I ended up donating almost a hundred books and throwing away such things as my old student loan payment coupons, my freshman year college biology notes, and many very old Christmas cards. The real treasure was the prayer on the reverse side, which I have been offering first thing every day. To me the words speak of comfort and being enfolded by the grace of God. O my Lord and Savior, support me every hour in the strong arms of Your sacraments, and by the fresh fragrance of Your consolations.

Let the absolving words be said over me, and the holy oil sign and seal me, and Your own Body be my food, and Your Blood my sprinkling; and let my sweet Mother, Mary, breathe on me, and my Angel whisper peace to me, and my glorious Saints NN smile upon me;

that in them all, and through them all, I may receive the gift of perseverance, and forever and always live, in Your faith, in Your Church, in Your service, and most of all in Your love.

THE ASSUMPTION OF MARY INTO HEAVEN ~

A HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION

The Assumption refers to the Blessed Virgin Mary being Assumed, body and soul, into heaven at the end of her earthly life. "Assumption" is different than "Ascension" because one is passive (i.e. one is Assumed) and the other is active (i.e. one Ascends). It is by the power of God that Mary was Assumed.

As evidenced by the writings of many early Church fathers, Christians have believed for more than a millennium that the Blessed Virgin was Assumed into heaven. According to St. John of Damascus, the Roman emperor Marcian requested the body of Mary, Mother of God at the Council of Chalcedon, in 451.

St. Juvenal, who was Bishop of Jerusalem wrote the emperor that "Mary died in the presence of all the Apostles, but that her tomb, when opened upon the request of St. Thomas, was found empty; wherefrom the Apostles concluded that

the body was taken up to heaven."

This belief was held throughout the centuries, then in 1950, Pope Pius XII issued Munificentissimus Deus, which officially defined the Dogma of the Assumption. This means that the Church officially recognizes this belief as a true and necessary part of our Catholic beliefs about Mary.

For Catholics, all beliefs

about Mary illuminate our most treasured beliefs about her Son. The Assumption illustrates to us the truth about Christ's promise of eternal life and the resurrection of the faithful.

Stepping Up in Faith

How steps 2 & 3 of the 12-Step Program, and the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius of Loyola can help us on our journey toward holiness.

In the June newsletter I illustrated how the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius of Loyola and the Twelve Step Program of Addiction Recovery are closely related. By practicing these steps, regardless of what attachments we may have, each of us can take more deliberate steps toward holiness in our journey of faith. As spiritual companions in iTHIRST, Diane and I accompany those who are suffering from unhealthy attachments. They can include everything from social media to relationships to substance use disorder, and their afflictions can impact whole communities. As we reviewed Step One in the last edition, let us understand better Steps Two and Three.

Step Two: Belief & Response

AA describes this step as "Coming to believe that a Power greater than ourselves can restore us to sanity." Coming to believe in a greater power than self is both a practice of humility and a method of liberation. Acknowledging our limitations releases us from the sole liability of solving problems on our own. Isolation is a trademark of compulsive behavior and a byproduct of pride. By believing in God and acknowledging His Authority we gain patience and perspective. But believing in God is not enough. We cannot accept God's help unless we are mindful and willing to trust in Him; trusting that His unconditional love is directed toward us as individuals. We must acknowledge that there is a Father Who is central to our lives, and that we, His sons and daughters, are truly His beloved. Being loved so unconditionally should elicit a response; a desire to reach out in devotion to the source of that love.

Step Three: Surrender

The adage "Letting go and letting God" is a common phrase among AA and Al-Anon participants. It means to "make a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understand Him." This is the third step, and for many it is the hardest. It can be difficult to establish a relationship with an unseen deity, but it is likely that each of us has had some experience of a "God moment" in our lives. When we try to tap into these experiences and return to listening to the "language" God used with us in those moments, rather than talking at Him as we often might do in prayer, we can begin to narrow the gap. This is what Saint Paul described as "walk(ing) by faith and not by sight." [2 Corinthians 5:7]. Perhaps a big reason this step can be challenging is because it requires a skill that our current society has lost the art of developing: the practice of silence and undistracted listening. But it is a skill worth developing; surrendering our time and distractions to God will release us from the biggest obstacle in modern Western society: ourselves.

Taking Steps Two and Three are critical steps for us in acknowledging that God is our source of sanity and peace, and that only by turning over our will to Him will we achieve happiness and eternal life. To quote author Johann Hari again, "the opposite of addiction isn't sobriety – it's connection." By connecting ourselves to God and to each other, we are freeing ourselves from unnecessary attachments and taking positive steps on our journey toward holiness.

We will continue in upcoming newsletters to highlight the remaining steps, and how they connect with Ignatian Spirituality and our religious journey of discovery.

Mark has been bringing groups there since 1996, and they had a special welcome sign out for him - as well as a video reel of some of his trips over the years. "That doesn't make me feel old at all!", Fr. Mark said. Volleyball and a large (heated) outdoor pool filled the time until dinner, which included a special "Rafting Cake", made by Roche Brothers in Millis. The night concluded with Mass in the Lodge, celebrated by Fr. Mark with teens reading and altar serving.

BARBEQUE: The end of year Court of Honor and Barbeque was celebrated on June 10 in Father Haley Hall. This event recognized the hard work the entire Troop put into merit badge completion, rank advancement, and the many adventures that occurred over the winter and spring months. **MARTHA'S VINEYARD BIKE TRIP:** Troop 14 Scouts continued their annual bike trip with camping at the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) Camp Greenough in Yarmouth, MA on Cape Cod from June 7 - 9. On Saturday June 8, the Troop boarded the Ferry in Woods Hole with their bikes for a day of touring on Martha's Vineyard. From Oaks Bluff, the Troop split into 2 groups and completed a 25-mile and 50-mile trek across the island. It was a beautiful day that allowed a stop at the beach for lunch, and many great sites encountered along the ride. The troop regrouped in Vineyard Haven for the ferry ride back to Woods Hole.



MINI GOLF: To celebrate a successful Scouting year, Troop 14 played a round of mini golf at Putts and More in Ashland on June 17, followed by ice cream. There were many great putts including a bunch of Holes in One.

SUMMER CAMP: Thirty-nine Scouts and eight Leaders attended a weeklong sleepover camp at Camp Squanto in Plymouth MA, from July 7 - July 13. Camp Squanto offers five weeks of BSA summer camp with some of our Scouts attending multiple weeks as Campers and Counselors. This annual tradition is a time to have fun working on Scouting skills and earning merit badges to advance in rank, to swim and boat, and to create friendships with other Scouts from across Massachusetts and as far away as Texas. Troop 14 Scouts were able to complete 76 merit badges, while working towards 41 partial merit badges, with one Scout completing the rigorous BSA life guarding class. Nine Scouts also completed the Flight to Eagle program which is focused on completing requirements needed to advance in rank.



SUMMER CAMP CONTINUED: The highlight of the week occurred on Thursday evening when Troop 14 won the Apache relay! This is a camp wide race where Troops compete across different activities like running, archery, canoeing, fire building, swimming, three-legged race, games, and whipped cream pie eating.
