit ourselves with more fervor than ever to Christ's Gospel, the beautiful news of a nobler and holier life that we are called to live as Catholic Christians.

One thing to be alert to in tumultuous times, is the temptation to replace the Sunday Mass with volunteerism. Service - both in and out of the Church - is an essential part of Catholic living. But sometimes when things are rough in the Church, people abandon the Mass in favor of good works, thinking that volunteering in some way is itself a form of worship and will be enough. It is not. The Eucharist is our spiritual food for the journey and the Scriptures are our map for navigating life's treacherous seas. If we cut ourselves off from these, we begin to separate from Christ. Our volunteering proves inadequate to keep us spiritually healthy, and soon we abandon ship altogether. Even in priesthood it is a danger. If I start to focus on my work to the extent that it is not balanced in good daily prayer and un-distracted Sunday worship - that is when the journey starts to feel too much.

Let us with Jesus' help remain faithful in difficult times. Doing so is perhaps the great test of our faith. And let us reach out with love, welcome and a reconciling spirit to our fellow Catholics who have fallen, jumped, or even been pushed overboard. That too is part of how we steer God's Church into the light. God bless you. — **Fr. Mark**

Friday, November 1, Feast of All Saints: Today the Church celebrates the Feast of All Saints – honoring and asking the prayerful intercession of all the Holy Men, Women, and Children who have gone ahead of us in faith and now live in the light of God's presence. Some of the saints have been "declared" by the Church and their names are known to us. Most, however, are known only to God, and this day we both commemorate their holy lives and remember our own calling to become saints – holy witnesses of Christ's love to the world. A Holy Day of Obligation, All Saints will be celebrated at three Friday Masses:

9 AM, 5:30 PM & 7 PM.

Tuesday, November 5, All Souls Mass: Catholics believe

that our prayers assist souls that died in a state of grace through purgatory – a journey of purification that allows a soul to enter God's eternal presence in a state of perfect innocence, able to receive fully the light and glory of God. At St. Mary's, a special candlelight All Souls Mass will be celebrated on <u>Tuesday</u>, Nov. 5 at 7 PM. Those buried from the parish over the past year will have their names read and a



candle lit in their memory. The candlelight Mass is open to everyone who would like to pray for their own departed loved ones. The full Adult Choir will be ministering.



Saturday, November 9, Parish Pasta Night:

Come join your fellow parishioners for fine Italian fare, live music and great company at this year's Pasta Dinner on <u>Saturday, November 9 from</u> <u>6 to 8 PM</u>. The menu will include rigatoni with red sauce, rigatoni with broccoli and chicken, rigatoni with butter, meatballs, salad, rolls and soda, water, juice and Italian pastries. ST. MARY'S ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH

In 1870, the Parish of St. Mary's, Holliston was officially established. At that time it was comprised of the towns of Holliston, Medway and Bellingham. Mass was celebrated in the Holliston Town Hall until enough of St. Mary's Church basement was constructed for worship to be held there. The first Mass in our own church building was celebrated in the rough, unfinished basement on Christmas Day, 1873. How far we have come from those humble beginnings! How many are the graces that have flowed through St. Mary's for the past 150 years! There will be many special events to mark this Anniversary, including a new History

of St. Mary's Book, an original St. Mary's Hymn, Children's Activities, and a new partnership with a Parish in the Holy Land to support the Christians there.

From February 9-11, 2020, Mr. Jon Leonetti will lead St. Mary's in a 3-night Parish Anniversary Mission entitled, "Surge of the Heart." Dear Fellow Parishioners,

In just a few months, St. Mary's Parish will celebrate her 150th Anniversary! Those 150 years represent untold moments of ministry and grace that have blessed generations of Catholics in Holliston and the surrounding communities. We give thanks to God for this beautiful family of faith and ask Him to watch over and guide us into the future

For the past 59 years, one of the things that has helped keep St. Mary's strong is the Grand Annual – a once a year special collection that goes entirely toward parish operating costs. In combination with the weekly offertory, the Grand Annual allows St. Mary's to pay her bills and maintain her four buildings, three of which are well over 100 years old.

As you know, the Grand Annual always takes place in November. The 2019 St. Mary's Grand Annual Collection is **Veteran's Day Weekend - November 9 & 10**. The goal is \$150,000 – the same as 2018 which was achieved.

The bulk of this year's Grand Annual, \$102,628.73, is needed to cover the major church repairs conducted over this past summer. The cracked and buckling tile floor was replaced, as was the splitting and damaged carpeting. The constantly breaking hardware on the kneelers was replaced, as were the torn and worn kneeler pads. Since the pews had to be taken up for the flooring repairs, we took the opportunity to reconfigure them for greater handicapped accessibility. This has been a true blessing for our elderly and wheelchair-bound parishioners.

Normally, about \$85,000 of the \$150,000 Grand Annual is designated toward Staff Salaries and regular parish bills. However, because of the scope and expense of the summer church repairs, that will not be possible this year. It is therefore critical that, going forward, the parish offertory need of \$15,000 a week be consistently achieved. For this reason, please consider switching to Automatic Giving through your bank, or the new "WeShare" Online Giving option. WeShare information is provided here: https://stmarysholliston.weshareonline.org.

Since successfully paying off the last of her \$1.2 million loan debts in the fall of 2010, St. Mary's has been able to pay her bills and remains debt free. Your generous support of St. Mary's 2019 Grand Annual will assure that the hard-won financial health of our parish continues. We realize that these current economic times remain difficult for many. But if we <u>all</u> do what we can according to our means, then the 2019 Grand Annual will be a success. Thank you in advance for your generosity. And thank you for the many ways you help to build up our beautiful parish family.

2019 Grand Annual Breakdown:

\$88,951.78	Replacement of tile flooring and carpeting for church, including materials and installation. Also, installation costs for the new kneeler pads and hardware.
\$9,832.59	Replacement hardware, bumpers and pads for the church kneelers, 600 seats.
\$3,844.36	Church sound system upgrades and repairs. St. Mary's old wireless system becomes illegal in 2020 as the FAA has purchased those channels.
\$47,371.27	Staff Salaries: The eight men and women of St. Mary's Staff are hardworking, dedicated individuals. This portion of the Grand Annual will go toward their salaries.


There is only one collection taken up the weekend of November 9 & 10, so please place your orange Grand Annual envelope in the same basket as your weekly parish support.

- **D Improved Handicapped Accommodation:** St. Mary's Church now has special areas cut out of the pews to accommodate wheelchairs. Four are located in the front of the nave, with two more in the back of the nave.

The First Thanksgiving in America was a Catholic Mass. And it happened 50 years before Plymouth!



Did you know that the first "thanksgiving" meal in the United States was not celebrated by the Pilgrims in Plymouth, but by Spanish settlers, in what became Florida? And that first "Thanksgiving" was Eucharistic!

Historian Dr. Michael Gannon narrates the events that took place on September 8, 1565.

"When the first Spanish settlers landed in what is now St. Augustine on September 8, 1565, to build a settlement, their first act was to hold a religious service to thank God for the safe arrival of the Spanish fleet... After the Mass, Father Francisco Lopez, the Chaplain of the Spanish ships and the first pastor of St. Augustine, stipulated that the

natives from the Timucua tribe be fed along with the Spanish settlers, including Don Pedro Menendez de Aviles, the leader of the expedition. It was the very first Thanksgiving and the first Thanksgiving meal in the United States."

The Spaniards, with food that they brought with them on the ship, prepared the communal meal. According to records, the meal would have consisted of salted pork, garbanzo beans, ship's bread and red wine.

This account of the first "thanksgiving" reflects what was found in Father Francisco's memoirs. In it we read, "the feast day [was] observed . . . after Mass, 'the Adelantado [Menendez] had the Indians fed and dined himself.""

The feast celebrated by the Spaniards was that of the Blessed Virgin Mary's birthday, a day in the Church calendar that follows nine months after the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary on December 8 (which just happens to be the patronal feast of the United States of America).

The meal "may have also included Caribbean foods that were probably collected when Menéndez stopped to regroup and resupply at San Juan Puerto Rico before continuing to Florida... If the Timucua contributed, it would likely have been with corn, fresh fish, berries, or beans."

Additionally, before the Mass was celebrated, "Father Francisco López, the fleet chaplain...came ashore ahead of Pedro Menéndez de Avilés, the leader of the founding expedition, and then went forward to meet Menéndez holding a cross... Menéndez came on land, knelt and kissed the cross."

This historical event reminds us that the Eucharist (from the Greek that literally means "thanksgiving") is the primary way to offer thanks on Thanksgiving Day, followed by a meal shared in a spirit of fraternity. Let God be a central part of your holiday! As Americans this is our heritage, one that we hope to pass on to the next generation.

The 3rd Commandment is to keep Holy the Lord's Day. Sunday is intended by God to be a day of rest, family, and worship. More and more, however, even the best intentioned parents are finding this difficult. The reason is the growing intrusion of sports games and practices into Sundays. There is a very present danger of something good (sports), becoming an idol, receiving more fidelity, time and commitment on Sundays than does God Himself. Faithful families become sporadic in their participation in Holy Mass, as the demands of sports teams steal away their time and energy. It is time and past time to start reconsidering our Sunday surrender to sports. Whom shall we serve?

HDAAC TO OFFER NIGHT OF HOPE & HEALING THROUGH ART AND PRAYER

The Holliston Drug and Alcohol Awareness Coalition (HDAAC) is hosting a Hope & Healing night at the Holliston Public Library on December 4 from 6 to 8 PM, in the Lower Level meeting room. The night will feature an interactive art exhibit sponsored by The Opioid Project, and will begin with a short interfaith prayer service with ministers from area faith groups including Deacon John from St. Mary's. The opioid epidemic in Massachusetts has claimed an estimated 2,033 deaths in 2018 and an estimated 497 between January and March of this year. Studies have shown that youth use of substances like alcohol, marijuana and prescription pain medication is associated with an increased risk of addiction to heroin and other opioids.

The Hope & Healing event hopes to facilitate dialogue and promote awareness about the disease of addiction, and to increase public understanding about all those affected by it. This event is also intended to increase public understanding about stigma and support advocacy efforts around addiction and access to mental health services.

The opioid project features artwork that captures the personal narrative of an artist's experience in the midst of the disease and will have an audio component that can be listened to with headphones provided at the event. The project communicates the complex social narrative of addiction and co-occurring mental health challenges, with the goal of promoting positive social change and ultimately preventing substance abuse and opioid-related deaths. This display is open to all members of the public and is especially moving for all those that are touched by or treat those with addiction, including active users, those in recovery, first responders, and those grieving the death of a loved one to overdose.

Sports and Church ~ A Mom's Perspective

Last Sunday morning I found myself sitting on a soccer field with one of my children for a tournament game. It was a beautiful morning. The sun was shining. I was enjoying some fabulous coffee.

I was also experiencing great frustration and conflict as I reflected on how I got into this situation. My husband and I know the value of church family. We know that consistency is very important for our children to build relationships with their church family and to grow as disciples of Christ. We have made many decisions over the years to say "no" to other things in order to say "yes" to church. And, yet, here I was on a



soccer field on a Sunday morning! A couple weeks earlier the coach gathered the parents around and presented this opportunity for the soccer tournament that would land on a Saturday and Sunday. The way it was put to us, I felt like I had no choice but to participate. The team wouldn't be able to play in the tournament unless everyone chose to play. If we said no, we would be letting down 12 other kids.

So, here I was sitting on the sidelines of a soccer game contemplating the predicament of so many families. Many families I've talked to about this feel like they have no choice for a variety of reasons. Maybe it's a sport that our kids love, maybe there are opportunities that would be missed if we pulled our kids, maybe we feel an obligation to a team, maybe there's real potential in our little athletes that may never be recognized. There are many reasons that we come to the decisions that keep our families away from church. I completely understand how we get there – but I also know the long term effect that missing church will take on our families. And that's the predicament that has been tormenting me.

Now, I'm not saying that one missed Sunday is going to derail your children's spiritual growth. But I have noticed that our society is set up to undermine this discipline of regular fellowship with our church family. So unless we are very vigilant to protect our church commitment, we can quickly find that one Sunday missed has become many Sundays missed, and before long church has ceased to be a habit and is reduced to something we do when we don't have anything else to do on Sunday mornings.

When we say "yes" to one thing, we are saying "no" to something else. I have seen it too easily happen that without meaning to reject church, families are saying "yes" to extracurricular activities – but this "yes" is also a "no" to consistency at church activities and developing relationships with our church family. I have spoken to so many parents who spend years on the field, at the pool, on the ski slopes, in the gym, or in the studio and when they get to the other side of these years have deep regrets. Their children don't want to go to church, they don't have relationships with peers or leaders who know and love Jesus, and they have not developed the discipline of making church a priority. These parents who now have grown children have expressed that they would do it differently if they could go back and do it again. I have had several parents with grown children express that it was not worth it. They did not carefully guard their priorities and allowed other commitments to push out what was most important. They can look back and see that the time spent on other activities directly affected their children's relationship with church and this directly affected their relationship with God.

Church attendance is not the goal...however, church is the way that God has provided for people to grow in their knowledge and love of who God is and build relationships with other disciples and from this time of focusing on Jesus and connecting with others who love Jesus we can go out into the world and spread the good news of Jesus Christ and his love with others.

I'm back to my predicament....I know that church is important....I also feel like I don't have a choice sometimes. Can we learn from the parents that have gone before us? Can we step back a bit and think about the adults that we are raising? What if our children get to their early 20's and have no relationship with God or other disciples of Jesus? Will we look back and say, "Well, at least they made it to the championships!"? Or will we look back with regrets and disappointment that our priorities were not reflected on our calendar?

... Could there be a better way? What if we ALL joined together and said, "NO! No more sports on Sundays!"? When we were kids, there was never anything scheduled on Sundays. We never had to choose between sports and church. Sundays were saved for church and family and gathering with friends. Can we reclaim our Sundays if we all worked together?

I propose that we give it a try! I also will say that even if our society won't cooperate, for me and my family I will do what I can to maintain consistency for my children to be at church and build relationships with other kids and youth who know and love Jesus! I will not tell you what is best for your family...I will encourage you to take some time out to prayerfully consider this, talk it over with your spouse, and make sure your priorities determine your calendar and not the other way around.
