WELCOME DEACON RON!

On Saturday, October 3, St. Mary's Parishioner Ron Dowding was ordained to the Permanent Diaconate. The ordination was celebrated by

Cardinal Sean O'Malley in the Cathedral of the Holy Cross in Boston and was the culmination of five years of prayer and study. Ron was "vested" by our own Deacon John Barry. On the following day, St. Mary's welcomed Ron as her new Deacon at an 11:30 Sunday Morning Mass of Thanksgiving. Ron delivered his first sermon, and Fr. Mark presented him with two gifts from the Parish – a Master Key to the buildings, and a Print depicting the call of the first seven deacons in Acts Chapter 6.

Ron grew up in Southwick, Massachusetts in the foothills of the beautiful Berkshires. He is the third of four sons of John and Dorothy Dowding.

Ron is a graduate of Northeastern University (B.S. in Business Administration and Certificate in Professional Writing). He also holds a Certificate in Software Engineering from Harvard University. Ron is employed as a software project manager, and is currently pursuing a Master's in Ministry from St. John's Seminary.

Ron married his wife, Jeanne, in 1987 and in 1991 they moved to Holliston. They have two sons – Andrew and Christopher. For the past 15 years, Jeanne has been a math teacher at the middle school in Holliston. Ron and Jeanne have been active in several ministries at St. Mary's for many years. Ron is a founding member of the St. Mary's Knights of Columbus Council and Jeanne was a founding member (secretary) of the WINGS ministry at St. Mary's.

We congratulate Ron and his family on this joyous occasion and pray that his new ministry will be a rich source of blessing for them and for our parish!



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

TENTATIVE 2020 CHRISTMAS MASS SCHEDULE

Because of the Pandemic seating limits, we will need more Masses this year to accommodate our people at Christmas. The need to fully disinfect worship spaces between Masses also requires changes to our usual schedule. In light of Pandemic Christmas challenges, Cardinal O'Malley has given a one day dispensation allowing Vigil Masses to begin as early as 3 PM on December 24 this year. Therefore *- provided that we can recruit enough greeters and cleaners for safety -* St. Mary's tentative Mass Schedule for Christmas 2020 is as follows:



Thursday, December 24, 2020: 3 PM Masses in both the Church & Hall, 5 PM Masses in both the Church & Hall, 7:30 PM Mass in the Church, 11 PM "Midnight" Mass in the Church.

Friday, December 25, 2020: 9:30 AM Mass in the Church, 11:30 AM Mass in the Church.

* All Masses will require Advance Mass Sign Ups. Only in this way can we make certain that there is a place for all.

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

150 years ago this month, on November 29, 1870, St. Mary's was canonically established as a Parish. Those 150 years represent countless moments of ministry and grace that have blessed generations of Catholics in Holliston and the surrounding communities. We give thanks to God for this beautiful family of faith and ask Him to watch over and guide us into the future.

For the past 60 years, one of the things that has helped keep St. Mary's strong is the Grand Annual – a once a year special collection that goes entirely toward parish operating costs. In combination with the weekly offertory, the Grand Annual allows St. Mary's to pay her bills and maintain her four buildings, three of which are well over 100 years old.

As you know, the Grand Annual always takes place in November. The 2020 St. Mary's Grand Annual Collection is **Veteran's Day Weekend - November 7 & 8.** The goal is \$150,000 – the same as the previous four years.

The bulk of this year's Grand Annual, \$79,650.00, is needed to cover the complete painting and plaster repairs of Saint Mary's Church interior. (Due to scaffolding costs, both other bids were over \$100,000). Our church has not been painted inside since the completion of the renovation twenty-six years ago. Walls have been stained by soot and in some places the paint is so worn away that you can actually see the wooden framework inside the plaster.

The church ceiling is of particular concern, as it has developed numerous cracks that are spreading and will become more costly to repair as time goes on. As part of the repairs, the church ceiling fans will be removed. These do not actually affect the airflow in the church and are an eyesore that collect black dirt we cannot reach to clean away.

The painting company we have contracted with, ARTECH Church Restoration, will begin the church interior repairs and painting on Monday, November 16. The work will all be completed by Friday, December 18, just in time for our Christmas Celebrations. While weekday Masses will move to Fr. Haley Hall for those five weeks, the project will be arranged to allow us use of the church for all weekend Masses.

Normally, about \$85,000 of the \$150,000 Grand Annual is designated toward Staff Salaries and regular parish bills. However, because of the expense of painting and repairing the church interior, that will not be possible this year. It is therefore critical that, going forward, the parish offertory need of \$15,000 a week be <u>consistently</u> achieved. For this reason, please consider switching to Automatic Giving through your bank, or the "WeShare" Online Giving option. Since successfully paying off the last of her \$1.2 million loan debts in the fall of 2010, St. Mary's has been able to pay her bills and remains debt free. Your generous support of St. Mary's 2020 Grand Annual will assure that the hard-won financial health of our parish continues. We realize that these current economic times are difficult for many. But if we <u>all</u> do what we can according to our means, then the 2020 Grand Annual will be a success. Thank you in advance for your generosity, as together we build towards the next 150 years of Catholic faith in Holliston.

NEWS FROM OUR SISTER PARISH: St. Mary's March 2020 Pilgrimage to the Holy Land was scheduled to include a visit and Mass with Fr. Issa at our new Sister Parish - Our Lady of Fatima in Beit Sahour. St. Mary's parishioners donated over 200 new English language books, educational DVD's, and colored pencil sets for the pilgrims to carry with them for the children of the Patriarchate School in Beit Sahour. When queried, the Pastor Father Issa had indicated that these items would be most useful – especially the books as the schoolchildren spend one hour per day in English reading.

Unfortunately, the pilgrimage was postponed due to the COVID 19 Pandemic, so the gifts had to be shipped over instead (minus the colored pencils which created import problems). Two boxes were sent by Federal Express in mid-September, and on October 1 we received word that the first box of items, though battered, had arrived safely in Beit Sahour!

The second box of books arrived in Jerusalem on October 2 and will be brought to Beit Sahour soon.

Another exciting development was the recent establishment of the "HOLLISTON – HOLY LAND FRIENDSHIP SCHOLARSHIP." This annual scholarship will pay 100% of the costs for one boy and one girl to attend the Beit Sahour Patriarchate School each year. Deserving recipients will be chosen by Fr. Issa and Our Lady's Parish. The scholarship will be funded by a special once a year collection at St. Mary's, this year the weekend of January 10, 2021. The cost per student is just \$1,100 each, so the collection need only raise \$2,200 to forever change the lives of two Catholic students in the Holy Land, opening doors and brighter futures for them both.

WHAT IS NEXT? Our Lady's in Beit Sahour charters a Boy Scouts of Palestine Troop, just as St. Mary's, Holliston charters a Boy Scouts of America Troop. The Troop adult leaders have begun communicating and hope to find ways for the two Troops to connect and learn what Scouting is like in a different land and culture. Celebrating 150 years! St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church

REV. RICHARD J. QUINLAN: In honor of St. Mary's founding in November 1870, the following chapter about Fr. Richard Quinlan, St. Mary's founding pastor, is included. It is taken from the upcoming St. Mary's Anniversary Book.

Rev. Richard Quinlan: Setting the bar high it's hard to imagine a priest more suited in temperament and ability for navigating the myriad obstacles of building a new parish than Fr. Richard Quinlan. Newspaper articles from his 25th anniversary celebration and his obituary are filled with praise for his quiet disposition, frank and kindly manner, readiness to respond to duty, tireless work for right and against wrong, and his great charity. His parishioners were very generous to him also, and more conservative non-Catholics in Holliston looked upon the lavish outpourings as rather overdone. He had chances for more prestigious appointments elsewhere, but declined them to stay with his new faith family.



Fr. Quinlan was born October 17, 1842, in Boston, the only child of Patrick and Mary Quinlan. He attended parochial schools in North Easton and Pawtucket,

graduated from Holy Cross College in 1863 and from the Grand Seminary in Montreal where he was ordained. He gathered experience for administering a parish from his assignments at St. James in Haverhill and St. Stephen's in the North End before coming to Holliston as founding pastor of St. Mary's in 1870. What is more remarkable is that Fr. Quinlan was 28 years old when he began his journey with his new flock at St. Mary's.

Once in Holliston, he wasted no time building his parish (both literally and figuratively!) then consisting of the towns of Holliston, Medway and Bellingham. No doubt he was helped in his numerous travels between towns by his ownership of a horse (\$150) and carriage (\$100). He immediately immersed himself in Holliston community life; serving on the Holliston School Committee and the Board of Trustees of the Holliston Public Library. His account ledger records his salary as \$50.00 a month.

Fr. Quinlan did have several curates to help him during these busy building years. Sadlier's Catholic Directory lists Rev. John F. Cummins assisting in 1881 and 1883, and Rev. James Campbell assisting in 1885. An article in the February 10, 1885 edition of The Boston Globe states "Rev. Thomas Moylan of Bridgewater has arrived as assistant to Rev. R.J. Quinlan, pastor of St. Mary's Church." Rev. Alexander J. Hamilton, born and raised in Holliston, assisted Fr. Quinlan in 1905 and 1906.

In December 1891, Fr. Quinlan celebrated his 25th anniversary as a priest. He was inherently modest but was persuaded by three of his former altar boys, now priests, to have a more lavish celebration. Festivities included a 9:00 AM Solemn High Mass celebrated by Fr. Quinlan, an elegant banquet at 1:00 PM for visiting priests, and a public gathering of the parish in the evening which included entertainment by the children. The entire church was handsomely decorated for the occasion. A generous purse was given to him in gratitude for his years of service.

The proud tradition at St. Mary's for beautiful and inspiring music began with Fr. Quinlan. Early in his pastorate, he hired Etta (Julietta) Kennedy, professional organist, choir director, and graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music, to develop a choir at St. Mary's. She not only started an adult choir, but also a children's choir as well. Etta and the choir provided the music at Fr. Quinlan's 25th anniversary celebration in 1891. She, and both choirs, also played a prominent role in providing music and dramatic plays at the early town wide celebrations and festivals held to benefit St. Mary's. Etta's brother, Thomas, was the first sexton at St. Mary's, and her father, Michael Kennedy was elected Selectman in 1869. Etta died on February 29, 1912 after serving at St. Mary's for 40 years. Ironically, Fr. Quinlan died one month later.

It is easy to forget that while we recognize and admire all his heroic efforts at St. Mary's, his parish responsibilities went beyond Holliston town borders. His early ledger pages were clearly separated into entries for Holliston and entries for Medway. Separate entries for Medway are listed from January 1871 through 1876 and contain the same types of records as his Holliston entries. It appears that at the same time Fr. Quinlan was building our church he was also building a church in Medway. He succeeded in erecting the basement and most of the superstructure of the new St. Joseph's, but there was such a large influx of Catholics that Medway was made a separate parish in May 1885. The new Pastor, Rev. Matthew Boylan, finished the construction.

construction. During the last three years of his life Fr. Quinlan was in declining health and he was sent another curate, Fr. Francis McNeil, of Boston to help him with his many parish duties. This saintly and humble pastor went home to God, in the rectory, on March 25, 1912, after serving for 42 years, St. Mary's longest serving pastor. His eminence Cardinal O'Connor presided over his funeral Mass and the church was filled to capacity by parishioners and townspeople. Many were unable even to gain entry. About 100 priests were present, including eleven men who had served as altar boys to Fr. Quinlan and subsequently became priests. Schools and businesses were closed at the time of the funeral. Fr. Quinlan is buried in St. Mary's Cemetery along with his parents.

CAMPOUT (SEPTEMBER 11-13): Nineteen Scouts and leaders camped for the weekend at Nobscot Scout Reservation in Framingham. Throughout the weekend social distancing was maintained and everyone camped in their own tents. The weekend focused on developing Scout skills, a hike, campfire and a Scout's Own Prayer Service on Sunday morning. The Scouts also completed a service project clearing two campsites of fallen debris that had occurred over the past few months.

BACKPACKING TRIP (SEPTEMBER 26-27): Carrying all the gear they needed for the weekend in their backpacks, 20 Scouts and leaders participated in backpacking training at Rocky Woods Reservation in Medfield. For many of the younger Scouts, this was their first backpacking trip. After a 5-mile hike, the Troop set camp in a field next to a pond, cooked freeze-dried dinners on lightweight stoves and settled in around the campfire. The weekend training focused on developing backpacking and hiking skills, map and compass, learning how to use the Troop's backpacking stoves, water purification and other backpacking equipment. Each of the four Scouts have now completed their Eagle requirements, submitted their Eagle Applications for approval and are awaiting their Board of Reviews.

"FAITH SPEAKING" VOLUMES: *I'm Still Here: Black Dignity in a World Made for Whiteness* by Austin Channing Brown is this month's recommended book. In this book, Ms. Brown tells her story of growing up as a Christian Black woman, inviting her readers to "to be more curious about it's [racial injustice] origins than we are worried about our

comfort" (p. 117). Particularly moving is her telling of why her parents named her Austin, her recounting of her experiences in the world of work and her writing about "standing in the shadow of hope" (title of the final chapter). *I'm Still Here* is available from online booksellers.

SUNDAY READINGS: We begin this month of November with our celebration of the Solemnity of All Saints (November 1) and end with our commemoration of the First Sunday of Advent (November 29). In between these two Sundays are the two final Sundays of Ordinary Time (November 8 and 15) and our remembrance of the Solemnity of Christ the King (November 22). The Solemnity of All Saints, a feast which is always celebrated on November 1, features as its Gospel, Matthew's rendering of the Beatitudes ("Blessed are they..."). The next two Sundays offer parables intended to help us to be prepared for the coming of God's kingdom. The Solemnity of Christ the King this year reminds us, through the Gospel reading of Matthew 25: 31-46, of the importance of caring for our brothers and sisters, who are Christ in this world. And finally, on November 28, the First Sunday of Advent, we begin our reading from the Gospel of Mark and are reminded to "Be watchful! Be alert!
