Dear Members of the St. Mary's Parish Family,

I thank you for the many ways you have stayed connected and faithful to our St. Mary's Parish Family during these unprecedented times. Many of you have been back at Mass since we reopened in May of 2020. More and more have been worshipping in person since vaccinations became available, and especially since the Cardinal's dispensation from the Sunday Mass Obligation was lifted on June 20. What a joy it has been to see so many dear faces again!

The livestreamed Mass has allowed those at high risk and with medical conditions to remain connected to their parish each week in prayer. And as you have seen in the bulletin, most of St. Mary's people have stood faithfully by their parish in stewardship, allowing our staff to be paid, buildings maintained, and ministries available.

If "*it is in the hard times that you find out who your real friends are*," then many, many people have proven themselves to be true and faithful friends to St. Mary's.

That having been said, this experience of pandemic has unavoidably weakened our parish ties. So many of the worship, service, and social opportunities that used to strengthen our friendships and sense of community here were limited or even suspended by the pandemic.

Just as sheep who become less connected to their flock might wander and fall prey to wolves, poachers, or dangerous terrain, so our people are now in a certain degree of spiritual peril. It will take prayer and effort for each of us to renew our own parish family ties. And we all need to reach out to those who might stray or even fall away entirely because they are not as connected as once they were. I know St. Mary's can count on you in this important work.

Years back, I attended a retreat where the director gave a reflection on the seven deadly sins. He defined the sin of sloth as "*a disdain for the spiritual because of the physical effort involved.*" As we try to recover from the pandemic, I suspect that sloth will be the real temptation for many. Having been away from "in person" worship for so long, some might just drift along without the Holy Mass and the spiritual nourishment it provides. What a loss it would be to no longer hear the Good News in a world filled with so much darkness. What a sorrow for the soul to no longer welcome Jesus in His Body and His Blood.

77 FIRST COMMUNIONS!

On two consecutive weekends this June, four classes totaling seventy seven students made their First Holy Communions at St. Mary's. Holy Communion is the second of the three Catholic sacraments of initiation, the others being Baptism and Confirmation. After years of watching their mothers and fathers receive Holy Communion, these young people were finally able to take their place at God's table. Having been received into the Eucharistic Fellowship, these boys and girls will now be fortified by God's grace each week as they receive Jesus' Body and Blood – the spiritual food by which He strengthens His love and presence in our lives.

Wearing the parish's Our Mother of Perpetual Help vestment, Father Mark compared the two hands of the child Jesus shown clutching Mary - to the two sacraments of Confession and Communion. "Keep Confession and Sunday Mass in your lives," said Father, "and you will always be held close to your mother the Church – you will always be close to God." Because the First Communions took place on Saturdays, the children made their Second Holy Communions the very next day on Sunday, where they were called forward, presented with certificates and applauded by the whole St. Mary's Parish Family. MONTHLY ROSARY: The next Rosary will be Wednesday, September 15 in the Church at 7:00 PM. The Rosary is open to all parishioners and current COVID-19 policies are in effect.

SILVER ROSE PRAYER SERVICE: On August 12, the Council honored Our Lady of Guadalupe and, as quoted by past Supreme Knight Carl Anderson, "....we also confirm [our] dedication to the sanctity of human life." On display was one of eight circulating Silver Roses honoring Our Lady of Guadalupe. The parish service was led by St. Mary's Deacons



John Barry and Ron Dowding. Deacon Dowding's sermon spoke of the tragedy of our nation's legalized abortion law. He offered that everyone is for life, but the secular false choices offered for legal abortions must be countered by eliminating fear. Fear can be reduced by eliminating any uncertainty during pregnancy for women facing childbirth alone or fearing an unknown future. Our prayerful support for pro-life clinics, secure housing, financial aid, and standing up in support of the sanctity of all life may bring a hopeful reversal of legalized abortions. Knights recited the Rosary followed by the Liturgy of the Word and Consecration to Our Lady of Guadalupe.



October 6: *Charity and Justice*: Understanding Catholic Social Teaching. Catholic Social Teaching (CST) officially began in 1891 with Pope Leo XIII's encyclical *Rerum Novarum*. Our speaker will provide a general historical background of CST - it's evolution to it's recent past and future. Our speaker will also provide a comprehensive outline of the 7 key principles of CST; *Life and the Dignity of the Human Person, Solidarity, Care for God's Creation, Call to Family and Community and Participation, Option for the Poor and Vulnerable, Rights and Responsibilities Dignity of Work and Rights of Workers.* Finally, our speaker will help Catholics understand how a comprehensive understanding of CST can encourage us to form healthy consciences.



October 13: Vatican II and Catholic Social Teaching: Understanding Gaudium et Spes Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World. Speaker: Fr. Chris O'Connor. Fr. Chris was ordained in 1998 after studying at St. John's and at the Gregorian University in Rome. He received a Doctorate in Philosophy from CUA in 2004 and a Licentiate in Sacred Theology from BC School of Theology and Ministry in 2010. Our speaker will shed light on the importance of Vatican II in light of CST. As Catholics, we have been called to be a *missionary*

people as outlined in documents from Vatican II. As demonstrated in a key Vatican II document, Gaudium et Spes (The Church in the Modern World), Vatican II, 1965 #30, "It is imperative that no one, out of indifference to the course of events or because of inertia, would indulge in a merely individualistic morality. The best way to fulfill one's obligations of justice and love is to contribute to the common good according to one's means and the needs of others, and also to promote and help public and private organizations devoted to bettering the conditions of life."

October 20: *Created in His image (Gen 1:26–27):* Life and Dignity of the Human Person. The foundation of all CST principles is that human life is sacred, and the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. Our speaker will address various issues where the dignity of the human person is called into question; scientific issues, war/torture/genocide, abortion/euthanasia/death penalty, human trafficking, immigration, and healthcare for the poor. Our speaker will help us to see where we are called to love and act in defense of those in harm's way.

October 27: *Justice and Peace*: **Opening the Door to** *Fratelli Tutti*. Fraternity and social friendship are the ways Pope Francis indicates to build a better, more **just and peaceful world**, with the contribution of all: people and institutions. Francis offers a new vision of society in which human dignity and the human rights of all are respected. Our speaker will unpack the treasures within the Pontiff's third encyclical as they relate to CST and encourage us to act in accord with Pope Francis' call to action.



November 3: *Care of God's Creation*: The Urgency of Pope Francis' *Laudato Si'*. Speaker: Fran Ludwig. Fran founded the Faith and Environment Group at Sacred Heart and St. Brigid Parishes in Lexington and is on the Executive Board of Massachusetts Interfaith Power and Light and chairs the Boston Chapter of the Laudato Si' Movement. "Pope Francis calls the Church and the world to acknowledge the urgency of our environmental challenges and to join him in embarking on a new path." Responsible stewardship of God's creation is the call of every Catholic. Our speaker will share Pope Francis' exciting new program that helps Catholics in parishes around the world to become more sustainable in the spirit of Laudato Si'.

November 10: <u>*Go Forth in Love*: Saints who lived Boldly</u>. Discover the men and women of our Church who have lived in accordance with the tenets of Catholic Social Teaching. These heroic figures have followed Christ's invitation to love one another as Christ has loved us. Our speaker will introduce us to four Catholic saints who have boldly lived this call of discipleship standing up against racism, intolerance, disease and more - St. Damien of Molokai, Saint Katherine Drexal and Saint Martin de Porres. "The examples of these saints make it clear that social justice is an integral part of our faith tradition." As we look ahead, these saints inspire us to get involved and make a difference.

SUMMER 2021 HIGH ADVENTURE - BACKPACKING THE WHITE MOUNTAIN PRESIDENTIAL RANGE:

After two training hikes in June and July, ten Troop 14 Scouts and leaders went on a five day high-adventure trip from August 10-14. They backpacked the southern Presidential Range which culminated at Mount Washington. The High Adventure Crew hiked a total of 40.4 miles, summiting ten 4000'and 5000' mountains, with a total elevation gain of 13,530' over the five days. The Crew hiked above the tree line at times, and experienced great 360-degree, 60-100 mile views across numerous mountains in New Hampshire, Maine, and Vermont. After summiting Mount Washington at 6,288', the Scouts cooled down with a swim in one of the mountain lakes near the AMC Lakes of the Clouds hut at 5,012'.



THE POWER OF POSITIVITY

How thankfulness and hope can transform our culture

It's easy to get bogged down by all the negative impulses in our society today: Covid-19, international conflicts, global warming, natural disasters, etc. How do we overcome the gloom and cynicism that is so prevalent in our culture? The answer lies in turning our attention toward what is right with our world rather than what is wrong with it. For two months during the pandemic actor, John Krasinski offered a weekly video Some Good News, which featured feel-good stories with positive messages. Although the video fizzled out when he sold the rights to his broadcast in May of 2020, his eight short episodes attracted over 72 million viewers; demonstrating that the world is starved for the perspective of optimism.



A true embrace of our faith offers the world the only long-term solution to overcoming negativity. What is the *Good News* that our faith has to offer? The Gospel, of course! Jesus reminds us that

"It is not as the world gives that I give to you. Do not let your heart be troubled, and do not let it be afraid." while we live in this world we need not be consumed by it [see *Matthew* 6:25-33 & 11:28-30, John 14:27 & 16:33, 2 Corinthians 12:9-10]. Many great saints (i.e.: Francis of Assisi & Teresa of Calcutta) have shown us that by turning our attention away from our own plight and focusing our attention instead on where God's presence is evident around us and where His road is leading us, we can avoid being swept into the downward spiral of a fallen world.

The most joyful people in my life have always been the ones who attend Mass daily, and the ones who do things for others regularly, without expecting anything in return. They seem to realize that putting God and neighbor first helps to even the playing field. Saint Paul tells us that "the sufferings of this time are not comparable to the glory which is going to be revealed in us (in the world to come)" [*Romans 8:18*] By putting our faith into this reality rather than in societal trends, and by doing all we can to prepare for the ultimate "retirement" (heaven), each of us may come to realize a sense of hope and optimism that the world is incapable of providing.

SEASONAL READINGS: All of the Sunday second readings this month are from the Letter of James. On September 12, we hear the well-known lines calling us to action: "What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone says he has faith but does not have works?" Felix Just, SJ, on his Catholic Resources website,

(<u>https://bit.ly/JustonJames</u>), provides a brief outline of the letter, writing that its purpose is to stress the ethics of Christian living. The US Bishops, on their website (<u>https://bit.ly/USCCBJames</u>), introduce the letter and note that it falls within the tradition of Jewish Wisdom literature and that its ethical norms, unlike those of Paul, are not primarily based on Christ. The Bible Project offers an engaging video summary of the letter at <u>https://bit.ly/BibleProjectJames</u>. While the video claims that the author of the letter is the half-brother of Jesus (this is not known to be true, as "brother" sometimes referred to kin in Jesus' culture), the main themes of the letter are presented in an easily understandable manner. PRAYERS ON THE ANNIVERSARY OF 9/11: You will find prayers from several religious traditions to remember the events of September 11, 2001 at <u>https://bit.ly/XavierPatriotDay</u>. We pray for healing, justice and hope on the Twentieth Anniversary of this tragic day.

SEASON OF CREATION: Each year, the Catholic Church, in collaboration with many other Christian Churches, celebrates the Season of Creation from September 1 to October 4, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi. This year's theme is "A Home for All? Renewing the *Oikos* of God". *Oikos* means the "household of God", the "beloved community".
